FIFTH AMENDMENT TO SOLANO COUNTY STANDARD CONTRACT #2019-701

This Fifth Amendment to Solano County Standard Contract #2019-701 ("Fifth Amendment"), is entered into as of July 1, 2024, between the County of Solano, a political subdivision of the State of California, for the benefit of First 5 Solano Children and Families Commission, ("Commission"), and Bay Area Community Resources ("Contractor").

1. Recitals

- A. The parties entered into a Solano County Standard Contract known as contract #2019-701 dated June 25, 2019 ("Agreement"), for Contractor to provide services at the Vallejo First 5 Center (F5C); and
- B. The parties amended the Agreement on June 23, 2020 to add additional funding for developmental screenings and associated activities for FY2020/21; and
- C. The parties amended the Agreement a second time on July 1, 2021 to add developmental screenings and associated activities for FY2021/22; and
- D. The parties amended the Agreement a third time on July 1, 2022 to add additional funding for developmental screenings and associated activities for FY2022/23; and
- E. The parties amended the Agreement a fourth time on July 1, 2023 to add additional funding for developmental screenings and associated activities for FY2023/24
- F. Commission and Contractor now desire to amend the Agreement as set forth below.

2. Agreement

- A. Section 2 of the Agreement is deleted and replaced in its entirety with the following: The term of the contract is July 1, 2019-June 30, 2025
- B. Section 3 of the Agreement is deleted and replaced in its entirety with the following: The maximum amount of this Contract is \$3,555,967 total:
 - Up to \$431,667 for Year 1 (7/1/2019-6/30/2020)
 - Up to \$620,700 for Year 2 (7/1/2020-6/30/2021)
 - Up to \$620,700 for Year 3 (7/1/2021-6/30/2022)
 - Up to \$620,700 for Year 4 (7/1/2022-6/30/2023)
 - Up to \$620,700 for Year 5 (7/1/2023 6/30/2024)
 - Up to \$641,500 for Year 6 (7/1/2024 6/30/2025)
- C. Scope of Work for FY2024/25 Exhibit A-7 is attached to and incorporated into this Fifth Amendment.
- D. Budget for FY2024/25 Exhibit B-7 is attached to and incorporated into this Fifth Amendment.

3. Effectiveness of Contract

Except as expressly set forth in this Fifth Amendment, the terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged.
