# Community Investment Fund Background

- In 2019, on behalf of the Board, the County Administrator’s Office initiated a Human Services Needs Assessment (HSNA) to:
  1. Identify the greatest human services needs in the County.
  2. Create a process to allocate limited county funds to effective strategies.
  3. Create a structure for monitoring the effectiveness of grants; and
  4. Show how this funding is having an impact.
- The HSNA resulted in the creation of a durable framework of desired outcomes with clearly defined indicators to support a process that directs limited county resources via a \$2 million Community Investment Fund
- In November 2023, the Board approved minor changes to the CIF for the three-year term FY2024/25 – FY2026/27, including:
  - Alignment with other current initiatives to avoid duplication
  - Grants proposed within the Legacy Programs, Annual Grants, and Deep Investments
  - Where to invest unspent and unallocated funds
  - Addition of a nonprofit emergency fund

A framework to address priority needs in Solano County through strategic grantmaking.

\$365,000 Annually  
1-year commitment  
Addresses top 6 needs

## One-Time Investments- FY2025/26 Annual Grants

**Goal:** To support targeted, short-term programs that address urgent needs across the County. Open to a wide range of community-based organizations.

**CIF Annual Investment:** Up to \$75,000 for larger efforts or up to \$25,000 for smaller projects.

### Top 6 Priorities

1. Mental Health
2. Homelessness
3. Housing
4. Early Education
5. Youth Development
6. Safe & Stable Environments for Children



# One-Time Investments-Annual Grants FY2025/26 RFP 2025-03 Requirements & Process

## Requirements:

1. Must address one or more of the top 6 needs
2. Must provide services to Solano County residents
3. Must identify concrete tasks and outcomes

**52** individuals representing **23** agencies attended the mandatory proposers' conference

**20 Eligible Proposals received and scored through a competitive process.**



# One-Time Grant Investment: FY2025/26 Recommendations

	Agency	Amount	Purpose
1	Crescent Moon Center	\$25,000	Provide arts, mindfulness, and equine-assisted mental health workshops to 300 individuals, supporting recovery and community connection.
2	Bay Area Community Resources	\$16,237	Provide support to 24 expecting or new parents through consultations, baby bundles, and follow-up services.
3	Parents by Choice	\$75,000	Deliver Triple P Positive Parenting Programs to 150 parents of youth ages 13–16 and parents experiencing separation or divorce.
4	Touro University	\$75,000	Provide mental health resources and college and career readiness workshops to 250 youth.
5	Food is Free Bay Area	\$75,000	Distribute nutritious food to 5,000 households and provide 100 families with FIFBA Family Boxes.
6	Rio Vista CARE	\$75,000	Provide mental health services, youth development programs, and family support to 200 youth.
