# Timeline Update

## May 6, 2025

Board of Supervisors directed the Sheriff to proceed with Contract negotiations, subject to three conditions:

- Approval of contract by Vallejo and the Board by July 1, 2025.
- Written confirmation from DOJ that Sheriff will not be subject to existing settlement agreement.
- The County must meet and confer with Deputy Sheriff's Association regarding the proposed contract.

## May 14, 2025

Draft contract sent to City of Vallejo based on term sheet.

## June 16, 2025

DOJ confirmed settlement agreement only applied to Vallejo and Vallejo PD – not the Sheriff.

## June 17, 2025

Deputy Sheriffs' Association submitted a letter of opposition to the proposed contract.

## June 17, 2025

Vallejo City Council approved contract.

## July 1, 2025

Contract Deadline.



# Contract Conditions



- Approval of the contract by Vallejo by July 1, 2025.
- Written confirmation from the California Department of Justice (DOJ) that the Sheriff will not be subject to the existing settlement agreement between the DOJ, Vallejo, and the Vallejo Police Department (VPD).
- The County must meet and confer with the Deputy Sheriffs' Association (DSA) regarding the proposed contract.



# Discussion / Sheriff Recommendation

1. The Sheriff recommends that the Board ***not approve*** the proposed contract.
2. Alternative:
  - Board could direct staff to continue the meet and confer process with the DSA in an effort to resolve the identified issues prior to the July 22, 2025 Board meeting. If a resolution is reached, the Sheriff could return at that time to request consideration and potential approval of the proposed contract.
    - This is not recommended, as it would leave insufficient time to recruit staff, procure equipment, and implement the necessary infrastructure to begin services by January 4, 2026.
    - The DSA's letter of opposition indicated that approximately 90% of its respondents oppose the agreement, raising substantial uncertainty about whether agreement could be reached within that limited time frame.
3. Requesting Board of Supervisors Direction.
