
Community Investment Fund Update (Non-County Contributions)

In November 2023, the Board of Supervisors conducted a three-year review of the \$2 million Community Investment Fund (CIF), which supports top human service needs in the county. The review reaffirmed the existing priority areas and recommended adjustments to the funding allocations across the grant categories. FY2025/26 is the second year of funding under this updated cycle. Additionally, the Board approved the creation of an Emergency Fund to provide one-time support for agencies addressing urgent needs within the County's priority areas. The CIF has since grown to \$2.3 million and now supports a four-pronged approach to community investment:

Since the approval of the CIF, staff have been implementing the CIF on behalf of the Board. An update on each of these program categories is as follows:

<u>Legacy Programs</u>: Of the various programs previously authorized by the Board, there are 5 programs that originated with or were initially brought forward by a Board of Supervisor member. These 5 Legacy Programs total \$305,291 for FY2025/26 and address a variety of community needs.

<u>One-Time Programs</u>: The one-time programs are provided through annual grants and are designated to address any of the top 6 needs in the county:

- 1. Mental Health
- 2. Housing
- 3. Homelessness
- 4. Early Education
- 5. Youth Development
- 6. Safe and stable environments for children

These one-time programs are secured annually through Request for Proposal solicitation process. A total of 23 agencies came to the mandatory bidders' conference, and the County received 20 applications. A review panel scored and ranked the proposals and recommendations were approved by the Board on June 3, 2025, for a July 1 start date.

<u>Deep Programs</u>: The Board designated the majority of its approximately \$2 million to address the top 3 needs in the county:

Mental Health

Mental Health was ranked the highest need in Solano County. Local experts shared that Solano County should clarify the existing System of Care and access points for mental health services and then widely share that information via a community engagement campaign.

Behavioral Health System of Care Mapping and Connection: SolanoConnex continues to play a vital role in enhancing access to mental and behavioral health resources in Solano County. Through their web-based platform, SolanoConnex has connected over 4,500 residents to local mental and behavioral health services in FY2024/25. Trained navigators offer personalized support, ensuring individuals receive appropriate referrals and follow-up care, with 100% of users reporting positive interactions. The program also includes in-person outreach, with mental health navigators making 48 visits to various community spaces and reaching more than 1,000 people through events and navigator activities. Additionally, SolanoConnex has released 17 mental health-focused podcast episodes to increase community awareness and engagement regarding emotional well-being.

Capacity-building remains a key focus, with SolanoConnex offering Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) and Be Sensitive, Be Brave (BSBB) trainings across the county. To date, 24 individuals have completed MHFA and over 330 have participated in BSBB, with most participants reporting increased confidence in recognizing and responding to mental health concerns. The program has also supported a community-based fellowship, where participants develop and implement action plans to address behavioral health needs in their own communities. While some evaluation metrics are still in progress, including the randomized control trial and key informant interviews, SolanoConnex is expected to meet or exceed many of its annual goals for FY2024/25.

Housing

Housing was ranked the second highest need by the community. While there are many aspects to "housing," housing affordability for lower income residents who are spending the majority of their income on housing was the priority. The Board expressed interest in addressing affordable housing as it relates to reducing homelessness.

<u>Housing Trust Fund</u>: For FY2025/26, the CIF is contributing \$200,000 as the required local match to the Housing Trust Fund (County Housing - Fund 323).

Homelessness

Homelessness was ranked the third highest need in Solano County. Experts cited the lack of coordination efforts and resources between entities trying to address homelessness, as well as the lack of provider/community understanding of how to respond to persons who are homeless/at risk of homelessness.

United Way California Capital Region (UWCCR) is leading homelessness prevention efforts in Solano County through a combination of direct client support and systems coordination. All eligible staff and navigators have completed specialized training facilitated by All Home and Bay Area Community Services. UWCCR has made strong progress in reaching households at risk of homelessness by conducting intake assessments, providing flexible financial assistance, and offering housing stabilization support to 245 households. These efforts help prevent housing loss and promote long-term stability for individuals and families.
