The Department of General Services recommends that the Board of Supervisors receive a 2017 California State Association of Counties (CSAC) - Excess insurance Authority (EIA) EAGLE Award for Solano County Nut Tree Airport to recognize Excellence in Implementation of New Risk Management Program for the Airport Obstruction Removal Program and Projects. The award will be presented by Rick Brush, Chief Member Services Officer, CSAC EIA.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

The California State Association of Counties-EIA Exemplary Achievement in Government Leadership and Enrichment (EAGLE) Awards Program recognizes members for excellence in risk management by recognizing professional contributions and achievements. In addition, the EIA promotes an atmosphere to encourage members to strive for excellence and innovation.

Solano County's Obstruction Removal Program at the Nut Tree Airport is being recognized to receive the 2017 EAGLE Award for Excellence in Implementation of New Risk Management Program from CSAC EIA. Large groves of eucalyptus trees were identified as a hazard to the safe flight of airplanes operating at Nut Tree Airport. The Airport worked with multiple agencies to remove the obstructions and replant native trees for habitat mitigation and preservation. The safety of airplanes and passengers was improved and the offset of native plantings ensured environmental preservation. The agencies included the City of Vacaville, Solano County Water Agency, Solano Community College, the Jimmy Doolittle Center and the State Department of Fish & Wildlife. The program also achieved compliance with safe navigable airspace standards and policies of the FAA, State of California, Solano County, and the City of Vacaville. The win-win solution to the problem is seen by EIA and the EAGLE Award Program as an outstanding example of leadership and multi-agency collaboration.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

Chair Vasquez requests that the Board adopt and present a resolution recognizing November 2017 as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome Awareness Month in Solano County.

SUMMARY:

Complex Regional Pain Syndrome, CRPS, formerly known as RSD, or Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy, is a chronic neuro-inflammatory disorder. CRPS was recently designated as a rare disorder by the United States Food and Drug Administration and experts believe less than 200,000 people in the United States suffer from it, according to the Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy Syndrome Association. Patients describe CRPS as a "burning," "pins and needles" sensation, or as if someone were squeezing the affected limb. The pain may spread to the entire arm or leg, even though the injury might have only involved a finger or toe. The level of pain is measured as one of the most severe on the McGill University Pain Scale.

CRPS awareness month is held in November and Solano County and others across the country have joined together to advocate for CRPS awareness, support and a better future through research, diagnosis, education and treatment.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

RESOLUTION OF THE SOLANO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RECOGNIZING NOVEMBER 2017 AS COMPLEX REGIONAL PAIN SYNDROME AWARENESS MONTH IN SOLANO COUNTY

WHEREAS, Complex Regional Pain Syndrome (CRPS), formerly known as RSD, or Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy, is a chronic neuro-inflammatory disorder. The pain is characterized as constant, extremely intense, and out of proportion to the original injury. CRPS is believed to be caused by damage to, or malfunction of, the peripheral and central nervous systems, according to the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke; and

WHEREAS, CRPS has been designated as a rare disorder by the United States Food and Drug Administration and experts believe less than 200,000 people in the United States suffer from it, according to the Reflex Sympathetic Dystrophy Syndrome Association; and

WHEREAS, CRPS occurs when the nervous system and the immune system malfunction as they respond to tissue damage from trauma. The nerves misfire, sending constant pain signals to the brain. The key symptom is prolonged, severe pain that may be constant. Patients describe CRPS as a "burning," "pins and needles" sensation, or as if someone were squeezing the affected limb. The pain may spread to the entire arm or leg, even though the injury might have only involved a finger or toe. The level of pain is measured as one of the most severe on the McGill University Pain Scale; and

WHEREAS, CRPS is an evolving and constantly changing disorder. The symptoms a patient experiences today may not be the symptoms they have next week, depending on how the body reacts to the weather, overall stress levels, medication, time of day, living conditions, amount of sleep and other factors. This makes it difficult for even the most knowledgeable doctors to correctly diagnose and treat the disorder; and

WHEREAS, CRPS awareness month is held in November and Solano County and others across the country have joined together to advocate for CRPS awareness, support and a better future through research, diagnosis, education and treatment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Solano County Board of Supervisors hereby recognize November as Complex Regional Pain Syndrome Awareness Month and urge all citizens to support the search for a cure and help those individuals and families who are touched by this devastating disorder.

County Treasurer, Tax Collector, County Clerk Chuck Lomeli introduced the item.

In response to a question from Supervisor Thomson, Mr. Lomeli noted that refunding was essentially the same thing as refinancing. He then advised that current saving estimates were proposed to be between \$12-17 million.

Assistant County Administrator Nancy Huston provided information on the proposed refunding of the bonds and an overview of options being recommended to the Board for consideration.

County Administrator Birgitta Corsello noted that an information package was being prepared for Standard and Poor's rating review that would be shared with the Board when it was finished. She then provided information on the amount of analysis being done for the review and advised that the process was very rigorous.

Auditor-Controller Simona Padilla-Scholtens provided information on the importance of Standard and Poor's rating of the County to ensure the bond holders were confident when investing in Solano County.

Supervisor Thomson advised that he disagreed with the recommendation of using Scenario 1 and commented on the need to maximize savings by using Scenario 2 in order to lock in savings.

Ms. Huston noted that money was put into deferred maintenance annually, that recommendations on funding reserves were included in the annual budget and that this was an opportunity to direct the savings into a committed reserve.

Supervisor Thomson advised that future Boards could decide to change where the savings were used and noted that he was in support of using Scenario 2.

Supervisor Brown commented on the need to save money for the taxpayers and in support of using Scenario 2.

Chair Vasquez invited members of the public to address the Board on this matter and the following comments were received:

- A) Donald Tipton, unincorporated Vallejo, commented in support of Scenario 2 and saving the most money.
- B) George Guynn, Jr., Suisun City, commented in support of Scenario 2 and on maintenance of buildings.

Supervisor Hannigan commented on the need to show savings offsets from relocating employees back into the County Administrative Center (CAC) and noted that the savings from Scenario 1 could be used in a variety of ways.

Ms. Huston provided information on deferred maintenance needs and potential savings from relocating employees back into the CAC.

In response to a question from Supervisor Hannigan, Ms. Corsello noted that debt financing currently funded many areas including the expansion of the Co-Gen, Probation building, parking structure, earthquake damage, the CAC's technology, roof and HVAC. She advised that the building would have significant investments needed by the time the bonds were paid off. She then noted that the Facility Plan required putting away between \$2 to 3 million per year to maintain building. She advised that is would be a General Fund revenue under the first scenario, and noted that the second scenario would give the future administration savings after the bonds were paid off.

In response to a question from Supervisor Hannigan, Ms. Huston noted that the building value would improve if the remainder of the build out took place. Ms. Corsello provided information on building out the remaining areas of the CAC.

Supervisor Hannigan advised that she could not support Scenario 2 and was in support of Scenario 1.

Supervisor Thomson commented that the budget process has found maintenance funding in the past and that it would be easy to spend the savings when not constrained by payment schedule.

Supervisor Thomson made a motion to approve using Scenario 2. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Brown.

County Counsel Dennis Bunting advised that a tie vote would continue the item to the next meeting.

In response to a question from Supervisor Thomson, Ms. Huston advised that staff had a meeting with Standard and Poor's the next day that may have to be rescheduled if the item was continued.

Supervisor Brown noted that paying off the debt was important.

Supervisor Hannigan made a substitute motion to approve Scenario 1. The motion was seconded by Chair Vasquez. Supervisors Brown and Thomson voted no resulting in a tie vote. The item was continued to the August 1, 2017 meeting. Continued

Director of Health & Social Services Gerald Huber provided an overview of Proposition 47 (Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Act).

Mental Health Services Manager Andy Williams and Mr. Huber provided an overview of the County's project proposal for the \$6 million Proposition 47 grant awarded to the County.

Supervisor Thomson commented on the need to reduce wait times for individuals so that they could go to detox right away. He then asked what happened to the SMART program that assisted individuals to get on social security and the importance of the program.

Mr. Huber noted that staff would be looking into how SMART could assist in the project.

In response to questions from Supervisor Thomson, Mr. Williams commented on needed detox services within the county.

Supervisor Thomson commented on potential zoning restrictions and opposition to the detox centers.

Mr. Huber provided information on different models of detox.

Supervisor Hannigan commented on a radio advertisement regarding the grant and noted that there were facilities in neighborhoods that housed various types of treatment patients and that were successful. She noted the importance of having these individuals in a normal home setting.

Supervisor Spering commented on establishing a baseline to measure goals and showing progress of the project.

Mr. Williams noted that a baseline had not been established but that data did show wait time baselines. He then commented on determining baselines for arrest rates and recidivism.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

The County Administrator's Office recommends that the Board of Supervisors adopt a resolution challenging Contra Costa County to participate in the Counties Care 2017 "Peace, Love and Veggies Holiday Food Fight" friendly challenge to benefit the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano.

SUMMARY:

Solano and Contra Costa Counties, working with the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano (Food Bank), have been participating in an annual counties care holiday food fight friendly challenge since 2004 when the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors extended the first challenge to Solano County. This will be the fourteenth year of this annual event to raise funds for the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano.

The event allows employees at both counties the opportunity to help those in need in their respective counties through financial donations as food insecurity and hunger are a continuing and growing concern in both counties and throughout California. Last year's combined county employees contributed a thirteen-year cumulative total of more than \$1.23 million. With the friends of the food fight included, more than \$1.62 million has been donated to the Food Bank.

In 2016, Solano County won the annual event with \$12.74 contributed per employee and regained control of the "Big Apple" Trophy. As the holder of the "Big Apple," Solano County challenges Contra Costa County to participate in the employee-to-employee 2017 Counties Care Holiday Food Fight friendly challenge to compete for possession of the "Big Apple." This year's theme is "Peace, Love and Veggies."

If adopted by the Board, the resolution will be presented to the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors at their November 14, 2017 meeting. If accepted by Contra Costa County, the Peace, Love and Veggies holiday food fight will commence on November 20 and run through December 31, 2017.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no cost associated with adopting the resolution challenging Contra Costa County to participate in the 2017 Counties Care Holiday Food Fight friendly challenge. If accepted by Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors, staff time of departmental food fund drive coordinators will be borne by the individual County departments involved in the drive. Solano County employees have contributed more than \$326,000 over the last thirteen years, and together, both counties have contributed more than \$1.23 million to the Food Bank. In addition, non-employee "Friends of the Food Bank" in Solano County has resulted in a cumulative total of more than \$38,000 in online donations during the annual county-to-county drive.

DISCUSSION:

The Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano distributes approximately 7 million pounds of food annually throughout Solano County. Approximately 63,000 hungry people, including children and seniors, in Solano County are served by the Food Bank each month. Both perishable and non-perishable food is also provided to countless nonprofit agencies throughout the County such as food pantries, shelters, soup kitchens, senior and child care centers, and group homes.

The Food Bank's mission is "leading the fight to end hunger, in partnership with our community and in service of our neighbors in need" and through continued community support, the Food Bank is able to accomplish this.

This would be the fourteenth consecutive year for the Counties Care Holiday Food Fight friendly challenge if the Board authorizes Solano County to extend this friendly challenge to Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors and employees. To date, Solano County has held the coveted "Big Apple" trophy six times, whereas Contra Costa County has held on to it eight times in the thirteen-year history of the food fight challenge.

This year, because of the devastating fires in Solano County and neighboring Napa and Sonoma Counties, there will likely be an increased demand on the Food Bank's budget due to reduced access to produce, as well as the need to serve thousands of displaced people needing extra help as they work to regain some semblance of a normal life again. Employee contributions to the annual food fight give the Food Bank the ability to reach a greater number of individuals in need, especially at this time.

Solano County and Contra Costa County employees will strive, through their donations, to make their County the champion and holder of the "Big Apple." Last year Solano County narrowly won the challenge with \$12.74 contributed per employee and regained possession of the "Big Apple" trophy. Contra Costa County collected \$11.40 per employee. This event raises funds for the Food Bank and allows employees in both counties an opportunity to help those in need in their respective county through financial donations. All funds raised in each county will be used to purchase food for the needy and hungry in each respective county.

On November 14, 2017, Larry Sly, Executive Director for Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano, will present the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors with the Solano County resolution challenging them to the 2017 "Peace, Love and Veggies Holiday Food Fight." If accepted, this year's employee-to-employee food drive fund challenge will run from November 20 through December 31, 2017.

ALTERNATIVES:

The Board could choose not to challenge Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors and employees this year, but this is not recommended as Solano County won the food drive challenge last year and this would allow Contra Costa County an opportunity to regain the title. But more importantly, while providing for some fun and friendly competitions, the counties care holiday food fight provides financial donations for the Food Bank to purchase food for the needy and hungry in the counties of Contra Costa and Solano.

Honorable Members of the Board:

It is my pleasure to present the quarterly report for the first quarter of FY2017/18.

State of the Treasury

As is their practice for evaluating investment pools rated by them, Standard and Poor's (S&P) analysts visited the Treasury in the quarter to evaluate the investment portfolio with regard to investment policies, operating procedures, contingency plans, and the strength of Treasury Managers.

Based upon revised criteria provided by them, I am happy to report that S&P continues to rate the investment pool AAf, S1. The Investment Pool continues to be invested in a manner consistent with the balancing of credit, liquidity, and interest rate risks and maintaining sufficient liquidity to meet the demands of the pool participants. Credit and liquidity risk are managed through diversification and a preference for more widely traded issuers and other liquidity options. The current balance of the Treasury Pool is \$1,044 million.

Current Market Conditions Impacting the Treasury Pool

The economy continued to expand in the quarter as reported by all 12 districts in the most recent Beige Book report for July and August. The Beige Book is a Federal Reserve System publication about current economic conditions across the 12 Federal Reserve Districts. US factory activity surged to a more than 13 years high in September, gains in raw material prices strengthened in the quarter. State and local government construction projects continue to expand and increased 1.1% in August.

The next Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) announcement is expected on November 1, it is expected by most economists surveyed and recent comments by the Chairwoman of the FOMC that federal funds rates will be increased in December. Funds rate is currently 1.00 to 1.25%, and it is anticipated the rate will increase by 0.25%. Additionally, the Fed had announced the reduction of the \$4.5 trillion balance sheet in October which is likely to cause upward pressure on interest rates.

Expectations going forward

The Treasury Pool primarily purchases securities at the short end of the yield curve, defined as investments with maturities of five years or less, and as a result maintains 0.5 to 1.5 duration. This makes the Investment Pool more sensitive to the FOMC interest rate increases than the reduction of the balance sheet. As the FOMC increases overnight rates further, the Treasury

will have the opportunity to purchase securities with slightly higher yields, and available liquidity will be invested to take full advantage of higher yielding securities.

The Treasury has a cash and cash equivalent position (securities maturing within 6 months) of \$354 million dollars as of September 30, 2017. 

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

The Department of General Services recommends that the Board:

- 1. Approve a three year contract beginning November 7, 2017 and ending November 6, 2020 with Mead & Hunt, Inc. of Santa Rosa to provide as needed consulting services to support Nut Tree Airport capital improvement projects; and
- 2. Authorize the County Administrator, or designee, to execute the contract and any modifications or amendments within approved project budgets.

SUMMARY:

The Airport conducted a competitive qualifications-based selection process for Airport engineering consultant services. Following review of qualifications, Mead & Hunt, Inc. was deemed the most qualified firm to provide consulting services in support of Airport capital projects. Key services that are expected to be provided by Mead & Hunt, Inc. include engineering, design and construction management services on Airport capital improvement projects. A complete scope of services is provided with the recommended contract (Attachment A)

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Since there is no guarantee of any base level of work for the selected firm, expenses for Airport consultant services will be paid from Board approved appropriations for individual Airport capital projects and the Airport operating budget. Therefore, there is no financial obligation to have this contract in place to activate services on an as-needed basis. Separate work authorizations will be executed by the County Administrator, or designee, as individual scopes of work are prepared within approved budget appropriations. There is no dollar

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value or financial obligation associated with approval of the recommended contract.

DISCUSSION:

The County issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) between August 9 and September 8, 2017 inviting a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) in response to the RFQ by airport engineering consulting firms. Three SOQ's were received from IMEG, Brandley Engineering, and Mead & Hunt, Inc (Attachment B). Following evaluation and ranking of each firm's qualifications, Mead & Hunt, Inc. was deemed the best qualified and experienced firm to support airport capital improvement projects including engineering design and construction services. Mead & Hunt, Inc. has a broad base of experience and can provide a variety of professional engineering disciplines.

Mead & Hunt has previously provided airport engineering design and construction services to the County on major runway and taxiway construction projects. Mead & Hunt, Inc. has satisfactorily performed work in the past for the County, has been responsive to the needs of the Airport, and delivered design and construction projects on schedule and within or under budget.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. The Board may elect to not approve the recommended contract. This action is not recommended since the design of capital projects planned for FY2017/18 needs to proceed to allow development to occur during the 2018 construction season.
- 2. The Board could elect not to delegate signing authority the County Administrator or designee. This action is not recommended since delegated authority will enable efficient authorization and management of consulting services to support airport capital projects.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

County Counsel provided legal guidance during the solicitation process and approved the recommended contract as to form.

CAO RECOMMENDATION:

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

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Master Services Agreement – Scope of Typical Services

The Solano County – Nut Tree Airport is anticipating a range of projects within the next 5-year period. Mead & Hunt has the resources and expertise to provide the needed consulting and construction services to facilitate the successful completion of these projects. Specific work scopes and budgets shall be proposed for individual projects and covered by County Adjusted Services Agreements. An anticipated summary of services for the next 5 years includes but is not limited to the following:

For Project Design, the scope of work is broken down into three phases.

- Phase 1 Contract Administration and Coordination
- Phase 2 Design Services
- Phase 3 Bid Administration

These phases are further described as follows:

Phase 1 Contract Administration and Coordination

This phase involves those activities required for defining the scope of the project, negotiating contract and subcontracts, and general coordination and administration, including (but not limited to) the following activities:

PROJECT COORDINATION

Consultant will coordinate with the design team, County, FAA, possible sub-consultants, and other applicable agencies to complete the tasks associated with Phase 1 of this scope. Regular progress meetings will be held with the design team.

GENERAL CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

Provide general administration during the design, document preparation, and bidding process, as applicable. Consultant will assign a Project Manager (PM) to this project to ensure continuity through all phases of work, as described in the project scope. The PM will be responsible for work performed by the Project Team. The PM's responsibilities typically include defining tasks, defining and maintaining schedules, identifying costs, monitoring work progress, coordinating with the County to receive their input, address their concerns, keep them informed regarding project status, obtain their concurrence on project scope, cost, and schedule, and obtain their input and approval of concepts and Final Design. Also included is maintaining quality control on all work of the Consultant and possible subconsultants, implementing and monitoring a program of Quality Control (QC) and Quality Assurance (QA), and preparing invoices to submit to the County in accordance with the County's standard invoice requirements.

GRANT APPLICATION AND ADMINISTRATION

This element of work includes assisting the County, if needed, during its preparation of the Grant Application (Application) before design has been completed and revisions to the Application after bids are accepted.

Phase 2 Design Services

This phase involves those activities required for the design of the project and is comprised of:

COORDINATING WITH REQUIRED SUBCONSULTANTS

Consultant will coordinate the activities and deliverables of subconsultants needed to complete the project such as topographic, planimetric and boundary surveys, and geotechnical investigations.

PREPARE PRELIMINARY DESIGN SUBMITTALS

Consultant will complete a project layout sheet that will depict the proposed improvements. Where relevant, the Consultant will provide exhibits showing design alternatives for the County to review and determine a preferred alternative. Consultant will conduct a preliminary design review meeting with the County to go over project scope of work, design alternatives, and discuss schedule for upcoming submittals.

PREPARE PRELIMINARY COST ESTIMATE AND REPORT

The Consultant will calculate necessary quantities for the various work items. Quantities will be consistent with the specifications and acceptable quantity calculation practices. The Consultant will provide a preliminary cost estimate based on record cost data and similar work. Cost estimate shall be included in the Preliminary Design Report.

PREPARE PLANS

Plan sheets will be prepared depicting the proposed improvements as indicated under the specific project description. The number and content of the drawings will be determined during the design phase. The number of submittals will be separately determined for each project.

PREPARE SPECIFICATIONS

The Consultant will assemble the specifications and bid documents for County to use in obtaining competitive bids for the work. All documents shall meet current FAA Standards for AIP funded projects. The number of submittals will be determined for each project separately.

PREPARE FINAL PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

A final set of plans, specifications, and contract documents will be prepared that will incorporate revisions, modifications, and corrections determined during the FAA and County's review of the ninety-five percent submittal. In addition, the typical project will require the preparation of an Engineer's Design Report and the preparation and filing of a Construction Safety and Phasing Plan with the FAA.

Phase 3 Bid Administration

This phase involves those activities required to bid a project. Specific services to be provided will be determine for each individual project. Typical services include preparing the advertisement for bids, bid document distribution, conducting a pre-bid conference, responding to bidder's questions and preparing

and distributing addenda, performing bid review and preparing a bid tabulation, and preparing a recommendation for reward.

For Project Construction, the scope of work is broken down into four phases.

- Phase 1 Pre-Construction Services
- Phase 2 Construction Administration
- Phase 3 Construction Observation and Material Testing
- Phase 4 Post Construction Services

These phases are further described as follows:

Phase 1 Pre-Construction Services

Pre-construction services typically include arranging and conducting a pre-construction conference, review contractor's Safety Plan Compliance Document, prepare Construction Management Plan, update construction documents to include any addenda, confirm contractor has submitted required DBE information to meet goals and provided the necessary proof of insurance and bonds, and to coordinate and schedule subconsultants necessary for the project work.

Phase 2 Construction Administration

Construction Administration Services required for the execution of the contracted work include reviewing shop drawings and submittals, review quality control testing performed by the contractor, supervise and coordinate subconsultant contracts for field observations and testing, attend weekly progress meetings, review pay estimates and payroll reports, process change orders as needed, and meet with Sponsor as needed.

Phase 3 Construction Observation and Material Testing

This task includes construction observation, material testing during construction, on-site construction coordination of the Consultant's staff for the duration of the project, provide an on-site Construction Observer to coordinate and schedule Consultant's staff, answer questions, observe quality control activities, and record as-built changes and report non-compliance issues to the Sponsor.

Phase 4 Post Construction Services

Services include scheduling and conducting a final inspection with the Sponsor, Contractor, and FAA representatives to determine whether the project has reached substantial completion and verify that the work is in accordance with the Plans and Specifications, prepare a punch list of deficient items discovered throughout the course of the project and during the final inspection, assemble the project Record

Drawings collaboratively with the contractor and any subcontractors, and prepare the Final Construction Report.

Standard Billing Rate Schedule

Mead & Hunt's current "Western Standard Billing Rate Schedule" is attached for reference and is valid through December 31, 2017.

EXHIBIT B

BUDGET DETAIL AND PAYMENT PROVISIONS

Upon initiation of an Adjusted Services Authorization (ASA) /Work Order approved by the County, compensation shall be for a total not to exceed the amount in each ASA / Work Order according to the Fee Schedule including with this Exhibit B accrued on an hourly basis for task oriented work or by a separate negotiated fee for other work as mutually agreed upon by County and Consultant. The Fee Schedule for this Agreement shall be negotiated no more frequently than on a yearly basis.

No compensation shall be due without prior authorization and a properly executed ASA / Work Order. Upon submission of an invoice by Consultant, and upon approval of County's representative, County shall pay Consultant monthly in arrears for fees and expenses incurred the prior month, up to the maximum amount provided for in each ASA / Work Order. Each invoice must specify services rendered, to whom, date of service and the accrued charges. Payment to Consultant by County shall be made within thirty (30) days after acceptance and approval of Consultant's itemized invoice.

Consultant's standard rate schedules will be valid through the term of this Agreement. Standard rates may be reviewed and negotiated on a yearly basis, no rate adjustment earlier than one year after start of contract. Consultant must submit a written request for adjustment to the County and state reason why rates need adjustment prior to the adjustment of rates.

Billing & Payment

Travel time is charged for work required to be performed out-of-office. A minimum of two hours will be billed for any work out-of-office.

Invoicing is on a monthly basis for work performed. Payment for services is due within 30 days from the date of the invoice. An interest charge of 1.5% per month is made on the unpaid balance starting 30 days after the date of invoice.

This schedule of billing rates is effective January 1, 2017, and will remain in effect until December 31, 2017, unless unforeseen increases in operational costs are encountered. We reserve the right to change rates to reflect such increases.

EXHIBIT C

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. CLOSING OUT

- A. County will pay Contractor's final request for payment providing Contractor has paid all financial obligations undertaken pursuant to this Contract or any other contract and/or obligation that Contractor may have with the County. If Contractor has failed to pay all obligations outstanding, County will withhold from Contractor's final request for payment the amount of such outstanding financial obligations owed by Contractor. Contractor is responsible for County's receipt of a final request for payment 30 days after termination of this Contract.
- B. A final undisputed invoice shall be submitted for payment no later than ninety (90) calendar days following the expiration or termination of this Contract, unless a later or alternate deadline is agreed to in writing by the County. The final invoice must be clearly marked "FINAL INVOICE", thus indicating that all payment obligations of the County under this Contract have ceased and that no further payments are due or outstanding.
- C. The County may, at its discretion, choose not to honor any delinquent final invoice if the Contractor fails to obtain prior written approval of an alternate final invoice submission deadline. Written County approval shall be sought from the County prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract.

2. TIME

Time is of the essence in all terms and conditions of this Contract.

3. TIME OF PERFORMANCE

Work will not begin, nor claims paid for services under this Contract until all Certificates of Insurance, business and professional licenses/certificates, IRS ID number, signed W-9 form, or other applicable licenses or certificates are on file with the County's Contract Manager.

4. TERMINATION

- A. This Contract may be terminated by County or Contractor, at any time, with or without cause, upon 30 days written notice from one to the other.
 - B. County may terminate this Contract immediately upon notice of Contractor's malfeasance.
- C. Following termination, County will reimburse Contractor for all expenditures made in good faith that are unpaid at the time of termination not to exceed the maximum amount payable under this Contract unless Contractor is in default of this Contract.

5. SIGNATURE AUTHORITY

The parties executing this Contract certify that they have the proper authority to bind their respective entities to all terms and conditions set forth in this Contract.

6. REPRESENTATIONS

A. County relies upon Contractor's professional ability and training as a material inducement to enter into this Contract. Contractor represents that Contractor will perform the work according to generally accepted professional practices and standards and the requirements of applicable federal, state and local laws. County's acceptance of Contractor's work shall not constitute a waiver or release of Contractor from professional responsibility.

B. Contractor further represents that Contractor possesses current valid appropriate licensure, including, but not limited to, driver's license, professional license, certificate of tax-exempt status, or permits, required to perform the work under this Contract.

7. INSURANCE

A. Without limiting Contractor's obligation to indemnify County, Contractor must procure and maintain for the duration of the Contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work under this Contract and the results of that work by Contractor, Contractor's agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

B. Minimum Scope of Insurance Coverage must be at least as broad as:

(1) Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence Form CG

00 01).

(2) Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 00 01 covering Automobile Liability, code1

(any auto).

(3) Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California and Employer's Liability Insurance.

C. Minimum Limits of Insurance Contractor must maintain limits no less than:

(1) General Liability:

\$1,000,000

(Including operations, products and completed operations.)

per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage, or the full per occurrence limits of the policy, whichever is greater. If Commercial General Liability insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

(2) Automobile Liability:

\$1,000,000

per accident for bodily injury and property

damage.

(3) Workers' Compensation:

As required by the State of California.

(4) Employer's Liability:

\$1,000,000

per accident for bodily injury or disease.

D. Additional Insurance Coverage

To the extent coverage is applicable to Contractor's services under this Contract, Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage:

(1) Cyber Liability:

\$1,000,000

per incident with the aggregate limit twice the

required limit.

(2) Professional Liability:

\$1,000,000

combined single limit per claim and in the aggregate. The policy shall remain in full force and effect for no less than 3 years following the completion of work under this Contract.

E. If Contractor maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, County is entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by Contractor.

F. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by County. At the option of County, either:

- (1) The insurer will reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to County, its officers, officials, agents, employees and volunteers; or
- (2) Contractor must provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to County guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.

G. Other Insurance Provisions

The general liability and automobile liability policies must contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

- (1) The County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers must be included as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by or on behalf of Contractor; and with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Contractor including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General Liability coverage shall be provided in the form of an Additional Insured endorsement (CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 if later ISO revisions are used or the equivalent) to Contractor's insurance policy, or as a separate owner's policy. The insurance afforded to the additional insureds shall be at least as broad as that afforded to the first named insured.
- (2) For any claims related to work performed under this Contract, Contractor's insurance coverage must be primary insurance with respect to the County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by County, its officers, officials, agents, employees, or volunteers is excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute to it.
- (3) Should any of the above described policies be cancelled prior to the policies' expiration date, Contractor agrees that notice of cancellation will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions.

H. Waiver of Subrogation

- (1) Contractor agrees to waive subrogation which any insurer of Contractor may acquire from Contractor by virtue of the payment of any loss. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation.
- (2) The Workers' Compensation policy must be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of County for all work performed by Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII unless otherwise acceptable to County.

J. Verification of Coverage

- (1) Contractor must furnish County with original certificates and endorsements effecting coverage required by this Contract.
- (2) The endorsements should be on forms provided by County or, if on other than County's forms, must conform to County's requirements and be acceptable to County.
- (3) County must receive and approve all certificates and endorsements before work commences.
 - (4) However, failure to do so shall not operate as a waiver of these insurance requirements.
- (5) County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage described above at any time.

8. Best Efforts

In the performance of these services, the Contractor, its employees, officers, and directors shall exercise the degree of skill and care required by customarily accepted professional engineering, architecture and technical practices and procedures. If, in the opinion of the County, the Contractor, its employees, officers, or directors should fail to meet the standards specified in the preceding sentence, their obligation and liability to the County shall include the Contractor re-performing, at its own expense and without reimbursement by the County of any of its services which do not conform to the specified standard.

9. DEFAULT

- A. If Contractor defaults in Contractor's performance, County shall promptly notify Contractor in writing. If Contractor fails to cure a default within 30 days after notification, or if the default requires more than 30 days to cure and Contractor fails to commence to cure the default within 30 days after notification, then Contractor's failure shall terminate this Contract.
- B. If Contractor fails to cure default within the specified period of time, County may elect to cure the default and any expense incurred shall be payable by Contractor to County.
- C. If County serves Contractor with a notice of default and Contractor fails to cure the default, Contractor waives any further notice of termination of this Contract.
- D. If this Contract is terminated because of Contractor's default, County shall be entitled to recover from Contractor all damages allowed by law.

10. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Contractor will indemnify, hold harmless and assume the defense of the County of Solano, its officers, employees, agents and elective and appointive boards from all claims, losses, damages, including property damages, personal injury, death and liability of every kind, directly or indirectly arising from Contractor's or from any persons directly or indirectly employed by, or acting as agent for, Contractor, negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct, excepting the negligence or willful misconduct of the County of Solano. This indemnification shall extend to claims, losses, damages, injury and liability for injuries occurring after completion of Contractor's services, as well as during the progress of rendering such services.
- B. Acceptance of insurance required by this Contract does not relieve Contractor from liability under this indemnification clause. This indemnification clause shall apply to all damages or claims for damages suffered by Contractor's operations regardless if any insurance is applicable or not.

11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent, officer or employee of County. The parties mutually understand that this Contract is between two independent contractors and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association.
- B. Contractor shall have no claim against County for employee rights or benefits including, but not limited to, seniority, vacation time, vacation pay, sick leave, personal time off, overtime, medical, dental or hospital benefits, retirement benefits, Social Security, disability, Workers' Compensation, unemployment insurance benefits, civil service protection, disability retirement benefits, paid holidays or other paid leaves of absence.
- C. Contractor is solely obligated to pay all applicable taxes, deductions and other obligations including, but not limited to, federal and state income taxes, withholding, Social Security, unemployment, disability insurance, Workers' Compensation and Medicare payments.
- D. Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any liability which County may incur because of Contractor's failure to pay such obligations nor shall County be responsible for any employer-related costs not otherwise agreed to in advance between the County and Contractor.
- E. As an independent contractor, Contractor is not subject to the direction and control of County except as to the final result contracted for under this Contract. County may not require Contractor to change Contractor's manner of doing business, but may require redirection of efforts to fulfill this Contract.
- F. Contractor may provide services to others during the same period Contractor provides service to County under this Contract.
- G. Any third persons employed by Contractor shall be under Contractor's exclusive direction, supervision and control. Contractor shall determine all conditions of employment including hours, wages, working conditions, discipline, hiring and discharging or any other condition of employment.

- H. As an independent contractor, Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any claims that may be made against County based on any contention by a third party that an employer-employee relationship exists under this Contract.
- I. Contractor, with full knowledge and understanding of the foregoing, freely, knowingly, willingly and voluntarily waives the right to assert any claim to any right or benefit or term or condition of employment insofar as they may be related to or arise from compensation paid hereunder.

12. RESPONSIBILITIES OF CONTRACTOR

- A. The parties understand and agree that Contractor possesses the requisite skills necessary to perform the work under this Contract and County relies upon such skills. Contractor pledges to perform the work skillfully and professionally. County's acceptance of Contractor's work does not constitute a release of Contractor from professional responsibility.
- B. Contractor verifies that Contractor has reviewed the scope of work to be performed under this Contract and agrees that in Contractor's professional judgment, the work can and shall be completed for costs within the maximum amount set forth in this Contract.
 - C. To fully comply with the terms and conditions of this Contract, Contractor shall:
- (1) Establish and maintain a system of accounts for budgeted funds that complies with generally accepted accounting principles for government agencies;
- (2) Document all costs by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions associated with this Contract, including, but not limited to, invoices and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract;
- (3) Submit monthly reimbursement claims for expenditures that directly benefit Solano County;
- (4) Be liable for repayment of any disallowed costs identified through quarterly reports, audits, monitoring or other sources; and
- (5) Retain financial, programmatic, client data and other service records for 3 years from the date of the end of the contract award or for 3 years from the date of termination, whichever is later.

13. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

- A. Contractor shall comply with all federal, state and local laws and regulations applicable to Contractor's performance, including, but not limited to, licensing, employment and purchasing practices, wages, hours and conditions of employment.
- B. Contractor represents that it will comply with the applicable cost principles and administrative requirements including claims for payment or reimbursement by County as set forth in 2 CFR 200, as currently enacted or as may be amended throughout the term of this Contract.

14. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. Contractor shall prevent unauthorized disclosure of names and other client-identifying information, except for statistical information not identifying a particular client.
- B. Contractor shall not use client specific information for any purpose other than carrying out Contractor's obligations under this Contract.
 - C. Contractor shall promptly transmit to County all requests for disclosure of confidential information.
- D. Except as otherwise permitted by this Contract or authorized by the client, Contractor shall not disclose any confidential information to anyone other than the State of California without prior written authorization from County.

E. For purposes of this section, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol or other client identifying particulars, such as fingerprints, voice print or photograph. Client shall include individuals receiving services pursuant to this Contract.

15. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. Contractor represents that Contractor and/or Contractor's employees and/or their immediate families and/or Board of Directors and/or officers have no interest, including, but not limited to, other projects or independent contracts, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, including separate contracts for the work to be performed hereunder, which conflicts with the rendering of services under this Contract. Contractor shall employ or retain no such person while rendering services under this Contract. Services rendered by Contractor's associates or employees shall not relieve Contractor from personal responsibility under this clause.
- B. Contractor has an affirmative duty to disclose to County in writing the name(s) of any person(s) who have an actual, potential or apparent conflict of interest.

16. DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of Government Code section 8350 et seq., regarding a drug free workplace and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

17. HEALTH AND SAFETY STANDARDS

Contractor shall abide by all health and safety standards set forth by the State of California and/or the County of Solano pursuant to the Injury and Illness Prevention Program. If applicable, Contractor must receive all health and safety information and training from County.

18. CHILD/ADULT ABUSE

If services pursuant to this Contract will be provided to children and/or elder adults, Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act (Penal Code section 11164 et seq.) and the Elder Abuse and Dependent Adult Civil Protection Act (Welfare and Institutions Code section 15600 et seq.) requiring reporting of suspected abuse.

19. INSPECTION

Authorized representatives of County, the State of California and/or the federal government may inspect and/or audit Contractor's performance, place of business and/or records pertaining to this Contract.

20. NONDISCRIMINATION

- A. In rendering services under this Contract, Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations and shall not discriminate based on age, ancestry, color, gender, marital status, medical condition, national origin, physical or mental disability, race, religion, sexual orientation, or other protected status.
- B. Further, Contractor shall not discriminate against its employees, which includes, but is not limited to, employment upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

21. SUBCONTRACTOR AND ASSIGNMENT

A. Services under this Contract are deemed to be personal services.

- B. Contractor shall not subcontract any work under this Contract nor assign this Contract or monies due without the prior written consent of the County's Contract Manager, the County's applicable Department Head or his or her designee and the County Administrator subject to any required state or federal approval.
- C. If County consents to the use of subcontractors, Contractor shall require and verify that its subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated in Section 7 above.
 - D. Assignment by Contractor of any monies due shall not constitute an assignment of the Contract.

22. UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES

Contractor is not responsible for any delay caused by natural disaster, war, civil disturbance, labor dispute or other cause beyond Contractor's reasonable control, provided Contractor gives written notice to County of the cause of the delay within 10 days of the start of the delay.

23. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- A. County shall be the owner of and shall be entitled to possession of any computations, plans, correspondence or other pertinent data and information gathered by or computed by Contractor prior to termination of this Contract by County or upon completion of the work pursuant to this Contract.
- B. No material prepared in connection with the project shall be subject to copyright in the United States or in any other country.

24. NOTICE

- A. Any notice necessary to the performance of this Contract shall be given in writing by personal delivery or by prepaid first-class mail addressed as stated on the first page of this Contract.
- B. If notice is given by personal delivery, notice is effective as of the date of personal delivery. If notice is given by mail, notice is effective as of the day following the date of mailing or the date of delivery reflected upon a return receipt, whichever occurs first.

25. NONRENEWAL

Contractor acknowledges that there is no guarantee that County will renew Contractor's services under a new contract following expiration or termination of this Contract. Contractor waives all rights to notice of non-renewal of Contractor's services.

26. COUNTY'S OBLIGATION SUBJECT TO AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

- A. The County's obligation under this Contract is subject to the availability of authorized funds. The County may terminate the Contract, or any part of the Contract work, without prejudice to any right or remedy of the County, for lack of appropriation of funds. If expected or actual funding is withdrawn, reduced or limited in any way prior to the expiration date set forth in this Contract, or any subsequent amendment, the County may, upon written Notice to the Contractor, terminate this Contract in whole or in part.
- B. Payment shall not exceed the amount allowable for appropriation by the Board of Supervisors. If the Contract is terminated for non-appropriation of funds:
- i. The County will be liable only for payment in accordance with the terms of this Contract for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination; and
- ii. The Contractor shall be released from any obligation to provide further services pursuant to this Contract that are affected by the termination.
- C. Funding for this Contract beyond the current appropriation year is conditional upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors of sufficient funds to support the activities described in this Contract. Should such an

appropriation not be approved, this Contract will terminate at the close of the current Appropriation Year.

- D. This Contract is void and unenforceable if all or parts of federal or state funds applicable to this Contract are not available to County. If applicable funding is reduced, County may either:
 - (1) Cancel this Contract; or,
 - (2) Offer a contract amendment reflecting the reduced funding.

27. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

- A. County may request changes in Contractor's scope of services. Any mutually agreed upon changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of Contractor's compensation, shall be effective when incorporated in written amendments to this Contract.
- B. The party desiring the revision shall request amendments to the terms and conditions of this Contract in writing. Any adjustment to this Contract shall be effective only upon the parties' mutual execution of an amendment in writing.
- C. No verbal agreements or conversations prior to execution of this Contract or requested amendment shall affect or modify any of the terms or conditions of this Contract unless reduced to writing according to the applicable provisions of this Contract.

28. CHOICE OF LAW

The parties have executed and delivered this Contract in the County of Solano, State of California. The laws of the State of California shall govern the validity, enforceability or interpretation of this Contract. Solano County shall be the venue for any action or proceeding, in law or equity that may be brought in connection with this Contract.

29. HEALTH INSURANCE PORTABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT

Contractor represents that it is knowledgeable of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA") and its implementing regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (45 C.F.R. parts 160-64) regarding the protection of health information obtained, created, or exchanged as a result of this Contract and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

30. WAIVER

Any failure of a party to assert any right under this Contract shall not constitute a waiver or a termination of that right, under this Contract or any of its provisions.

31. CONFLICTS IN THE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

The Contract documents are intended to be complementary and interpreted in harmony so as to avoid conflict. In the event of conflict in the Contract documents, the parties agree that the document providing the highest quality and level of service to the County shall supersede any inconsistent term in these documents.

32. FAITH BASED ORGANIZATIONS

- A. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that County may make funds available for programs or services affiliated with religious organizations under the following conditions: (a) the funds are made available on an equal basis as for programs or services affiliated with non-religious organizations; (b) the program funded does not have the substantial effect of supporting religious activities; (c) the funding is indirect, remote, or incidental to the religious purpose of the organization; and (d) the organization complies with the terms and conditions of this Contract.
- B. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that County may not make funds available for programs or services affiliated with a religious organization (a) that has denied or continues to deny access to services on the

basis of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, citizenship, or known disability; (b) will use the funds for a religious purpose; (c) will use the funds for a program or service that subjects its participants to religious education.

C. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that all recipients of funding from County must: (a) comply with all legal requirements and restrictions imposed upon government-funded activities set forth in Article IX, section 8 and Article XVI, section 5 of the California Constitution and in the First Amendment to the United States Constitution; and (b) segregate such funding from all funding used for religious purposes.

33. PRICING

Should Contractor, at any time during the term of this Contract, provide the same goods or services under similar quantity, terms and conditions to one or more counties in the State of California at prices below those set forth in this Contract, then the parties agree to amend this Contract so that such lower prices shall be extended immediately to County for all future services.

34. USE OF PROVISIONS, TERMS, CONDITIONS AND PRICING BY OTHER PUBLIC AGENCIES

Contractor and County agree that the terms of this Contract may be extended to any other public agency located in the State of California, as provided for in this section. Another public agency wishing to use the provisions, terms, and pricing of this Contract to contract for equipment and services comparable to that described in this Contract shall be responsible for entering into its own contract with Contractor, as well as providing for its own payment provisions, making all payments, and obtaining any certificates of insurance and bonds that may be required. County is not responsible for providing to any other public agency any documentation relating this Contract or its implementation. Any public agency that uses provisions, terms, or pricing of this Contract shall by virtue of doing so be deemed to indemnify and hold harmless County from all claims, demands, or causes of actions of every kind arising directly or indirectly with the use of this Contract. County makes no guarantee of usage by other users of this Contract nor shall the County incur any financial responsibility in connection with any contracts entered into by another public agency. Such other public agency shall accept sole responsibility for placing orders and making payments to Contractor.

35. DISBARMENT OR SUSPENSION OF CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor represents that its officers, directors and employees (i) are not currently excluded, debarred, or otherwise ineligible to participate in the federal health programs as defined in 42 USC § 1320a-7b(f) (the "Federal Healthcare Programs") or any state healthcare programs; (ii) have not been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of healthcare items or services but or previously excluded, debarred, or otherwise declared ineligible to participate in the Federal Healthcare Programs or any state healthcare programs, and (iii) are not, to the best of its knowledge, under investigation or otherwise aware of any circumstances which may result in Contractor being excluded from participation in the Federal Healthcare Programs or any state healthcare programs.
- B. This representation and warranty shall be an ongoing representation and warranty during the term of this Contract and Contractor must immediately notify the County of any change in the status of the representation and warranty set forth in this section.
- C. If services pursuant to this Contract involve healthcare programs, Contractor agrees to provide certification of non-suspension with submission of each invoice. Failure to submit certification with invoices will result in a delay in County processing of Contractor's payment.

36. EXECUTION IN COUNTERPARTS

This Contract may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which together shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument, it being understood that all parties need not sign the same counterpart. In the event that any signature is delivered by facsimile or electronic transmission (e.g., by e-mail delivery of a ".pdf" format data file), such signature shall create a valid and binding obligation of the party executing (or on whose behalf such signature is executed) with the same force and effect as if such facsimile or electronic signature page were an original signature.

37. LOCAL EMPLOYMENT POLICY

Solano County desires, whenever possible, to hire qualified local residents to work on County projects. A local resident is defined as a person who resides in, or a business that is located in, Solano County. The County encourages an active outreach program on the part of its contractors, consultants and agents. When local projects require subcontractors, Contractor shall solicit proposals for qualified local residents where possible.

38. ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Contract, including any exhibits referenced, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and there are no inducements, promises, terms, conditions or obligations made or entered into by County or Contractor other than those contained in it.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

The Department of Health and Social Services (H&SS) recommends the Board adopt a resolution recognizing November as In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) Home Care Workers Month in Solano County.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

H&SS joins the National Association of Home Care & Hospice to recognize November as In-Home Supportive Services Home Care Workers Month to honor the millions of home care workers for the remarkable difference made in assisting the elderly and disabled to live safely and with dignity in their own homes. As individuals age, activities of daily living, household maintenance, managing medical care, and maintaining a healthy lifestyle can all become challenging. For more than thirty years Solano County, in partnership with the State of California and the Federal government, has addressed the needs of low-income seniors and people with disabilities by providing them with assistance which allows them to remain in their homes through the In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program. IHSS allows families to keep their loved ones close in a familiar environment to maintain a higher quality of life and the home care providers who make this possible are dedicated and committed to serving their clients and the community with sensitivity, honesty, patience, trust, and compassion.

Solano County has approximately 4,100 IHSS home care providers who care for approximately 4,770 clients. As the elderly population grows throughout Solano County, the demand for home care workers, both within the IHSS program and within private pay systems, is expected to increase.

Without the assistance of IHSS home care workers, the cost of caring for a person in a facility outside the home would be more than \$7,000 per month versus the average cost of \$1,450 per month per client that the IHSS program costs locally. For all of these reasons and more, Solano County would like to recognize the outstanding work that home care workers provide to some of the most vulnerable members of our community.

The resolution will be presented at the November 20, 2017 IHSS Advisory Committee meeting.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

The Department of Health & Social Services (H&SS) recommends that the Board approve a contract with Deloris Roach for \$54,800 to provide coordination and support activities for the Senior Coalition of Solano County (SCSC) for the period beginning October 24, 2017 through June 30, 2018; and Authorize the County Administrator to execute the contract.

SUMMARY:

On May 9, 2006, the Senior Coalition of Solano County (SCSC) was established by the Board as a means for communicating and helping to address aging and senior issues. The Senior Coalition provides a partnership with the impact to raise awareness, provide education, and support efforts that improve and enrich the lives of seniors living and working in Solano County. This partnership provides a framework to engage key decision makers at the local government level.

This contract with Deloris Roach for \$54,800 for the period October 24, 2017 through June 30, 2018 will fill the coordinator position for the Senior Coalition which includes responsibilities of directing activities with members of the community and with agencies and organizations serving the local senior population. Additionally, Ms. Roach will coordinate efforts in the development of an annual SCSC work plan.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The proposed contract is for October 24, 2017 through June 30, 2018. The proposed cost is \$54,800 and is included in the Department's FY2016/17 Approved Budget. There is no additional financial impact to the General Fund.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>:

The Senior Coalition serves a critical need in Solano County. As the population ages, the County and

providers are finding ways to meet the growing need for services and the need for information.

A primary purpose of the Senior Coalition is to coordinate efforts designed to improve and enrich the lives of seniors in Solano County. The Senior Coalition has promoted awareness of issues affecting seniors through such programs as Savvy Saving Seniors. Savvy Saving Seniors was developed by the National Council on Aging. This financial education tool includes basic money management, steps to avoid scams, and tips and ideas on how to use, manage and protect debit cards. In fiscal year FY2016/17, the Senior Coalition held seven Savvy Saving Senior events.

Additionally, in FY2016/17 the Senior Coalition hosted a free, mini-medical school series called "Aging with Vitality." This four-day series focused on helping older adults embrace the dynamic nature of aging. Topics included: keeping your heart healthy; recognizing the risks of stroke and how to prevent them; maintaining healthy bones, joints and muscles; minimizing the risks of chronic diseases; medication management; hearing loss; and, end of life legal and medical considerations. The Senior Coalition also reviewed and updated its strategic plan for addressing the needs of seniors; collaborated with the Senior Poverty Working Group; began to implement a Bridging Opportunities initiative working with the Cities in Solano County; and helped to coordinate and present multiple educational events and forums targeting seniors, including the 2016 Centenarians event.

For FY2017/18, and under the direction of the Senior Coalition Executive Committee (SCEC), Ms. Roach will address activities related to the SCSC's strategic priorities, provide evaluation reports, and copies of work plans with associated timelines and meeting materials. Ms. Roach will coordinate and support initiatives and the mission of SCSC to outreach to underrepresented community groups and individuals such as African Americans, Filipino Americans, Latin Americans and the LGBTQ community.

Ms. Roach is able to effectively assist the SCEC using her skills in coordination and collaboration as well as her ability to develop and maintain community partnerships and has a proven history of helping to address senior and aging needs of the community.

ALTERNATIVES:

The Board may choose not to approve this contract with Deloris Roach. This is not recommended as Ms. Roach was selected by the Senior Coalition Executive Committee (SCEC) and represents SCSC's need to raise awareness and education for the County's aging population.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

County Counsel has reviewed the contract for legal sufficiency.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

1. WORK ACTIVITIES

Under the direction of the Senior Coalition Executive Committee (SCEC) and the Senior Coalition of Solano County (SCSC) Contractor will:

- A. Coordinate to implement the SCSC strategic plan. Review SCSC strategic plan annually with the SCEC and SCSC members. Provide a copy of planning meeting agendas with dates and times.
- B. Coordinate the efforts in the development of an annual SCSC work plan. The work plan will address activities related to the SCSC strategic priorities such as the Senior Poverty Working Group (SPWG), Savvy Saving Seniors educational program, Bridging Opportunities initiative, educational events/forums, and awareness month events/activities. Provide evaluation reports, copies of the work plans, timelines, meeting agendas with dates and times.
- C. Coordinate and support activities and initiatives of the SCSC. Coordinate and support activities and initiatives including but not be limited to: SPWG, Savvy Saving Seniors educational program, Bridging Opportunities initiative and other related activities. Coordinate and support up to four SPWG meetings per year. Coordinate and support the Bridging Opportunities initiative work plan in at least one city. Provide evaluation reports of activities and initiatives including meeting dates, times, agendas and minutes.
- D. Support the SCEC Chairperson and the SCEC in the development of SCSC meeting agendas. In conjunction with the SCSC Chairperson plan, prepare, and convene the existing monthly meetings. Ensure a minimum of six SCSC meetings are held. Provide meeting dates and time, agendas and minutes for each meeting.
- E. Coordinate and support SCSC Task Forces/Committees in conjunction with the committee chairpersons. Provide attendance sheets, agendas and minutes for each meeting attended.
- F. Further the SCSC's activities and mission to outreach to community groups and individuals including underrepresented groups such as African Americans, Filipino Americans, Latin Americans, and the LGBTQ community. Support the SCEC and SCSC members to engage community groups and individuals to become members and partners of the SCSC or its work groups. Provide agendas with dates and times and minutes/attendance of individual and group meetings.
- G. Prepare, promote and implement awareness month/week/day event/activities to include but not be limited to: May Older American's Month, June Elder Abuse Awareness Day/Elder Abuse Awareness Month activities, and September Fall Prevention. Provide draft proclamations and agenda submittals for Board of Supervisors (BOS) agenda items to County Contract Manager at least eight (8) weeks before BOS meeting dates. Proclamations to include but not limited to: May Older American's Month, June Elder Abuse Awareness Month, September Fall Prevention Week.
- H. Coordinate with SCSC to plan, develop and implement one educational event/forum. Provide meeting dates and time, attendance sheet, agendas and minutes for each meeting attended; a copy of event marketing plan and event flier.

County of Solano Standard Contract

- I. Coordinate with SCSC to plan and support community events in partnership with the SCSC membership. Provide meeting dates and time, attendance sheets (when available), agendas and minutes for each meeting attended.
- J. Conduct and/or participate in planning and/or collaborative meetings in conjunction with SCEC as needed. Provide meeting dates and time, attendance sheet, agendas and minutes for each meeting attended.
- K. Ensure that up to two (2) presentations are given on topics related to seniors, i.e. senior poverty, transportation, fall prevention, and other work of the Senior Coalition. Meetings may include Senior Roundtable meetings, Board of Supervisors meetings, and other community meetings related to seniors in Solano County. Provide meeting dates and time, agendas, minutes (if available) and presentation materials, if used, for each meeting attended.
- L. Coordinate marketing and branding efforts of the SCSC. Coordinate with webmaster to maintain SCSC website, social media platforms (i.e. Facebook), and materials. Provide screenshots, printout of website, logo and brochures to County Contract Manager for contract file. Provide meeting dates, attendance sheets, agendas and minutes for each meeting attended.
- M. Work with the County Contract Manager, and the SCEC to collaborate in monitoring contract, budget, evaluation and process issues related to the SCSC. In the event, that clarification on roles and responsibilities is required, the Contractor will address them with the SCEC and County Contract Manager.
- N. Provide a written annual report to the County Contract Manager on the activities of the SCSC no later than one hundred twenty (120) days after the close of the fiscal year.

1. BUDGET DETAILS

Contractor will be paid at the rate of \$52 per hour, for a maximum of 1,040 hours.

Contractor will be reimbursed for mileage based on the prevailing IRS reimbursement rate.. Form to report mileage will be provided by County Contract Manager.

Total amount of Contract not to exceed \$54,800.

2. METHOD OF PAYMENT

Upon submission of a Solano County vendor claim and invoice by Contractor, and upon review and approval of County's representative, County will pay Contractor monthly in arrears for fees and expenses incurred the prior month, or upon demonstrated completion of deliverables, as applicable, up to the maximum amount provided for on the Standard Contract. Each invoice must specify services rendered, to whom, date of service and the accrued charges. Contractor must document all expenses submitted to County for payment under this Contract by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions related to the services performed under this Contract including, but not limited to, invoices, receipts, time sheets, itemized cost lists, and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract.

3. ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

- A. Establish and maintain a system of accounts for budgeted funds that complies with generally accepted accounting principles and practices for not-for-profit organizations/governmental entities. Additionally, Contractor must submit claims for payment under this Contract using either a cost allocation method or a direct billing method.
- B. Contractor's cost allocation method must be supported by a cost allocation plan with a quantifiable methodology validating the basis for paying such expenditures. The cost allocation plan should be prepared within the guidelines set forth under 2 CFR (Code of Federal Regulation) part 225, "Cost Principles for State, Local, and Indian Tribal Governments (OMB Circular A-87).
- C. Charges submitted by Contractor based on a direct billing method must be supported by appropriate invoices that sufficiently document the expenditure.
- D. Document all costs by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions associated with this Contract, including, but not limited to, invoices, time studies, and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract.

4. PERSONAL PROPERTY

- A. Purchase of personal property using funds from this Contract must have prior written approval from the County, as follows:
 - i. Purchases of computer, software, and printers regardless of cost.
 - ii. Purchases of other personal property over \$1,500.

B. Contractor shall develop and maintain a system to track such tangible personal property and submit an annual accounting of all property purchased with County funds. Contractor shall ensure adequate safeguards are in place to protect such assets and shall exercise reasonable care over such assets to protect against theft, damage or unauthorized use. Contractor shall return such assets to the County upon Contract termination; unless the depreciated value of the asset is \$0, based on a straight-line method of depreciation (refer to 2 CFR part 225).

5. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND AUDITS

- A. Contractor agrees to furnish annual audited financial statements for the previous fiscal year to the County by November 30th.
- B. Contractor agrees to furnish all records and documents within a reasonable time, in the event that the County, state or federal government conducts an audit.

EXHIBIT C GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. CLOSING OUT

- A. County will pay Contractor's final request for payment providing Contractor has paid all financial obligations undertaken pursuant to this Contract or any other contract and/or obligation that Contractor may have with the County. If Contractor has failed to pay all obligations outstanding, County will withhold from Contractor's final request for payment the amount of such outstanding financial obligations owed by Contractor. Contractor is responsible for County's receipt of a final request for payment 30 days after termination of this Contract.
- B. A final undisputed invoice shall be submitted for payment no later than ninety (90) calendar days following the expiration or termination of this Contract, unless a later or alternate deadline is agreed to in writing by the County. The final invoice must be clearly marked "FINAL INVOICE", thus indicating that all payment obligations of the County under this Contract have ceased and that no further payments are due or outstanding.
- C. The County may, at its discretion, choose not to honor any delinquent final invoice if the Contractor fails to obtain prior written approval of an alternate final invoice submission deadline. Written County approval shall be sought from the County prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract.

2. TIME

Time is of the essence in all terms and conditions of this Contract.

3. TIME OF PERFORMANCE

Work will not begin, nor claims paid for services under this Contract until all Certificates of Insurance, business and professional licenses/certificates, IRS ID number, signed W-9 form, or other applicable licenses or certificates are on file with the County's Contract Manager.

4. TERMINATION

- A. This Contract may be terminated by County or Contractor, at any time, with or without cause, upon 30 days written notice from one to the other.
- B. County may terminate this Contract immediately upon notice of Contractor's malfeasance.
- C. Following termination, County will reimburse Contractor for all expenditures made in good faith that are unpaid at the time of termination not to exceed the maximum amount payable under this Contract unless Contractor is in default of this Contract.

5. SIGNATURE AUTHORITY

The parties executing this Contract certify that they have the proper authority to bind their respective entities to all terms and conditions set forth in this Contract.

6. REPRESENTATIONS

A. County relies upon Contractor's professional ability and training as a material inducement to enter into this Contract. Contractor represents that Contractor will perform the work according to generally accepted professional practices and standards and the requirements of applicable federal, state and local laws. County's acceptance of Contractor's work shall not constitute a waiver or release of Contractor from professional responsibility.

B. Contractor further represents that Contractor possesses current valid appropriate licensure, including, but not limited to, driver's license, professional license, certificate of tax-exempt status, or permits, required to perform the work under this Contract.

7. INSURANCE

- A. Without limiting Contractor's obligation to indemnify County, Contractor must procure and maintain for the duration of the Contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work under this Contract and the results of that work by Contractor, Contractor's agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.
- B. Minimum Scope of Insurance Coverage must be at least as broad as:
- (1) Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence Form CG 00 01).
- (2) Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 00 01 covering Automobile Liability, code1 (any auto).
- (3) Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California and Employer's Liability Insurance.
 - C. Minimum Limits of Insurance Contractor must maintain limits no less than:

(1) General Liability: (Including operations, products and completed operations.) per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage, or the full per occurrence limits of the policy, whichever is greater. If Commercial General Liability insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

(2) Automobile Liability:

\$300,000

\$1,000,000

per accident for bodily injury and property

damage.

(3) Workers' Compensation:

As required by the State of California.

(4) Employer's Liability:

\$1,000,000

per accident for bodily injury or disease.

D. Additional Insurance Coverage

To the extent coverage is applicable to Contractor's services under this Contract, Contractor must maintain the following insurance coverage:

(1) Cyber Liability:

\$1,000,000

per incident with the aggregate limit twice the required limit.

(2) Professional Liability:

\$1,000,000

combined single limit per claim and in the aggregate. The policy shall remain in full force and effect for no less than 3 years following the completion of work under this Contract.

County of Solano Standard Contract

- E. If Contractor maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, County is entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by Contractor.
 - F. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by County. At the option of County, either:

- (1) The insurer will reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to County, its officers, officials, agents, employees and volunteers; or
- (2) Contractor must provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to County guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.

G. Other Insurance Provisions

The general liability and automobile liability policies must contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

- (1) The County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers must be included as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by or on behalf of Contractor; and with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Contractor including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General Liability coverage shall be provided in the form of an Additional Insured endorsement (CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 if later ISO revisions are used or the equivalent) to Contractor's insurance policy, or as a separate owner's policy. The insurance afforded to the additional insureds shall be at least as broad as that afforded to the first named insured.
- (2) For any claims related to work performed under this Contract, Contractor's insurance coverage must be primary insurance with respect to the County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by County, its officers, officials, agents, employees, or volunteers is excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute to it.
- (3) Should any of the above described policies be cancelled prior to the policies' expiration date, Contractor agrees that notice of cancellation will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions.

H. Waiver of Subrogation

- (1) Contractor agrees to waive subrogation which any insurer of Contractor may acquire from Contractor by virtue of the payment of any loss. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation.
- (2) The Workers' Compensation policy must be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of County for all work performed by Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

I. Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII unless otherwise acceptable to County.

J. Verification of Coverage

- (1) Contractor must furnish County with original certificates and endorsements effecting coverage required by this Contract.
- (2) The endorsements should be on forms provided by County or, if on other than County's forms, must conform to County's requirements and be acceptable to County.
- (3) County must receive and approve all certificates and endorsements before work commences.

- (4) However, failure to do so shall not operate as a waiver of these insurance requirements.
- (5) County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage described above at any time.

8. BEST EFFORTS

Contractor represents that Contractor will at all times faithfully, industriously and to the best of its ability, experience and talent, perform to County's reasonable satisfaction.

9. DEFAULT

- A. If Contractor defaults in Contractor's performance, County shall promptly notify Contractor in writing. If Contractor fails to cure a default within 30 days after notification, or if the default requires more than 30 days to cure and Contractor fails to commence to cure the default within 30 days after notification, then Contractor's failure shall terminate this Contract.
- B. If Contractor fails to cure default within the specified period of time, County may elect to cure the default and any expense incurred shall be payable by Contractor to County.
- C. If County serves Contractor with a notice of default and Contractor fails to cure the default, Contractor waives any further notice of termination of this Contract.
- D. If this Contract is terminated because of Contractor's default, County shall be entitled to recover from Contractor all damages allowed by law.

10. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Contractor will indemnify, hold harmless and assume the defense of the County of Solano, its officers, employees, agents and elective and appointive boards from all claims, losses, damages, including property damages, personal injury, death and liability of every kind, directly or indirectly arising from Contractor's operations or from any persons directly or indirectly employed by, or acting as agent for, Contractor, excepting the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County of Solano. This indemnification shall extend to claims, losses, damages, injury and liability for injuries occurring after completion of Contractor's services, as well as during the progress of rendering such services.
- B. Acceptance of insurance required by this Contract does not relieve Contractor from liability under this indemnification clause. This indemnification clause shall apply to all damages or claims for damages suffered by Contractor's operations regardless if any insurance is applicable or not.

11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent, officer or employee of County. The parties mutually understand that this Contract is between two independent contractors and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association.
- B. Contractor shall have no claim against County for employee rights or benefits including, but not limited to, seniority, vacation time, vacation pay, sick leave, personal time off, overtime, medical, dental or hospital benefits, retirement benefits, Social Security, disability, Workers' Compensation, unemployment insurance benefits, civil service protection, disability retirement benefits, paid holidays or other paid leaves of absence.
- C. Contractor is solely obligated to pay all applicable taxes, deductions and other obligations including, but not limited to, federal and state income taxes, withholding, Social Security, unemployment, disability insurance, Workers' Compensation and Medicare payments.

- D. Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any liability which County may incur because of Contractor's failure to pay such obligations nor shall County be responsible for any employer-related costs not otherwise agreed to in advance between the County and Contractor.
- E. As an independent contractor, Contractor is not subject to the direction and control of County except as to the final result contracted for under this Contract. County may not require Contractor to change Contractor's manner of doing business, but may require redirection of efforts to fulfill this Contract.
- F. Contractor may provide services to others during the same period Contractor provides service to County under this Contract.
- G. Any third persons employed by Contractor shall be under Contractor's exclusive direction, supervision and control. Contractor shall determine all conditions of employment including hours, wages, working conditions, discipline, hiring and discharging or any other condition of employment.
- H. As an independent contractor, Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any claims that may be made against County based on any contention by a third party that an employer-employee relationship exists under this Contract.
- I. Contractor, with full knowledge and understanding of the foregoing, freely, knowingly, willingly and voluntarily waives the right to assert any claim to any right or benefit or term or condition of employment insofar as they may be related to or arise from compensation paid hereunder.

12. RESPONSIBILITIES OF CONTRACTOR

- A. The parties understand and agree that Contractor possesses the requisite skills necessary to perform the work under this Contract and County relies upon such skills. Contractor pledges to perform the work skillfully and professionally. County's acceptance of Contractor's work does not constitute a release of Contractor from professional responsibility.
- B. Contractor verifies that Contractor has reviewed the scope of work to be performed under this Contract and agrees that in Contractor's professional judgment, the work can and shall be completed for costs within the maximum amount set forth in this Contract.
 - C. To fully comply with the terms and conditions of this Contract, Contractor shall:
- (1) Establish and maintain a system of accounts for budgeted funds that complies with generally accepted accounting principles for government agencies;
- (2) Document all costs by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions associated with this Contract, including, but not limited to, invoices and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract;
- (3) Submit monthly reimbursement claims for expenditures that directly benefit Solano County;
- (4) Be liable for repayment of any disallowed costs identified through quarterly reports, audits, monitoring or other sources; and
- (5) Retain financial, programmatic, client data and other service records for 3 years from the date of the end of the contract award or for 3 years from the date of termination, whichever is later.

13. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

- A. Contractor shall comply with all federal, state and local laws and regulations applicable to Contractor's performance, including, but not limited to, licensing, employment and purchasing practices, wages, hours and conditions of employment.
- B. Contractor represents that it will comply with the applicable cost principles and administrative requirements including claims for payment or reimbursement by County as set forth in 2 CFR 200, as currently enacted or as may be amended throughout the term of this Contract.

14. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. Contractor shall prevent unauthorized disclosure of names and other client-identifying information, except for statistical information not identifying a particular client.
- B. Contractor shall not use client specific information for any purpose other than carrying out Contractor's obligations under this Contract.
- C. Contractor shall promptly transmit to County all requests for disclosure of confidential information.
- D. Except as otherwise permitted by this Contract or authorized by the client, Contractor shall not disclose any confidential information to anyone other than the State of California without prior written authorization from County.
- E. For purposes of this section, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol or other client identifying particulars, such as fingerprints, voice print or photograph. Client shall include individuals receiving services pursuant to this Contract.

15. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. Contractor represents that Contractor and/or Contractor's employees and/or their immediate families and/or Board of Directors and/or officers have no interest, including, but not limited to, other projects or independent contracts, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, including separate contracts for the work to be performed hereunder, which conflicts with the rendering of services under this Contract. Contractor shall employ or retain no such person while rendering services under this Contract. Services rendered by Contractor's associates or employees shall not relieve Contractor from personal responsibility under this clause.
- B. Contractor has an affirmative duty to disclose to County in writing the name(s) of any person(s) who have an actual, potential or apparent conflict of interest.

16. DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of Government Code section 8350 et seq., regarding a drug free workplace and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

17. HEALTH AND SAFETY STANDARDS

Contractor shall abide by all health and safety standards set forth by the State of California and/or the County of Solano pursuant to the Injury and Illness Prevention Program. If applicable, Contractor must receive all health and safety information and training from County.

18. CHILD/ADULT ABUSE

If services pursuant to this Contract will be provided to children and/or elder adults, Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act (Penal Code section 11164 et seq.) and the Elder Abuse and Dependent Adult Civil Protection Act (Welfare and Institutions Code section 15600 et seq.) requiring reporting of suspected abuse.

19. INSPECTION

Authorized representatives of County, the State of California and/or the federal government may inspect and/or audit Contractor's performance, place of business and/or records pertaining to this Contract.

20. NONDISCRIMINATION

- A. In rendering services under this Contract, Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations and shall not discriminate based on age, ancestry, color, gender, marital status, medical condition, national origin, physical or mental disability, race, religion, sexual orientation, or other protected status.
- B. Further, Contractor shall not discriminate against its employees, which includes, but is not limited to, employment upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

21. SUBCONTRACTOR AND ASSIGNMENT

- A. Services under this Contract are deemed to be personal services.
- B. Contractor shall not subcontract any work under this Contract nor assign this Contract or monies due without the prior written consent of the County's Contract Manager, the County's applicable Department Head or his or her designee and the County Administrator subject to any required state or federal approval.
- C. If County consents to the use of subcontractors, Contractor shall require and verify that its subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated in Section 7 above.
- D. Assignment by Contractor of any monies due shall not constitute an assignment of the Contract.

22. UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES

Contractor is not responsible for any delay caused by natural disaster, war, civil disturbance, labor dispute or other cause beyond Contractor's reasonable control, provided Contractor gives written notice to County of the cause of the delay within 10 days of the start of the delay.

23. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- A. County shall be the owner of and shall be entitled to possession of any computations, plans, correspondence or other pertinent data and information gathered by or computed by Contractor prior to termination of this Contract by County or upon completion of the work pursuant to this Contract.
- B. No material prepared in connection with the project shall be subject to copyright in the United States or in any other country.

24. NOTICE

- A. Any notice necessary to the performance of this Contract shall be given in writing by personal delivery or by prepaid first-class mail addressed as stated on the first page of this Contract.
- B. If notice is given by personal delivery, notice is effective as of the date of personal delivery. If notice is given by mail, notice is effective as of the day following the date of mailing or the date of delivery reflected upon a return receipt, whichever occurs first.

25. Nonrenewal

Contractor acknowledges that there is no guarantee that County will renew Contractor's services under a new contract following expiration or termination of this Contract. Contractor waives all rights to notice of non-renewal of Contractor's services.

26. COUNTY'S OBLIGATION SUBJECT TO AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

- A. The County's obligation under this Contract is subject to the availability of authorized funds. The County may terminate the Contract, or any part of the Contract work, without prejudice to any right or remedy of the County, for lack of appropriation of funds. If expected or actual funding is withdrawn, reduced or limited in any way prior to the expiration date set forth in this Contract, or any subsequent amendment, the County may, upon written Notice to the Contractor, terminate this Contract in whole or in part.
- B. Payment shall not exceed the amount allowable for appropriation by the Board of Supervisors. If the Contract is terminated for non-appropriation of funds:
- i. The County will be liable only for payment in accordance with the terms of this Contract for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination; and
- ii. The Contractor shall be released from any obligation to provide further services pursuant to this Contract that are affected by the termination.
- C. Funding for this Contract beyond the current appropriation year is conditional upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors of sufficient funds to support the activities described in this Contract. Should such an appropriation not be approved, this Contract will terminate at the close of the current Appropriation Year.
- D. This Contract is void and unenforceable if all or parts of federal or state funds applicable to this Contract are not available to County. If applicable funding is reduced, County may either:
 - (1) Cancel this Contract; or,
 - (2) Offer a contract amendment reflecting the reduced funding.

27. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

- A. County may request changes in Contractor's scope of services. Any mutually agreed upon changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of Contractor's compensation, shall be effective when incorporated in written amendments to this Contract.
- B. The party desiring the revision shall request amendments to the terms and conditions of this Contract in writing. Any adjustment to this Contract shall be effective only upon the parties' mutual execution of an amendment in writing.
- C. No verbal agreements or conversations prior to execution of this Contract or requested amendment shall affect or modify any of the terms or conditions of this Contract unless reduced to writing according to the applicable provisions of this Contract.

28. CHOICE OF LAW

The parties have executed and delivered this Contract in the County of Solano, State of California. The laws of the State of California shall govern the validity, enforceability or interpretation of this Contract. Solano County shall be the venue for any action or proceeding, in law or equity that may be brought in connection with this Contract.

29. HEALTH INSURANCE PORTABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT

Contractor represents that it is knowledgeable of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA") and its implementing regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (45 C.F.R. parts 160-64) regarding the protection of health information obtained, created, or exchanged as a result of this Contract and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board approve the appointments of Warren Gomes, Jr., Gary Silva and Gerald Hearn as Trustees of Reclamation District No. 536 for terms to expire at noon on December 3, 2021.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

A reclamation district is governed by a board of trustees, composed of either landowners or their legal representatives in a district. A district is required to hold an election on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November in odd-numbered years and to solicit nominees for the trustee positions by publishing a notice in a local newspaper under Water Code sections 50730 and 50731.5, respectively. If no nominations are received, Water Code section 50741 mandates that the Board of Supervisors appoint any qualified person.

Reclamation District No. 536 ("District") published the Section 50731.5 notice. It received no nominations for the trustee positions. Accordingly, the District's Board of Trustees requests that the Board appoint the three incumbents, Warren Gomes, Jr., Gary Silva and Gerald Hearn as Trustees for terms to expire at noon on December 3, 2021.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no cost to the County involved in making these appointments.

ALTERNATIVES:

The Board could choose not to make this appointment. This option is not recommended as the proposed Trustees are qualified and no election is warranted.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors terminate the October 10, 2017 Local Emergency Proclamation signed by the County Administrator in response to the extreme peril to life and property resulting from wildfires, particularly the Atlas Peak Fire, which started on October 8, 2017 in Napa County and then spread to Solano County.

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

On October 10, 2017, Birgitta Corsello, County Administrator, issued a Proclamation of Local Emergency in response to the extreme peril to life and property resulting from wildfires, particularly the Atlas Peak Fire, which started on October 8, 2017 in Napa County and then spread to Solano County. On October 17, 2017, the Board of Supervisors confirmed and ratified the Proclamation of Local Emergency and orders of the County Administrator that a local emergency existed in Solano County.

Solano County requested a gubernatorial proclamation and a presidential declaration on October 10, 2017 and Governor Edmund G. Brown issued an emergency proclamation for the County on the same date.

The President of the United States issued an emergency declaration for the Atlas Peak Fire on October 10, 2017 which did not originally include Solano County. The federal declaration of emergency was amended on October 13, 2017 to add Solano County for "debris removal and emergency protective measures (categories A and B), including direct federal assistance, under the Public Assistance program."

As of October 31, 2017, the County's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) staffing has been physically demobilized. At this time the County's Office of Emergency Services (OES) Staff under the Sheriff and staff assigned the responsibilities for Finance and Admin Section from the Auditor-Controller, County Administrator's Office and General Services continue to work to complete the cost accounting and damage estimates required. County OES is also coordinating with State and Federal partners for damage assessments and information sharing and collecting. All shelters opened in response to the emergency have been closed.

Watershed stability monitoring and restoration will be a continuing as we move into the winter season. Due to burn scars and bulldozer lines, there is an increased possibility of debris flow and landslides. Cal Fire will complete work to repair, as much as possible, areas damaged or altered.

The County's Office of Emergency Services will continue to work with cities and county departments to ensure accurate data is forwarded to the state and federal agencies handling the fire recovery efforts.

In summary, the emergency conditions and effects have diminished sufficiently such that the County no longer needs to rely on the extraordinary powers and procedures conferred under a proclamation of local emergency to address them.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There is no additional financial impact to the County to terminate the Local Emergency Proclamation.

On October 17, 2017, the Board of Supervisors authorized the use of up to \$1.5 million in General Fund Contingency to pay for costs related to damages from the wildfires. The Finance and Admin Section from the Auditor-Controller, County Administrator's Office and General Services continue to work to complete the cost accounting and damage estimates required. An updated cost estimate will be provided as the work is completed.

In addition to the County, all public entities, to include incorporated cities, school districts, community college districts and other public entities in Solano that incurred damage, may be eligible for public assistance as well as Small Business Administration loans should they become available.

ALTERNATIVES:

The Board could choose not to Adopt a Proclamation Terminating the Local Emergency; however, this is not recommended, as it is appropriate and timely to end the Local Emergency Declaration related to the Atlas Fire.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

The Solano County's Sheriff Department and the Office of Emergency Services will provide updates to the Board as the recovery effort continues.

PROCLAMATION TERMINATING LOCAL EMERGENCY

Whereas, on Tuesday, October 10, 2017, the Solano County Administrator, acting as the Incident Commander for Emergency Services, found that due to the wildfires in Sonoma and Napa counties, and in particular the Atlas Peak Fire that had invaded Solano County, that began on October 9, 2017, a condition of extreme peril to life and property existed in the County of Solano, causing or threatening to cause the destruction of critical infrastructure, residences and businesses, the evacuation and sheltering of residents and animals, the exposure and infliction of severe respiratory distress, and other damage and impacts, and proclaimed a local emergency; and

Whereas, on October 17, 2017, the Board of Supervisors confirmed and ratified the proclamation of local emergency and orders of the County Administrator that a local emergency existed in Solano County; and

Whereas, the County Administrator has informed the Board of Supervisors that the emergency conditions and their effects have now abated sufficiently that the protective services, personnel, equipment and facilities of Solano County acting within their normal procedures and powers are now adequate to handle such conditions and effects without the need for the extraordinary powers and procedures available only under a proclamation of local emergency.

Proclaimed, the Solano County Board of Supervisors proclaims the termination of the local emergency and declares that any orders made by the Board of Supervisors or the County Administrator about the local emergency are immediately rescinded.

Proclaimed, this Proclamation takes effect on November 7, 2017, at 9:00 a.m.

DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board review and consider approval of Solano County's Proposed 2018 State Legislative Platform and the Proposed 2018 Federal Legislative Platform; and Receive a legislative update from staff the County's state legislative advocate.

SUMMARY:

The Board adopts a Legislative Platform on an annual basis which is intended to provide policy direction on state and federal legislation of interest to the County. The proposed 2018 Legislative Platform is a focused, comprehensive state and federal agenda outlining the County's priorities for the coming year. For the upcoming legislative session, the County's specific "Priority Issues" remain static based on having the greatest potential and need for state and federal participation. The legislative program also provides the County's state and federal legislative representatives with a clear understanding of the County's priorities. The Proposed 2018 State Legislative Platform and the Proposed 2018 Federal Legislative Platform were reviewed by the Legislative Committee on October 30, 2017. FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The legislative program is designed to result in additional funding and cost avoidance relative to Solano County. The cost of preparing this report and compiling the information is a General Fund cost covered in the County Administrator's administration budget.

DISCUSSION:

In December 2012, the Board approved the 2013 State and Federal Legislative Platforms in a format that was different from prior years. The revised format reflects the County's specific "Priority Issues" that have the greatest potential and need for state and federal participation and provide the main focus areas on which the County's state and federal legislative advocates can concentrate advocacy efforts. In addition, the revised format includes general legislative principles in a variety of subject areas. The priority issues combined with the accompanying legislative principles provide a solid foundation for the County's State and Federal legislative representatives in understanding the County's legislative agenda.

For the upcoming legislative session the Proposed 2018 State Legislative Platform and the Proposed 2018 Federal Legislative Platform maintains the same format with suggested changes/additions/deletions as outlined in Attachment A - redlined and Attachment B - clean version for federal priorities and Attachment C - redlined and Attachment D - clean version for state priorities.

Staff is recommending that the County's "Priority Issues" for 2018 (listed alphabetically) are <u>Funding for Key Water Infrastructure Projects</u>, <u>Health and Human Services</u>, <u>Housing</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Transportation Programs</u>, <u>Military Presence</u>, <u>Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness</u>, and <u>Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and Suisun Marsh</u> at the federal level and <u>Affordable Care Implementation</u>, <u>Children</u>, <u>Youth</u>, <u>and Families</u>, <u>County Revenue Sources and Authority</u>, <u>County Strategic Plan</u>, <u>Environmental and Open Space</u>, <u>Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and Suisun Marsh</u>, <u>State Realignment and Cost Shifts</u>, and Voting and Election Efficiencies at the state level.

Each Legislative Platform also outlines, by policy area, general legislative principles on issues that enable County staff and the County's legislative advocates to respond timely to state and federal legislative proposals throughout the legislative session.

One of the primary goals of the County's legislative program is to enable timely and effective advocacy of County interests on pending state and federal legislation and issues. The Proposed 2018 Legislative Platforms allows the County's legislative advocates and staff to identify and monitor legislative activities of importance, prepare letters of support or opposition, coordinate lobbying efforts, and advance County goals and objectives at both the state and federal levels.

The legislative issues that are included in the Proposed 2018 Legislative Platforms are recommended by County departments with input from the County's state and federal legislative advocates. The Proposed 2018 Legislative Platforms incorporate elements of the County's Strategic Plan, General Plan, and prior legislative actions as well as other priorities, as outlined by the Board.

On October 30, 2017, the Legislative Committee discussed the Proposed 2018 Legislative Platforms and suggested edits to the state and federal versions contained in Attachments A and C (redlined versions). While the Proposed 2018 Legislative Platform seeks to accurately reflect the current challenges and threats imposed by both state and federal governments, should unanticipated issues arise, additional modifications may be required in future.

Once approved, the County's 2018 Legislative Platforms will be posted to the Legislative Affairs website and can be accessed at http://www.solanocounty.com/legislation/. The website enables County staff and members of the public the ability to view state bills tracked by the County each legislative session and provide the status of positions taken by the County on bills tracked. Other functions available on the website include bill search, options to find legislatures, and posted Legislative Committee agenda packets.

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SOLANO COUNTY 2017–2018 FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

Here in Solano County we take seriously our role in local government to create a bright and promising future for everyone who lives, learns, works and plays here – free of discrimination – by establishing and maintaining the social, economic and physical environments that promote good health while protecting vulnerable populations - giving everyone the chance to succeed. Our residents share in this promise, and, by working together, we endeavor to establish communities where people are safer, families are stronger and local economies thrive. By acknowledging the significant contributions of diverse groups of people – both present and in the past – we welcome a future that is bright and promising, while embracing a set of values that gives everyone the chance to be the best versions of themselves they can possibly be. To this end, all persons within Solano County are free and equal, and shall not be discriminated against based on their gender, race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, primary language, citizenship, or immigration status.

PRIORITY ISSUES

The ability of the County to serve its residents and provide for a thriving and sustainable community requires support from all levels of government. Federal legislative policy and funding decisions affect the County's ability to deliver services. In order to fulfill the County's commitment to the community, Federal resources should be sought to support the County's mission to enrich the quality of life in the County. To this end, the County Board of Supervisors supports the priorities and the legislative principles set forth below.

Priority issues are those that have a significant impact on County business and on which County staff, including the County's Federal legislative advocates, will concentrate their legislative efforts during the 2017–2018 Legislative Session. The County's top priorities (Listed Alphabetically) include:

- Funding for Key Water Infrastructure Projects Support efforts to authorize and fund key water infrastructure projects in Solano County, including dredging, water reuse and recycling, and flood control projects.
- 2. <u>Health and Human Services</u> Support increased federal funding for services and income support needed by parents seeking to reunify with children who are in foster care. Support increased financial support for programs that assist foster youth in the transition to self-sufficiency, including post-emancipation assistance such as secondary education, job training, and access to health care. Support retaining the entitlement nature of the Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance programs and elimination of outdated rules that base the child's eligibility for funds on parental income and circumstances. Support federal funding to address the service needs of youth who are victims of commercial sexual exploitation. Support reauthorization of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program with a particular emphasis on restoring state and county flexibility to tailor work and family stabilization activities to families' individual needs. Support ongoing Social Security benefits. Support federal Medicaid funding to be enhanced for individuals placed in Institutes-Institutions for Mental Disease (IMDs).
- 3. Housing, Economic Development, and Transportation Programs Support the highest possible funding level for key federal housing and economic development programs. Support efforts to restore and revitalize property impacted by prior realignment or closure of military installations. In the area of transportation, support efforts to protect the Highway Trust Fund and support programs that provide funding for local roads, bridges, transit initiatives, and aviation. Support enhanced federal funding to address issues of homelessness in our country.
- 4. <u>Military Presence</u> Support efforts to protect Travis Air Force Base from budget reductions, downsizing, as well as advocate for new and/or alternative missions to be directed to the base. Support additional assets/missions such as C-17, KC-46 squadrons, modernization of existing aircraft, and gaining other aviation and non-aviation missions. Support infrastructure investments, including military construction projects and

housing upgrades and enhance use of underutilized property on base. Support efforts to implement and maintain public-public-private partnerships with Travis Air Force Base and other community organizations/agencies.

- 5. <u>Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness</u> Support funding for programs that assist Solano County with efforts aimed at reducing crime and enhancing public safety through community partnerships and multi-jurisdictional efforts. In addition, support funding for programs that assist the County with disaster response and preparedness and homeland security-related needs, including efforts aimed at achieving communications interoperability.
- 6. Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and Suisun Marsh Support legislative and administrative efforts to protect the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and the County's interests relative to land use, agricultural stability, economic development, police or emergency response mandates, environmental preservation, flood protection, levee stability, habitat conservation, recreation, water supply, water quality, water rights, and dredging activities. Support governance structures that give local government a strong and equal voice with other stakeholders in setting Delta policy.

Furthermore, the Board of Supervisors adopts the following principles (Listed Alphabetically by Policy Area):

Agriculture, Natural Resources, and Water

Solano County supports federal legislative and regulatory actions that protect and enhance the County's significant agricultural, water, and natural resources. The County opposes any efforts to cut funding streams for critically important federal resource programs. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support efforts to strengthen inspections at borders and ports of entry to safeguard against invasive pests and diseases.
- 2. Support funding for USDA's Plant Pest and Disease Management and Disaster Prevention Program and similar efforts to eradicate invasive pests; support increases for specialty crop support and the entitlement nature of <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/journal.org/10.1007/jou
- 3. Support efforts to facilitate/expedite inspection of US Postal packages profiled by detector dogs to contain fruit or plant material.
- 4. Support legislation to indemnify growers for losses due to Plant Quarantine.
- 5. Support legislation reducing redundant enforcement of aquatic herbicide/pesticide use under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) and the Clean Water Act.
- 6. Support a more equitable distribution of USDA funds for Wildlife Services provided to California counties.
- 7. Support efforts to protect the County's Farm Gate, including, but not limited to, full mitigation of agricultural and other economic impacts associated with habitat restoration efforts.
- 8. Support funding for local mapping of flood hazard areas and advocate for the US Army Corps of Engineers and other federal agencies to protect the County from these hazards.
- 9. Support legislation to establish the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta National Heritage Area to protect and promote the economic vitality and cultural, historical, and natural assets of the region.
- 9-10. Oppose efforts to provide federal funding either through direct appropriations or indirect federal financing support mechanisms for the California WaterFix project or similar water diversion project. (Waterman & Resource Management)

General Government

Solano County supports federal legislative and regulatory actions that protect and enhance the general welfare and quality of life of the County's residents. The County opposes unfunded Federal mandates and Federal actions that would preempt local decision-making authority. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support efforts to realign government services with necessary funding in order to improve the delivery of services, including technology acquisitions, training, and upgrades.
- 2. Support efforts that protect and/or enhance local governments' revenues, maximize the County's access to Federal funding sources, and/or increases local funding flexibility.

- 3. Support legislation that provides tax and funding formulas and regulations for the equitable distribution of Federal monies while opposing attempts to decrease, restrict, or eliminate County revenue sources.
- 4. Support funding for domestic infrastructure, public safety, community development, and environmental programs.
- 5. Support any expansion, continuation, and/or increased flexibility in the bidding/procurement, delivery, and management of construction projects.
- 6. Support legislation that provides grants and funding programs for the preservation, rehabilitation, and maintenance of historically and/or architecturally significant buildings and structures.
- 7. Support funding for the Payment-in-Lieu-of-Taxes (PILT) program.
- 8. Support legislation and the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) efforts to influence reform of the U. S. Department of the Interior's fee-to-trust process.
- 9. Support efforts to enact legislation and regulations to require the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) to provide public notice to tribal, city and county governments whenever a tribe requests a restored lands determination or submits a fee-to-trust application.
- 10. Support funding and regulatory efforts to expand broadband services to all County residents.

Health and Human Services

Solano County supports federal legislative and regulatory actions that promote the health and welfare of the County's most vulnerable residents. The County opposes any efforts to cut funding streams for critically important health and human services-related programs, such as Medicaid and Medicare, and opposes efforts to reduce local flexibility in the implementation of such programs. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support reauthorization of TANF with a primary focus on restoring state and county administrative flexibility.
- Support increased funding for the Prevention and Public Health Fund (PPHF), the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), the Community Mental Health Services (CMHS), the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment (SAPT) Block Grants, the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program—Education (SNAP-Ed), (H&SS) and the Title IV-D Child Support program. Emphasis should be placed on the need to provide funding for streamlined and coordinated operations. (Waterman / H&SS)
- 3. Support eliminating the Federal health benefits "inmate exception" for persons in County jails and detention centers who are in custody pending disposition of charges.
- 4. Support eliminating the cutoff of funding for individuals that are incarcerated but not convicted, as the cost of medical care for these inmates' defaults to the County.
- 5. Support efforts to ensure competitive equity for suburban areas (on par with urban and rural areas) for Federal grant opportunities.
- 6. Support funding for subsidized child care services and child development programs, including school readiness for all children.
- 7. Support funding for programs and activities that support the special needs of elderly and persons with disabilities, including increases to Supplemental Security Income (SSI); support reauthorization of the Older Americans Act.
- 8. Support efforts to allow for utilizing billing codes for brief intervention services for alcohol and drugs and for two different services on the same day in a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC).
- 9. Support legislation that increases taxes on combustible tobacco products, tobacco-based inhalation devices, and electronic cigarettes, and uses the revenue for children and family programs, including smoking cessation programs.
- 10. Support legislation that requires specific bills to undergo a health impact assessment of current and predicted effects, possibly completed by a nonpartisan body.
- 11. Support all health equity efforts at various institutional and sectorial levels, and ensuring a broader equity strategy within institutions and sectors. Applying metrics to identify equity gaps and measuring gains in intervention areas is a key priority.

- 12. Expand the current list of billable medical expenses to include valuable services (Promotoras, chronic disease self-management programs, healthy food purchasing, etc.) which are part of a broader menu of efforts to combat chronic disease.
- 13. Support efforts to reduce intake of high fat, sugar, sodium foods and beverages which may contribute to higher risk for developing specific chronic diseases, and to regulate the distribution and sale of powdered alcohol.
- 14. Support policy for evidenced-based home visiting services as a preventive service, therefore eligible for Medi-Cal reimbursement such as California's Medicaid 1115 Waiver.
- 15. Support legislation and efforts to promote and implement "whole person care" and to address social determinants of health.
- 16. Support legislation and efforts to solidify and expand healthcare coverage and insurance implemented with the Affordable Care Act. Priority issues are those that have a significant impact on County business and on which County staff, including the County's State legislative advocates, will concentrate their legislative efforts during the 2017—2018 Legislative Session. The County's top priorities (Listed Alphabetically) include:

- Affordable Care Implementation Support healthcare policy implementation efforts that do not have an
 adverse financial impact to the County. Examples of impacts may include unfunded or under-funded
 mandates, or reallocation of existing County funding that result in an increased General Fund obligation.
 Support ongoing and new efforts related to increasing the number of insured persons and to providing and
 expanding primary care services and public health prevention services and activities.
- 2. <u>Children, Youth, and Families</u> Support legislation and budget efforts that support children, youth, and families, including restoring and expanding quality child care and preschool opportunities, increasing funding for homeless youth, promoting safety for all children, and supporting mental and developmental health prevention and early intervention activities. Advocate for dedicated funding streams for child abuse and youth violence prevention efforts. 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SOLANO COUNTY 2018 STATE LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM

Here in Solano County we take seriously our role in local government to create a bright and promising future for everyone who lives, learns, works and plays here – free of discrimination – by establishing and maintaining the social, economic and physical environments that promote good health while protecting vulnerable populations - giving everyone the chance to succeed. - Closely monitor updates to Stormwater rules that may have adverse effects on local communities. (Resource Management - moved from "Resource Management, Environmental Health, and Sustainability" section below to group stormwater issues.)
- 10. Support legislation that furthers a Cache Slough Resource Management plan. (Resource Management)

General Government

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that protect and enhance the general welfare and quality of life of the County's residents. The County opposes unfunded State mandates and State actions that would preempt local decision-making authority. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support funding for new technology to increase accountability and efficiency of local governments.
- 2. Support funding formulas for the equitable distribution of state funds while opposing attempts to decrease, restrict, or eliminate County revenue sources.
- 3. Support funding (based on objective criteria) for the preservation, rehabilitation, and maintenance of historically and/or architecturally significant buildings and structures.
- 4. Support the ongoing recognition of PACE bonds as assessments.
- 5. Support cost recovery for the County regarding services provided to other governmental entities.
- 6. Support legislation that encourages mutually respectful relationships between tribal and local governments including reform to both fee-to-trust process and off-reservation gaming provisions that ensure local government is reimbursed for potential social impacts and/or infrastructure changes and/or upgrades.
- 7. Support legislation or regulatory reform that allows flexibility in the County's pension plan formula to ensure the County remains a competitive employer in the current market.
- 8. Support equitable tax sharing agreements for annexation, incorporation, and development projects.
- 9. Support budgetary efforts for outstanding Payment-in-Lieu-of-Taxes (PILT) funding that is owed to the County and support legislative and budgetary efforts to reinstate ongoing future PILT funding.
- 10. Support funding and regulatory efforts to expand broadband services to all County residents.

Support legislation that equally allocates grant funding to District Attorneys and Public Defenders for attorneys to staff their offices. (Public Defender)**Health and Human Services**

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote the health and welfare of the County's most vulnerable residents. The County opposes any efforts to cut funding streams for critically important health and human services-related programs, such as Medi-Cal, and opposes efforts to reduce local flexibility in the implementation of such programs. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support legislation (Health and Social services (H&SS)) relative to the client intake process and case maintenance process, to improve system performance and outcomes.
- 2. Support legislation (H&SS) for prevention, intervention, and treatment services for youth and adults with substance use issues, including cannabis, powder alcohol, alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. (H&SS)
- 3. Support sufficient funding for local CalWORKS programs and support services and to sufficiently fund the CalWORKs 2.0 strategy. (H&SS)
- 4. Support legislation that promotes streamlined and efficient enrollment processes for clients enrolling into government run programs, including free/reduced school program, WIC, and CalFresh.(H&SS)Support enhanced funding for quality child care services (that also provide employment and education opportunities for County residents), and for early learning opportunities.
- 5. Support efforts that assist foster youth in the transition to self-sufficiency and among care providers. (H&SS)
- 6. Support new or increased funding for mental health programs. Specifically support efforts to allow for flexibility for all appropriately licensed individuals to bill for provided mental health services.
- 7. Support legislative and budgetary efforts to address risk factors for chronic diseases and to optimize preparedness to respond to communicable diseases (including public health lab services). (H&SS).
- 8. Support legislation to add e-cigarettes, menthol and smokeless tobacco products containing nicotine to the list of tobacco related products to be regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.
- 9. (H&SS) Support efforts to improve Health (H&SS) and promote safety and aging in place initiatives for seniors. (H&SS)
- 10. Support independent living services for foster youth including housing and educational support.
- 11. Support grants and funding for programs to address homelessness and related issues. Work with cities and other community partners to assess and expand affordable housing for low income populations.
- 12. Support legislation that promotes prevention–focused policies and interventions for illness and injuries.(H&SS)

- 13. Support full state funding and cost of living increases for state programs operated by the County.
- 14. Support legislation that increases the reliability of child support payments.
- 15. Support legislation and funding to address needs of high-risk families, including perinatal services. (H&SS)
- 16. Support legislation that would require the state maximum State Supplementary Payment (SSP) grant for individuals to be readjusted and increased so that the state SSP and the federal Restore Social Security Income (SSI), when combined equal 112 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) supplements to previous levels adjusted for cost of living.
- 17. Support expansion and funding of Medi-Cal services to increase reimbursement to providers and to fund dental, vision and other services for older adults. Support additional state and federal funding related to the administration of the Medi-Cal program including a realistic methodology to determine administrative burden to counties. (H&SS)
- 18. Support legislation and efforts to allow for billing two different services on the same day in a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), and for implementation of prospective payment systems based on a capitation model (per-member, per-month) rather than an encounter-based financing model. Support funding and programs that address issues of shortages within the health care workforce to assure access to quality healthcare.
- 19. (H&SS)Support legislation and efforts to promote and implement "whole person care" and to address social determinants of health. Support flexibility in the funding of Health and Social Services to assure collaboration between programs and better overall interventions.
- 20. Support adequate funding for implementation of ABAWD regulations with the ABAWD waiver ending in 2018. (H&SS)
- 21. Advocate for legislation and budget action that would support and enable data integration and sharing between the State, counties, and local government agencies for the purpose of supporting seamless delivery of critical health and safety services to the public.
- 22. Support legislation and funding to address and promote health equity, including health in all policies initiatives. (H&SS)
- 23. Support adequate realigned funding for realignment programs. (H&SS)
- 24. Support legislation to continue to partner with community based organizations to provide health and social services to high risk populations. (H&SS)
- 25. Support legislation to recruit and retain health care professionals to serve targeted high-risk populations. (H&SS)

Housing, Community and Economic Development, and Workforce Investment

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote local housing and community development programs and activities, workforce development programs, and programs aimed at encouraging local job and business growth. The County opposes efforts to cut funding for these critically important programs, as well as efforts to restrict local flexibility in the administration of such programs. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support Housing Element reform that provides a streamlined certification process, and encourage flexibility in Housing Element consistency review by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), (Resource Management) for jurisdictions that have small housing allocation, limited urban services and city centered development policies.
- 2. Support housing opportunities for low-income individuals and families such as permanent and transitional housing, and Rental Assistance Programs.
- 3. Encourage and seek legislation to facilitate orderly economic expansion and growth, and increase the opportunity for discretionary revenues, programmatic and financial flexibility for the County.
- 4. Support the federal/State/local delivery system for workforce development programs with State-level initiatives that complement local delivery efforts and add value for these business-led efforts.
- 5. Support efforts to increase employment opportunities and link training programs to local available employment, including efforts to increase summer employment opportunities for youth.

6. Support appropriate resources to support safe, accessible and affordable housing to targeted low-income seniors.

Public Safety and Emergency Disaster Preparedness

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote funding for key justice, public safety, and emergency preparedness programs. The County opposes efforts to cut funding for such programs, as well as efforts to restrict local flexibility in program administration. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support continued and protected funding for all 2011 Public Safety Realignment programs.
- Support actions to mitigate liabilities of longer-term inmates as a result of realignment in areas such as health, mental health, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other areas of concern; also efforts to mitigate the impacts of long-term confinement in county jails and redirects inmates with sentences in excess of three years to state prisons.
- 3. Preserve Title IVE funding and obtain fiscal support from the State to implement the requirements imposed by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS).
- 4. Support legislation that provides funding to comply with the additional financial burden of the Prison Rape Elimination Act.
- 5. Support maximizing reimbursement for inmate medical care from federal Affordable Care Act (ACA).
- 6. Protect funding for local public safety programs, including COPS, Juvenile Justice Programs, Cal-MMET, Rural Sheriffs, Booking Fees, Vertical Prosecution, and other critical programs.
- 7. Support efforts to secure appropriate funding for gang-related issues.
- 8. Support legislation that establishes a presumptive limit for driving under the influence of marijuana.
- 9. Support continued and protected funding for adult probation services.
- 10. Support a state offset to recover outstanding restitution ordered to the victims of crimes and other delinquent court ordered fines, penalty assessments, and fees associated with criminal or juvenile justice proceedings; specifically allow the collection term from 3 years to between 10 and 20 years.
- 11. Support increased funding for prevention, intervention, and victim services for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, dating violence, stalking, elder abuse and human trafficking.
- 12. Support funding for flood protection of buildings that play a role in local emergency response.
- 13. Support efforts to improve safety of hazardous materials transported by rail, including crude by rail and enhance capacity of local emergency responders to appropriately respond to potential emergency events resulting from derailment or releases.
- 14. Support legislation for the availability and affordability of earthquake and flood insurance.
- 15. Support funding and legislation to assess and mitigate potential impacts on local communities due to climate change and sea level rise.(Resource Management)

Resource Management, Environmental Health, and Sustainability

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote the environmental health and sustainability of the County, including funding for key programs. The County opposes efforts to cut funding for such programs, as well as efforts to restrict local flexibility in program administration. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support legislation and administrative action that further the goals of the County's climate protection efforts, including the ability for a local agency to obtain greenhouse gas reduction credits.
- 2. Support funding to sustain operations, maintenance and repair of dated infrastructure in County and local park agencies. Support legislative efforts to keep State Parks open in the County.
- 3. (Resource Management)Minimize proposed changes to Building Codes made by the legislative process. Focus code changes on established procedures through the Building Standards Commission.
- 4. Support repeal of the \$150 per building fee applicable to rural State Responsibility areas and/or return of some of fee revenues to local fire districts.
- 5. Oppose CalEMA's proposals to require local jurisdictions to purchase repetitive loss properties.

- 6. Support reinstatement of the Williamson Act program, which was defunded in FY2011/12.
- 7. Oppose legislation and other ecosystem enhancing actions that (Resource Management) diminish the County's ability to require mitigation of the conversion of agricultural lands, including mitigation to enhance existing agricultural lands.
- 8. Support sensible and meaningful CEQA reform that both streamlines processes and serves to reduce meaningless litigation, while maintaining strong analytic and mitigation requirements for large projects that clearly have significant environmental consequences at a regional or statewide level.
- 9. Support actions for a responsive, efficient, and effective County environmental health program.
- 10. Support any legislation that simplifies reporting for local environmental health programs to the state, including revisions to Chapter 6.95 to streamline hazardous materials program reporting.
- 11. Support legislation allowing local water agencies to (Resource Management) determine how to achieve water conservation mandates.
- 12. Support legislation to improve access to healthy foods via community gardens, school gardens, etc.
- 13. Support legislation that provides funding opportunities (Resource Management) to sustain and expand a countywide parks system.
- 14. Support legislation that fosters regional purchasing capabilities and inter-jurisdictional infrastructure development to achieve local environmental and sustainability goals/requirements. Support actions for source reduction, recycling and composting, including legislation and grants to support extended producer responsibility.
- 15. Oppose legislation and rule making that would diminish local authority to regulate cannabis activities. (Resource Management)
- 16. Oppose legislation that allows sale through internet or directly to consumers of potentially hazardous foods cooked at home kitchens unless local planning approval and local licenses and permits are obtained. (Resource Management)
- 17. Support legislation that streamlines the permitting of organic waste processing, composting and recycling infrastructure to achieve State mandated recycling mandates. (Resource Management)
- 18. Support legislation that allows collaboration between the groundwater sustainability agencies and the local environmental health departments in regards to monitoring and permitting of wells. (Resource Management)
- 19. Support legislation that consolidates and streamlines rules and requirements to enhance groundwater recharge through reuse and recycling. (Resource Management)
- Support funding to assess and encourage innovation toward water conservation and reuse, especially treated waste water, and enhancement of groundwater recharge in unincorporated communities. (Resource Management)
- 21. Support legislation that promotes regional consolidation of water systems in local communities and secures funding for local community and state small water systems that are at risk of failure due to infrastructure age or that pose health and safety risks to customers. (Resource Management)
- 22. Support legislation and administrative actions that provide funding for local agencies and property owners to destroy abandoned water wells that pose safety or water quality impact risks. (Resource Management)

Transportation

Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote and protect the transportation needs of our community. The County opposes efforts to cut funding for key transportation programs, as well as efforts to restrict local flexibility in the administration of such programs. Specific principles include:

- 1. Support legislation and budget actions which provide additional and continuing funding for local infrastructure, including local roads, bridges, and transit priorities, as well as continued funding of the California Aid to Airports Program (CAAP) for capital projects. Ensure that existing transportation funding streams are retained. Seek to reverse the diversion of Off Highway vehicle funding.
- 2. Seek funding from the Cap and Trade measure to pay for road maintenance including green roads and other enhancements to the transportation network that reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

- 3. Oppose legislation and measures that seek to diminish or rescind the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. (Resource Management)
- 4. Oppose legislation that restricts the County's ability to deliver construction projects using specialized consultant, non-profit, or other contract services. (Resource Management)
- 5. (Resource Management)Support efforts to improve rail and rail car safety, including positive train control (PTC) technologies, for transportation of hazardous materials including crude oil.
- Encourage the replenishment of State funding of the Aeronautics Program for Capital Improvement Grant Funding through the California Transportation Commission (CTC); and restore State Aeronautics funding reliability for future project planning.
- 7. Support Funding and increased access to transportation for those who are low income and lack access to reliable transportation.
- 8. Support legislation that facilitates funding and improvements to the Highway 37 corridor. (Resource Management)

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Solano County supports state legislative and regulatory actions that promote and protect the health and general welfare of veterans in our community. The County opposes efforts to cut funding for key veterans' programs, as well as efforts to restrict local flexibility in the administration of such programs. Specific principles include:

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- 2. Support legislative, regulatory or policy changes that would create a federal/state/local government partnership to reduce the VA veteran's claims backlog and expand outreach services to veterans.
- 3. Support legislation and funding to improve existing and construct new local veteran's facilities.
- 4. Support state legislation to permit the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to collect data on incarcerated veterans and to give that data to the Department of Veterans Affairs (CDVA) for purposes of connecting those incarcerated veterans and their families with the benefits they are still entitled to while incarcerated, as well as upon release from incarceration.
- 5. Support legislation that would make it a criminal offense to intentionally misdirect or mislead a veteran, or anyone acting on the veterans behalf, concerning benefits or entitlements.
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- 2. Solano LAFCo Support the 2018 legislative priorities and programs outlined and adopted by Solano LAFCo.
- 3. <u>Solano Transportation Authority</u> Support the 2018 legislative state priorities and programs as outlined and adopted by the Solano Transportation Authority.
- 4. <u>Travis Community Consortium</u> Support the mission of all military organizations located within the County. Support the 2018 state legislative priorities adopted by the Travis Community Consortium. Furthermore, encourage the State to adopt proactive measures regarding the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) and convene an office at the State level to work with each community that has a military installation or defense contractors to protect California's interest with the decline in defense spending and the probable realignment of missions and closure of bases.
- 5. California State Association of Counties (CSAC). Support the 2018 legislative state priorities and programs as outlined and adopted by CSAC.

Federal Legislative Update

Fiscal Year 2018 Budget Resolution

Both the House and Senate recently adopted a final version of the fiscal year 2018 budget resolution. While the resolution is technically nonbinding, passage of the measure (H Con Res 71) paves the way for congressional Republicans to advance their ambitious tax-reform plan under fast-track procedures. The somewhat arcane process, known as budget reconciliation, would allow Republicans in the Senate to clear a tax-code rewrite with a simple majority vote (instead of the 60 votes that are typically required to pass most legislation).

With regard to discretionary spending, the final budget blueprint includes language that would allow Congress to spend billions of dollars more for defense programs compared to what is officially authorized by the 2011 *Budget Control Act* (BCA). In order for the additional defense spending to actually occur, Congress would need to pass a separate deal raising the BCA's caps.

Notably, the final resolution does *not* call for additional investment in domestic discretionary programs. Congressional Democrats, however, have stated that they are only open to raising the BCA's defense caps if there are commensurate increases in domestic spending. This matter will likely be addressed in some fashion later this fall, which is when Republicans will need Democratic votes in the Senate to advance a fiscal year 2018 appropriations package (the GOP cannot use the reconciliation process to advance spending bills).

Of additional importance to Solano County, the final budget blueprint jettisons a component of a previously passed House resolution that called for multiple authorizing committees to produce legislation that cuts mandatory spending by at least \$203 billion over 10 years. While removal of the House language does not guarantee that Congress will not make cuts to entitlement programs, it does make it highly unlikely that the GOP-led Congress could advance such a bill since the legislation would be subject to a Democratic filibuster in the Senate.

Tax Reform

As stated above, passage of H Cons Res 71 tees up consideration of a Republican tax-cut bill, which, under the terms of the budget resolution, could increase the federal deficit by as much as \$1.5 trillion over 10 years. Because the tax code changes being contemplated by the GOP are likely to exceed that \$1.5 trillion threshold, committee leaders are considering the elimination and/or modification of a number tax deductions as a means to help offset the overall cost of the reform package.

One such "pay-for" is a partial repeal of the state and local tax (SALT) deduction. Although a number of Republican members of Congress are aggressively advocating to retain provisions of federal law that allow taxpayers to fully deduct their state and local taxes, GOP leaders are expected to unveil legislation that restricts this authority. As of this writing, it does not appear that Republican tax writers will look to modify the tax exempt status of municipal bonds.

Looking ahead, House Ways and Means Committee Republicans are planning to release the legislative text of their tax bill on November 1. A committee markup, followed by House floor action, is expected to occur shortly thereafter.

Health Care

In early November, the House is expected to vote on legislation that would extend funding for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). While the bill would reauthorize program funding for five years, the measure (HR 3821) would gradually scale back the *Affordable Care Act*'s higher federal contribution for CHIP coverage. Specifically, the bill would maintain the current 23 percentage point boost in the federal matching rate through fiscal year 2019 before phasing the rate down by half that amount in 2020. Beginning in 2021, the federal contribution for CHIP would return to its regular (pre-ACA) level.

Although federal funding for CHIP expired on September 30, the Department of Health and Human Services has signaled that states generally have sufficient funding to continue financing their programs after that date. California is expected to exhaust its CHIP funding by January 1, 2018.

In other recent developments, bipartisan legislation designed to fund the ACA's Cost-Sharing Reduction (CSR) payments through 2019 failed to get off the ground in the Senate. A source of controversy for months, the payments are made to health insurance companies to assist low and moderate income subscribers meet their co-pays and deductibles. The impetus for the bill gained urgency given the recent announcement by the Trump administration that the executive branch would cease the monthly CSR payments.

For their part, health insurance companies have stated that the loss of the CSRs would greatly disrupt the individual marketplace and would lead to double-digit increases in premiums. Ironically, given the interaction between increased premiums and marketplace subsidies to pay for them, the Congressional Budget Office has estimated that it would cost the federal government *more* to help lower-income subscribers pay their premiums than to offer subsidies for co-pays and deductibles under the CSRs. In light of the Trump administration's action, and absent legislation to address CSR payments, more moderate income individuals will likely see their premiums skyrocket and insurers may pull out of some states due to the tremendous uncertainty of the federal commitment to them and their subscribers.

With regard to the Golden State, Covered California has indicated that the state's proactive planning likely means there will be little or no impact on current 2017 coverage or rates for California subscribers. Moreover, there is expected to be no effect on 2018 premiums or subscribers' ability to access those benefits next year.

Infrastructure

As stakeholders and members of Congress continue to wait for the release of additional details of the Trump administration's infrastructure proposal, the president's economic advisor recently stated that the White House may be open to a gas tax increase to help pay for the legislation. The remarks are significant and represent a first for the Trump administration, which has not provided full details regarding how its \$1 trillion infrastructure plan would be financed.

Looking ahead, it's unclear whether Congress would agree to include a gas tax adjustment as part of any infrastructure bill. That decision will lie with the tax writing committees in the House and Senate.

<u>WaterFix</u>

A group of key House Democrats recently sent a letter to the General Accounting Office (GAO) urging the investigative arm of Congress to initiate a new inquiry into the Bureau of Reclamation's use of federal taxpayer dollars in the BDCP/WaterFix planning process. The action comes on the heels of a recent Department of the Interior Inspector General report, which revealed that Reclamation, among other things, obscured the source of its planning-related funding and the total cost of its participation in the water conveyance project.

In the wake of the call for a GAO investigation, a spokesperson for the Interior Department appeared to distance the Trump administration from the State's project. In a subsequent statement, however, the Department indicated that while Interior does not expect to participate in the construction or funding of the tunnels, they intend to continue to work with the State and stakeholders as the project is further developed.
