Ms. Sewell-Cavaness' knowledge of Multi-Program public assistance has been valuable in training new employees on various complex rules and regulations. Her expertise and know-how have assisted Solano County eligible residents in receiving core services which enable them to work towards self-sufficiency. Additionally, Ms. Sewell-Cavaness helps strengthen the rapport among colleagues who have had the pleasure

of interacting with her.

Ms. Sewell-Cavaness retires from Solano County on May 17, 2018 and her retirement is one that will bring closure to years of being a steadfast, unmovable, dedicated and loyal employee to the County of Solano. H&SS wishes Ms. Sewell-Cavaness all the best in her retirement and future endeavors which include vacation and traveling, home improvement projects, continuing her volunteer work, and enjoying her life in the City of Fairfield where she resides.



#### **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:**

The Department of Health and Social Services (H&SS) recommends the Board adopt and present a resolution recognizing May 20-26, 2018 as Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week in Solano County.

#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

The American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) has designated May 20-26, 2018 as National Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week. National EMS Week brings together local communities and medical personnel to publicize safety and to honor the dedication of those who provide the day-to-day lifesaving services of medicine's front line. EMS Week is a national salute to the emergency physicians, emergency medical technicians (EMTs), paramedics, firefighters, emergency medical dispatchers, law enforcement agencies, medical flight teams, educators, administrators, and others who provide quality lifesaving emergency care to our nation's residents.

The Medical Services Division within H&SS includes the County's EMS Agency which is responsible for monitoring and oversight of the County contracted ambulance service providers as well as designation and monitoring of Trauma Centers, STEMI Centers and Emergency Departments approved for pediatrics. EMS employs a group of professionals who plan the coordination of all the components needed to efficiently respond to individual and community emergencies. Core values include: rapid response to minimize the time from emergency event to arrival of resources; competency in practice in applying clinical field medicine to highest standards using best practices; and accountability to measure, validate, report, and improve processes for the delivery of care. During the Atlas Fires that occurred in October 2017, the EMS Agency was notified and local ambulance resources were mobilized to assist with transporting inpatients from various facilities to designated evacuation sites. During the week of activation, many requests for mutual aid were fulfilled with County resources and EMS related activity continued for several weeks after the Emergency Operations Center was deactivated.

In Solano County, there are approximately 1,400 EMTs and paramedics who provide daily EMS care to residents and visitors. The 2018 national theme is "EMS STRONG: Stronger Together," and activities are planned to honor EMS providers. On Sunday, May 20, 2018, Solano County will honor our emergency providers by facilitating an EMS Awards and Recognition Banquet located at the Vacaville Opera House. On Wednesday, May 23, 2018, Solano County EMS partners will offer free public CPR training at the Solano Town Center.

#### **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:**

Supervisor Hannigan requests that the Board of Supervisors authorize the County's contribution of \$5,000 from the General Fund contribution allocated to District 1 to benefit Meals on Wheels Solano County (\$3,050), Florence Douglas Senior Center (\$1,025), Vallejo Community Arts Foundation (\$375), and the Solano County Fair Association (\$550).

#### **SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:**

During the 2017/2018 Budget Hearings, the Board appropriated \$5,000 to District 1 to support community service programs. District 1 recommends distribution of the \$5,000 available to distribution of the funding as follows:

#### Meals on Wheels Solano County - \$3,050

The mission of Meals on Wheels Solano County is to provide nutritious meals, daily contact from a dedicated volunteer and to support independence while promoting the social, physical, and emotional well-being of seniors. They have been delivering meals to homebound seniors in Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, Rio Vista, Suisun, Vacaville and Vallejo since 1977. Their registered dietitian plans all of the menus. All of the meals meet 1/3 of the daily basic nutritional requirements for older adults, follow the 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, and meet state regulations for food safety and sanitation. They strive to limit sodium to less than 750 milligrams per meal, limit the calories from fat, serve whole grains, vegetables and fresh fruits for fiber. All meals are prepared and packaged fresh at their central kitchen in Suisun City, California.

#### **Guidelines for Grant Funding Requests:**

During the 2017/18 Budget Hearings, the Board appropriated \$25,000, \$5,000 to each supervisorial district, to

allow Board members to support community service programs. The Board directed County Counsel to provide guidelines on how to recommend funding for qualifying agencies or programs. The guidelines are as follows:

- Each supervisor must submit the proposed expenditure to the County Counsel and the Auditor/Controller for initial review.
- 2) The Board must approve the expenditure by a majority vote.
- 3) The Board must determine that the expenditure is for a public purpose.
- 4) The Board may authorize an expenditure of public funds to a nonprofit organization so long as the County retains ultimate control over the exercise of judgment and discretion of the intended program.
- 5) To ensure accountability, all expenditures are subject to periodic audit by the Auditor/Controller; and
  - a) If the recipient provides an activity, program or service ("activity"), it shall provide an activity report within 30 days of the activity that states the number of persons attending (if applicable) or participating activities carried out, feedback from participants (if applicable) and benefits of the activity. The recipient's failure to provide a report may result in its being considered ineligible for future funding.
  - b) If the recipient is purchasing property or making improvements, it shall use the funds for only the specified purposes and allow representatives of the county to inspect and/or audit the purchase or the contractor's performance, the facility or the portion improved with the funds and/or the records pertaining to the expenditures. The recipient shall retain for inspection and audit purposes any and all books, receipts, documentation and other records of the expenditures for three (3) years from date of receiving funds.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

This expenditure is included in the District 1 FY2017/18 budget.

#### **ALTERNATIVES**:

The Board could choose not to authorize this appropriation. However, this is not recommended as this item is consistent with Board policy.

Supervisor Vasquez requests that the Board of Supervisors authorize the County's contribution of \$5,000 from the General Fund contribution allocated to District 4 to benefit the Dixon Teen Center (\$250), Dixon Future Farmers of America (\$250), Dixon Lions Club (\$350), Dixon Rotary (\$250), Dixon Historical Society (\$250), the Sudie M. Smith Scholarship (\$250), Will C. Wood Wildcat Boosters (\$250), Vacaville Heritage Council (\$200), Buckingham Robotics Club (\$250), Vacaville American Legion Auxiliary Girls State program (\$250), Vacaville High School Robodogs Robotics Club (\$250), Vacaville Museum (\$500), the North Bay Stand down (\$250), the Vacaville Boys and Girls Club (\$250), Vacaville Art League (\$200), and Vacaville's Merriment on Main (\$1,000).

#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

#### Justification:

The groups identified by District 4 for its non-county contribution allocation of \$5,000 are community non-profits or organizations who enrich their communities within Solano County either through educational programs or through community support.

Merriment on Main - \$1,000:

Mission: To ensure that the Christmas holiday celebration established in 1983 known as Merriment on Main continues for the benefit of future generations and shall remain free to all who attend.

The non-profit which organizes and conducts the Vacaville Christmas tree lighting ceremony and events in Downtown Vacaville the Tuesday after Thanksgiving each year.

#### Vacaville Art League - \$200:

VISION: The Vacaville Art League is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the development and promotion of the visual arts.

The League's goals are to create an atmosphere that encourages community participation in the visual arts; to provide artists with exhibition space and opportunities to share and develop creative skills; and to stimulate and educate members of the community by bringing an awareness and appreciation of fine art through exhibitions, shows, workshops, classes, and demonstrations.

#### Vacaville Boys and Girls Club - \$250:

Mission: To inspire and enable the youth of our community, especially those who need us most, to realize their full potential as productive, responsible, and caring citizens.

Vision: The Vacaville Neighborhood Boys & Girls Club is recognized as the PREMIER youth development organization in our community.

#### North Bay Stand-down - \$250:

North Bay Stand Down has been assisting homeless and/or at-risk veterans since 2002 in the counties of Napa, Solano, Sonoma and Yolo, California. They do not turn away veterans from other counties (Alameda, Contra Costa, Sacramento, San Francisco, etc.). During this time, they have provided services to 2,710 veterans and hot meals, showers and sleeping bags to 304 family members. Through 2016, 1,942 court cases have been adjudicated, 541 DMV ID cards issued, 29,800+ pieces of clothing and bedding have been issued, 23,400+ meals have been served and 7,960 volunteers have assisted veterans.

#### Vacaville Museum - \$500:

The Vacaville Museum, a Center for Solano County History, is the only institution whose mission includes cultural and historical preservation for all of Solano County. Through exhibits, publications and educational programs, the Museum continuously promotes the value of community heritage. Since 1984, Vacaville Museum has produced 40 exhibits, as well as numerous publications important to the history and sense of place of Solano County.

#### Vacaville High School Robo Dogs - \$250:

The Vacaville High School Robotics Team is not only a group of students, but also a community of mentors, who represent Vacaville in the development of engineering and teamwork to complete a given task. Every year, they compete in the FIRST Robotics Competition, in which they are given six weeks to design, build, and program a robot to compete with and against other teams at a 3-day regional event.

#### Vacaville American Legion Auxiliary Girls State - \$250:

The American Legion Auxiliary Department of California is a proud sponsor and administrator of the California Girls State program. Nearly 300 locally based Units work all year to raise money in order to provide

scholarships to students to attend California Girls State. Local Units recruit from area high schools and select young women who are just completing their Junior year of high school to attend the week-long, summer session.

To provide an outstanding, unique and coveted educational opportunity for the young women of California that instills the basic ideals and principles of American government.

#### Buckingham Robotics Club - \$250:

Purpose: To inspire interest in science and technology throughout Buckingham.

The mission of the robotics team is to promote expansion and awareness of the S.T.E.M. program, along with providing students with valuable life skills. They aim to provide students with exciting and engaging experiences within the S.T.E.M. fields, along with building skills such as self-confidence, communication, leadership, teamwork, and creative thinking.

#### Vacaville Heritage Council - \$200:

The Vacaville Heritage Council, established in 1969, is a non-profit historical archives and research organization specializing in local Solano County History. Staffed by volunteers, the Vacaville Heritage Council preserves information of Solano County's past, specializing in Vacaville's history. They work with historic documents, maps, and photographs.

#### Will C. Wood Wildcat Boosters - \$250:

Fundraising for Student Organizations and Individuals.

The Wildcat Booster Club has been supporting teachers, programs, organizations and students at Will C. Wood High School since 1996.

#### Sudie M. Smith Scholarship - \$250:

For twenty years, the family of Sudie Smith has been providing scholarships to Armijo High School graduates entering the field of health care and medicine. Their mission is to provide charitable assistance and enrichment opportunities for youth pursuing a career in healthcare or medicine. They are committed to youth of Solano County by helping them reach their dreams and goals of higher education.

#### Dixon Historical Society - \$250:

To protect, preserve, and promote the history of Dixon along with its pioneering families through exhibits, lectures, and events as well as research, publications, and educational activities. The Dixon Historical Society is a membership based organization that contributes time and financial support to collect, interpret, and sustain local history; ensuring a legacy that shall enrich the lives of present and future generations of Dixonites.

#### Dixon Rotary - \$250:

The objective of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.

#### Dixon Lions Club - \$350:

The Dixon Lions Club is a group of people who identify needs within our community and work together to fulfill those needs.

#### Dixon Future Farmers of America - \$250:

FFA makes a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education. To accomplish its mission, FFA: Develops competent and assertive agricultural leadership.

FFA is the premier youth development organization for agricultural education students that provides life-changing experiences for its members. Those experiences are driven by a strong mission and a compelling vision.

#### Dixon Teen Center - \$250:

The Dixon Teen Center is a place where teens find a place to belong, build relationships with trusted adults, and fortify stronger friendships with teens their age. Open six days a week, the Dixon Teen Center offers a myriad of educational and fun activities geared towards the betterment of youth with emphasis on Developmental Assets.

#### **Guidelines for Grant Funding Requests:**

During the 2017/18 Budget Hearings, the Board appropriated \$25,000, \$5,000 to each supervisorial district, to allow Board members to support community service programs. The Board directed County Counsel to provide guidelines on how to recommend funding for qualifying agencies or programs. The guidelines are as follows:

- 1) Each supervisor must submit the proposed expenditure to the County Counsel and the Auditor/Controller for initial review.
- 2) The Board must approve the expenditure by a majority vote.
- 3) The Board must determine that the expenditure is for a public purpose.
- 4) The Board may authorize an expenditure of public funds to a nonprofit organization so long as the County retains ultimate control over the exercise of judgment and discretion of the intended program.
- 5) To ensure accountability, all expenditures are subject to periodic audit by the Auditor/Controller; and
  - a) If the recipient provides an activity, program or service ("activity"), it shall provide an activity report within 30 days of the activity that states the number of persons attending (if applicable) or participating activities carried out, feedback from participants (if applicable) and benefits of the activity. The recipient's failure to provide a report may result in its being considered ineligible for future funding.
  - b) If the recipient is purchasing property or making improvements, it shall use the funds for only the specified purposes and allow representatives of the county to inspect and/or audit the purchase or the contractor's performance, the facility or the portion improved with the funds and/or the records pertaining to the expenditures. The recipient shall retain for inspection and audit purposes any and all books, receipts, documentation and other records of the expenditures for three (3) years from date of receiving funds.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

This expenditure is included in the District 4 FY2017/18 Adopted Budget.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board could choose not to authorize this expenditure. However, this is not recommended as this item is consistent with Board policy.

#### OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

This report was prepared in coordination with the County Administrator's Office, County Auditor-Controller's Office and County Counsel.

#### **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:**

The County Administrator's Office recommends that the Board approve an Appropriation Transfer Request (ATR) for reimbursement \$5,311 out of one-time housing reserve funds and a refund of \$3,006 from the Public Facility Fees Fund to Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity for County public facilities fee collected for a permanent supportive veteran's housing project located at 250 South Jackson Street, Dixon, California.

#### SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

On June 28, 2016 the Board of Supervisors approved a 30-year loan to Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity and Community Action North Bay for \$88,000 for the purchase of real property in Dixon, California for permanent supportive housing for six disabled veterans. On March 26, 2018, Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity paid \$39,240 in building permit fees to the City of Dixon of which \$8,317 is attributed to county public facility fees.

The parcel located at 250 South Jackson Street included a 900 sq. ft. house that was torn down as part of the new construction project. Under the current public facility fee ordinance (Article X. Public Facility Fees of Chapter 11 Finances, Fees, Taxation and Revenue (Attachment A-Article X.-Public Facility Fees)) the county can charge the property owner the net new square footage of the residential home (i.e. demolition or destruction offset), however, Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity is requesting a full waiver of the fees, resulting in a refund of \$8,317 from the County. Of note, the City of Dixon charged Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity the county's public facility fee based on 2,490 sq. ft. (new living space) and did not reduce the square footage by the previous home size of 900 sq. ft. Including the demolition offset, the net charge for the county's public facility fees should have been calculated at \$5,311.

The estimated cost of construction for the housing project is \$424,194. Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity has

currently raised net proceeds of \$195,740 and desires the county to reimburse them for all charged county public facility fees to help ensure that there are sufficient funds to construct the multi-residential property (Attachment B- Letter from Habitat for Humanity). Also of note, this non-profit continues to actively fundraise for the remaining gap in financing and estimates a construction completion date of May 2019.

Staff is recommending that the Board authorize a refund of \$3,006 which represents the overpayment of fees that shouldn't have been collected and a reimbursement of \$5,311 which represents the correct amount that should have be charged to paid out of the County's housing reserve set aside.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT**:

\$3,006 would be refunded from the Public Facility Fee Fund. The remainder of the refunded amount (\$5,311) would come from the committed SB375 housing reserves. Given that this project creates six new permanent supportive housing beds for homeless or at risk homeless veterans within the County of Solano, the housing reserve is an appropriate funding source to be utilized.

#### **ALTERNATIVES**:

Board can consider loaning \$5,311 to Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity instead of reimbursement of the fee. Based on the county ordinance, a credit of \$3,006 will be returned to Solano-Napa Habitat for Humanity. The Board can also provide additional input to staff regarding this request. The Board could also delay this action until more information is provided by staff.

#### **ARTICLE X. PUBLIC FACILITIES FEES**

#### 11-130 Findings

- (a) Beginning in January 1990, the board of supervisors and county staff have continued to express concern that new residential, commercial and industrial development in the county was placing increasing demands on a variety of county facilities. This concern was evidenced by Resolution No. 90-16 of the Solano County board of supervisors, which was jointly adopted by all of the cities in the county.
- (b) Resolution No. 90-16 led to the hiring by the county of Recht Hausrath & Associates to identify the needs for new public facilities caused by additional residential, commercial and industrial development in the county, and to advise the county on appropriate means of recovering those costs.
- (c) In order to mitigate impacts caused by new development projects within the county and to implement the goals and objectives of the county general plan, public facilities fees are necessary to finance public facilities and to assure that new development projects pay their fair share for these facilities.
- (d) Title 7, Chapter <u>5</u>, Section <u>66000</u> et seq. of the California Government Code provides that public facilities fees may be enacted and imposed on development projects. The board of supervisors finds and determines that:
  - (1) New development projects both in cities and the unincorporated area of Solano County cause the need for construction, expansion or improvement of public facilities within Solano County.
  - (2) Without fees from a dedicated funding source, funds for construction, expansion or improvement of public facilities are not available to accommodate the needs caused by development projects; which will result in inadequate public facilities within Solano County.
- (e) The board of supervisors finds that the public health, safety, peace, morals, convenience, comfort, prosperity and general welfare will be promoted by the adoption of public facilities fees for the construction, expansion or improvement of public facilities, the need for which is caused by new development projects. In establishing public facilities fees, the board of supervisors finds the fees to be consistent with the county general plan and, pursuant to Government Code Section <u>65913.2</u>, has considered the effects of the fees with respect to the county's housing needs as established in the housing element of the county's general plan.
- (f) Adoption of this article does not have the potential to cause a significant effect on the environment. This article does not authorize new development or require it. Rather it provides that if and when development is approved, under whatever laws and policies are otherwise in effect, it will be subject to a fee. This article does not approve or foreordain approval of any public facilities nor mandate or alter the level of facilities to be constructed. Therefore, further review of this article under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") is not required.

(g) This article is also exempt from review under CEQA pursuant to California Public Resources Code Section 21080(b)(8) and CEQA Guidelines Section 15273(a)(4). This article does not contemplate, identify, or approve expansion of the area for which county services are provided.

#### 11-131 Definitions

- (a) Construction for which fees apply means all residential, multifamily, commercial, manufacturing, office, retail, wholesale buildings, and other land uses as defined in the applicable building and/or zoning ordinances of each city in Solano County, and in the building and zoning ordinances of the county itself.
- (b) **Exempt construction** means (1) those projects for which a building permit was issued prior to October 26, 1992; or (2) projects which do not require the payment of city development fees. For purposes of this section, exempt construction does not include projects for which development fees have been waived by a local agency.

(Ord. No. 1446, §1; Ord. No. 1465, §1; Ord. No. 1737, §1)

#### 11-132 Imposing public facilities fees

- (a) All construction not otherwise exempt pursuant to provisions of Section <u>11-131(b)</u> shall be subject to and pay the county public facilities fee. Such development fee shall be paid and collected as provided in Sections <u>11-133</u> and
- 11-134. Construction and development shall not be otherwise regulated under this article.
- (b) The imposition of public facilities fees shall be accomplished, from time to time, by resolution of the board of supervisors after a noticed public hearing. Such fees, when imposed, shall be a condition of the issuance of permits for, or the approval of, development projects. In adopting each such resolution, the board of supervisors shall:
  - Identify the purpose of the fee;
  - (2) Identify the use to which the fee is to be put;
  - (3) Determine how there is a reasonable relationship between the fee's use and the type of development project on which the fee is imposed;
  - (4) Determine that there is a reasonable relationship between the need for the public facilities and the impacts caused by the type of development project on which the fee is imposed;
  - (5) Determine that there is a reasonable relationship between the amount of the fees and the cost of the public facilities, or portion of the public facilities, attributable to the development projects on which the fees are imposed; and
  - (6) Establish, as a part of each such resolution, a schedule of fees.

(Ord. No. 1446, §1; Ord. No. 1465, §1; Ord. No. 1737, §1)

#### 11-133 Payment of fee

- (a) <u>Time for payment of fee.</u> Fees for applicable development shall be paid prior to the issuance of the certificate of occupancy, or at the time of final inspection, whichever comes first, or, if the provisions of Government Code Section 66007 are met, at the time of issuance of a building permit for any nonexempt construction under the provisions of this article. Section 66007 requires that to collect fees at the building permit stage, an account has to be established for the fees to be collected and funds appropriated, and the board has to adopt a proposed construction schedule or plan prior to final inspection of issuance of the certificate of occupancy.
- (b) <u>Fee amounts</u>. Except to the extent reduced by an in-lieu contribution approved pursuant to subdivision (e) of this section, which in-lieu contribution will only apply to development within the unincorporated areas of the county, fees under this section shall be payable in those specific amounts designated by the board of supervisors, and amended from time to time by board resolution. The amount payable shall be reduced by the amount of any fee charged to the developer by any other jurisdiction to provide funding for the same county facilities. The board of supervisors may adjust by resolution the fee amounts one time annually based on the percentage increase in the Engineering News Record Construction Cost Index or a similar index which measures typical construction costs for facilities generally similar to those to be built by the county.
- (c) <u>Appeal</u>. Any person may protest the imposition of any fee imposed under the provisions of this article by meeting the following requirements:
  - (1) Tendering any required payment in full or providing satisfactory evidence of arrangements to ensure performance of the conditions necessary to meet the requirements imposed.
  - (2) Serving written notice on the clerk to the board of supervisors, which notice shall contain all of the following information:
    - (A) A statement that the required payment is tendered, or that any conditions which have been imposed are provided for or satisfied, under protest.
    - (B) A statement informing the board of supervisors of the factual elements of the dispute and the legal theory forming the basis of the protest.
  - (3) The protest must be filed no later than ninety (90) days after the date of the imposition of the fee hereunder.

Where a protest has been filed in compliance with these provisions, the protest resolution procedure shall be as set forth under the provisions of Government Code Section 66020 et seg.

(d) <u>Demolition or destruction offset</u>. Where a building permit is issued within two (2) years after demolition on the same lot, or where new construction replaces a structure on the same lot which was damaged or destroyed by fire, earthquake or other causes similarly beyond the owner's control, the amount of new construction taken into account under this article shall be reduced by the number of square feet which were demolished or destroyed.

- (e) <u>In-lieu contribution</u>. The county may authorize for affected development within the unincorporated areas of the county, in connection with approval of a subdivision map or any other development approval subject to a required public hearing before any agency of the county, the substitution of completed facilities or another contribution of at least equivalent value to the public facilities fee in place of all or part of the fees required under this article. The facilities or other contribution must reduce the need for new county public facilities in one (1) or more of the areas specifically identified in this article as being supported by these fees. Where the facilities or other contribution exceed in value the fee amount in the category or categories in which a benefit is provided, the county may (but shall not be required to) credit the excess value against fees in other categories and may further provide for a compensating allocation to the other categories of future fee receipts from the category in which a benefit is provided.
- (f) <u>Information required</u>. Where the county is to issue a building permit, the person liable for the fee shall submit to the department of resource management such information as the department may require to calculate the amount due, or, where a city certifies square footage and use, or number of dwelling units, pursuant to Section <u>11-134(b)</u>, the information necessary to calculate the fee shall be submitted to the city by the applicant.

#### **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION**

The Department of Health & Social Services (H&SS) recommends that the Board approve a contract with Solano Family and Children's Council, Inc. for \$435,297 to provide emergency subsidized child care, child care navigator services and trauma-informed training to child care providers for the period beginning May 8, 2018 through June 30, 2019; and Authorize the County Administrator to execute the contract and any subsequent amendments that remain within budgeted appropriations.

#### <u>SUMMARY</u>

One of the primary barriers for potential families seeking to take in a foster child is the lack of access to child care immediately following the removal of the child. The passage of Senate Bill (SB) 89 established the Emergency Child Care Bridge Program (Bridge Program) which allows eligible resource families to receive a time-limited monthly payment or voucher for child care and a child care navigator. The Bridge Program consists of the following three components: Emergency child care voucher, child care navigator, and trauma-informed care training and coaching for child care providers. This proposed contract with Solano Family and Children's Council for \$435,297 for the period beginning May 8, 2018 through June 30, 2019 aims to increase the number of foster children successfully placed in home-based family care settings, increase capacity of child care programs to meet the needs to foster children in their care, and maximize funding to support the child care needs of eligible families.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

The contract costs for FY2017/18 are included in the H&SS Child Welfare Services Adopted Budget. The contract costs for FY2018/19 will be included in the Child Welfare Services Requested Budget. The Bridge

Program is an opt-in program with capped funding. Solano County has recently been allocated \$123,905 for FY2017/18 (\$30,757 for navigator, \$13,422 for training and \$79,726 for vouchers). The FY2018/19 contract amount is based on estimated federal, State, and County program funding. The administrative costs incurred to issue child care vouchers, estimated at \$33,583, will be funded with 1991 Realignment. There is no additional financial impact to the County General Fund.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The lack of access to child care for potential foster families seeking to take in a foster child is one of the top barriers to placing young foster children with families. This contract identifies the roles and responsibilities of Child Welfare Services and Solano Family & Children's Council in efforts to recruit, retain, and support eligible families with subsidized child care, child care navigator, and child care providers to receive trauma-informed care training and coaching for foster children in their care. Solano Family and Children's Council will provide emergency child care vouchers or payments to a minimum of twenty (20) children for a maximum of six months and provide a child care navigator to all families. Assistance in accessing appropriate child care will be provided to the family, child welfare worker, social worker/probation officer, and other child and family team members. The trauma-informed care training and coaching for child care providers includes, but is not limited to, infant and toddler development and research-based, trauma-informed best care practices for children in the child welfare system. An overall, long-term child care plan will be developed to minimize child care transitions or disruptions.

As part of the contract monitoring, Solano Family & Children's Council will submit data and outcome measures as developed and required by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS). The data is intended to demonstrate that the program is meeting desired results such as a reduction in the number of foster placement changes, transitions to other types of care, number and length of vouchers issued, number of trainings, and navigator referrals. As part of the contract performance measures, Solano Family & Children's Council agrees to maintain a 95% timeliness rate on the intake process, maintain a 10-day turnaround time for child care placements upon referrals, and provide 80% of child care providers participating in the Bridge Program with trainings. This contract goal is to remove barriers to placing with relatives and supporting the least restrictive placements of children.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board may choose not to approve this contract. This is not recommended as it would result in a lack of support to resource families for children in the foster care system.

#### OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

County Counsel has reviewed and approved the contract for legal sufficiency.

### EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF WORK

#### 1. CONTRACT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this agreement is to set forth the terms and conditions for Solano County Child Welfare Services (CWS) and Solano Family & Children's Services (Contractor) to increase the number of foster children successfully placed in home-based family care, increase capacity of child care programs to meet the needs of foster children in their care, and maximize funding to support the child care needs of eligible families. This agreement identifies the roles and responsibilities of CWS and Contractor in efforts to recruit, retain, and support eligible families with subsidized child care, provide child care navigator services, and child care providers to receive trauma-informed care training and coaching for foster children in their care.

The lack of access to child care for potential foster families seeking to take in a foster child is one of the top barriers to placing young foster children with families. The passage of Senate Bill (SB) 89, established the Emergency Child Care Bridge Program for Foster Children (Bridge Program). The Bridge Program provides a time-limited monthly payment or voucher for child care and a child care navigator to assist with finding a child care provider. Trauma-informed care training and coaching is also provided to child care providers who care for children in foster care.

### 2. WORK ACTIVITIES

#### Contractor will:

- A. Help pay for child care costs by providing emergency child care vouchers or payments to a minimum of twenty (20) children for a maximum of 6 months. Provide a child care navigator to all eligible families.
- B. Assist the family, child welfare worker, social worker or probation officer, and other child and family team members with accessing child care at the time of placement as well as identifying child care options appropriate to the child's age and needs.
- C. Connect the family to information and resources about school readiness and child care to empower families and improve their ability to access resources and make informed decisions about the child care needs of the child.
- D. Assist the family in identifying potential opportunities for an ongoing child care subsidy if eligible.
- E. Assist the family in completing appropriate child care program applications and enrolling into a child care program.
- F. Develop an overall, long-term child care plan for the child, including plans, where possible, to minimize child care transitions or disruptions for the child.
- G. Provide Trauma-informed care training and coaching to child care programs participating in the Bridge Program. The training includes, but is not limited to, infant and toddler development and research-based, trauma-informed best care practices for children in the child welfare system. Child care providers will also receive access to coaching to assist them in applying training curriculum and learn strategies for working with children in foster care,
- H. Submit data and outcomes to demonstrate that the program is meeting intended results. Data elements include number 8 through number 20 found on Emergency Child Care Bridge Program Monthly Status Report (CCB 18) which can be found at <a href="http://www.cds.ca.gov/dssdb/">http://www.cds.ca.gov/dssdb/</a>.

#### County of Solano Standard Contract

#### County will:

- A. Refer children (0 to 5 years of age) placed into emergency relative care to the Bridge Program when there is an identified need for childcare.
- B. Collect and submit quarterly data and outcomes to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) program.
- C. Hold quarterly contractor's meetings and provide the Contractor with the date and time of the meeting within 30 days of the meeting.

#### 3. PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- A. Within two (2) business days of the referral from CWS, initiate the Intake Process with 95% of the resource parents.
- B. Foster children will be successfully placed in Bridge funded childcare within 10 days upon receipt of the child care referral.
- C. 80% of child care providers will receive trainings to have increase capacity to meet the needs of foster children in their care.

## 4. <u>REPORTING REQUIREMENTS</u>

- A. Provide monthly list of children participating in the Bridge program.
- B. Provide on a monthly basis data defined by CDSS as described above.
- C. Provide on a quarterly basis results of satisfaction surveys.

# EXHIBIT B BUDGET DETAIL AND PAYMENT PROVISIONS

#### 1. METHOD OF PAYMENT

- A. Upon submission of an invoice and a Solano County vendor claim by Contractor, and upon approval by County, County will, in accordance with the "Contract Budget" attached to this Contract as Exhibit "B-1" and incorporated into this Contract by this reference, pay Contractor monthly in arrears for fees and expenses actually incurred the prior month, up to the maximum amount set forth in Section 3 of the Standard Contract. Monthly claims for payment should be submitted to County by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the subsequent month. Notwithstanding Section 1 in Exhibit C, Contractor is required to submit all monthly claims for services provided through May 31<sup>st</sup>, no later than June 15<sup>th</sup>.
- B. Claims submitted by Contractor must meet the criteria set forth in section E and be documented by an agency spreadsheet specifying the County's portion of the total agency budget directly attributable to this Contract. Each invoice must specify services rendered, to whom, date of service and the accrued charges.
- C. Contractor must request approval for transfers between budget line items, which are set forth in Exhibit B-1, when the cumulative amount of such transfers exceed 10% of the total Personnel and Operating amounts. Requests for transfers between budget line items must be presented to the County on the County's "Budget Modification Request Form". Budget line item transfers that exceed 10% of the total Personnel and Operating amounts may be made only upon prior written approval of County, which approval may be withheld in the sole and absolute discretion of County. County may authorize the addition of budget line items for transfers under this section, except for indirect costs and capital expenditures (equipment or real property), provided that the line item added does not substantially change the scope of services to be provided under this Contract and does not increase the contract amount.
- D. Contractor must repay the County for any disallowed costs identified by County through monthly reports, audits, Quality Assurance monitoring, or other sources within thirty days of receipt of notice from County that the costs have been disallowed. Contractor agrees that funds to be disbursed under the terms of this contract will be withheld if repayment is not received by the County within thirty days of receipt of notice from County. Contractor may submit a written appeal to a disallowance to the County Health and Social Services Employment & Eligibility Services Deputy Director, or designee, within fifteen days of receipt of a disallowance notice. The appeal must include the basis for the appeal and any documentation necessary to support the appeal. No fees or expenses incurred by Contractor in the course of appealing a disallowance will be an allowable cost under this Contract and will not be reimbursed by County. The decision of the Deputy Director, or designee, regarding the appeal will be final.
- E. The following criteria apply to Contract Budget submitted by Contractor under this Contract:
  - i. Requests for payment of personnel costs must include positions, salary, and actual percentage of time for each position. If Contractor provides fringe benefits to part time employees, salary and fringe benefits must be pro-rated for non-full-time employees. Salaries are fixed compensation for services performed by staff who are directly employed by Contractor and who are paid on a regular basis. Employee benefits and employer payroll taxes include Contractor's contributions or expenses for social security, employee's life and health insurance plans, unemployment insurance, pension plans, and other similar expenses that are approved

by County. These expenses are allowable when they are included and in accordance with Contractor's approved written policies and allocation plan.

- ii. Salaries and benefits of personnel involved in more than one contract, grant, or project must be charged to each grant based on the actual percentage of time spent on each grant or project. Timesheets for each employee whose time is charged to this Contract must be maintained by Contractor and available upon request by the County.
- iii. Allowable operating expenses are defined as necessary expenditures exclusive of personnel salaries, benefits, equipment or payments to subcontractors. The expenses must be to further the program objectives as defined in Exhibit A of this Contract and be incurred (realized) during the invoiced period. County reserves the right to make the final determination if an operating expense is allowable and necessary.
- iv. Indirect costs are shared costs that cannot be directly assigned to a particular activity, but are necessary to the operation of the organization and the performance of the program. The costs of operating and maintaining facilities, accounting services and administrative salaries are examples of indirect costs. In order to include indirect costs or an indirect cost rate in the contract budget, Contractor must have a negotiated indirect cost rate agreement with a federal agency. If Contractor does not have such a negotiated indirect cost rate agreement then Contractor may claim an indirect cost rate of up to 10% of modified total direct costs, as defined in 2 CFR part 200.68, provided Contractor does not use the Direct Allocation Method of allocating indirect costs (as discussed in Appendix IV to part 200).

Regardless of whether Contractor claims indirect costs through a negotiated indirect cost rate, Direct Allocation Method, or the 10% of modified total direct costs, Contractor must provide the County with a cost allocation plan that clearly differentiates between direct and indirect costs. Contractor ensures that the same costs that have been treated as indirect costs have not been claimed or budgeted as direct costs, and that similar types of costs in like circumstances have been accounted for consistently. Contractor will provide this plan to County upon request. In the event that Contractor is unable to provide County with an acceptable cost allocation plan, County may disallow any indirect cost billed amounts.

County will provide Contractor with an annual advance payment for only those costs related to childcare payments. An advance payment will not be provided for administration expenditures, which include all line items under the personnel and operating categories included in Exhibit B-1 of this Contract. Monthly invoices will be submitted separately for administration and childcare expenditures with the PIN breakout report accompanying the childcare invoices. Contractor will provide County with a vendor claim supported by written notification to request an advance payment at the beginning of each fiscal year. Each advance payment request will only be for a maximum of 25% of the budgeted line item for childcare expenditures included in Exhibit B-1. The advance request may be accepted, decreased or denied at County's sole discretion. Prior to the end of each fiscal year, Contractor will provide County with a reconciliation comparing the advance payment amount to the actual childcare expenditures incurred by the Contractor. After the end of the third quarter, any advance payment that exceeded the childcare expenditures during the first three quarters will be subtracted from the fourth quarter invoices. This will result in Contractor not being reimbursed for the last quarter, or a portion of it, of each fiscal year if the advance amount provided exceeds the final quarter invoices. If the advance amount exceeds the final quarter invoices then Contractor must issue a check to the County for the remaining overpayment amount resulting in County reimbursement to equal Contractor costs specifically for this Contract and up to the maximum amount set forth in Section 3 of the Standard Contract.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

- A. Contractor will establish and maintain a system of accounts for budgeted funds that complies with generally accepted accounting principles and practices for organizations/governmental entities as described in Exhibit C section 13B. Additionally, Contractor must submit claims for payment under this Contract using either a cost allocation method or a direct allocation method.
- B. Contractor's cost allocation method must be supported by a cost allocation plan with a quantifiable methodology validating the basis for paying such expenditures. The cost allocation plan should be prepared within the guidelines set forth under 2 CFR part 200, subpart E, Cost Principles and Appendix IV to part 200, Indirect (F&A) Costs Identification and Assignment, and Rate Determination for Nonprofit Organizations.
- C. Contractor will document all costs by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions associated with this Contract, including, but not limited to, invoices, time studies, and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract.

#### 3. PERSONAL PROPERTY

A. Contractor will develop and maintain a system to track the acquisition of tangible personal property purchased with County funds having a cost of at least \$1,500 and submit, upon County's request, an annual accounting of all such property purchased that includes information on cost and acquisition date. Contractor will ensure adequate safeguards are in place to protect such assets and will exercise reasonable care over such assets to protect against theft, damage or unauthorized use. Contractor will, upon County's request, return such assets to the County upon contract termination; unless the depreciated value of the asset is \$0, based on a straight-line method of depreciation (refer to CFR part 200.436).

#### 4. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND AUDITS

- A. Contractor agrees to furnish an annual audited financial statement to the County, which must be submitted within 30 days of its publication.
- B. Contractor agrees to furnish all records and documents within a reasonable time, in the event that the County, state or federal government conducts an audit.

## 5. SUB-RECIPIENT MONITORING AND MANAGEMENT

- A. Contractor will complete a self-assessment tool and provide it to the County within 30 days of contract execution. The County will provide the required format.
- B. Contractor will provide a fiscal monitoring report which compares the contract budget per line item in relation to the monthly invoice, cumulative total invoice, and the total contract balance. The County will provide the required format.

# EXHIBIT C GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

#### 1. CLOSING OUT

- A. County will pay Contractor's final request for payment providing Contractor has paid all financial obligations undertaken pursuant to this Contract or any other contract and/or obligation that Contractor may have with the County. If Contractor has failed to pay any obligations outstanding, County will withhold from Contractor's final request for payment the amount of such outstanding financial obligations owed by Contractor. Contractor is responsible for County's receipt of a final request for payment 30 days after termination of this Contract.
- B. A final undisputed invoice shall be submitted for payment no later than ninety (90) calendar days following the expiration or termination of this Contract, unless a later or alternate deadline is agreed to in writing by the County. The final invoice must be clearly marked "FINAL INVOICE", thus indicating that all payment obligations of the County under this Contract have ceased and that no further payments are due or outstanding.
- C. The County may, at its discretion, choose not to honor any delinquent final invoice if the Contractor fails to obtain prior written approval of an alternate final invoice submission deadline. Written County approval for an alternate final invoice submission deadline shall be sought from the County prior to the expiration or termination of this Contract.

#### 2. TIME

Time is of the essence in all terms and conditions of this Contract.

#### 3. TIME OF PERFORMANCE

Work will not begin, nor claims paid for services under this Contract until all Certificates of Insurance, business and professional licenses/certificates, IRS ID number, signed W-9 form, or other applicable licenses or certificates are on file with the County's Contract Manager.

#### 4. TERMINATION

- A. This Contract may be terminated by County or Contractor, at any time, with or without cause, upon 30 days' written notice from one to the other.
  - B. County may terminate this Contract immediately upon notice of Contractor's malfeasance.
- C. Following termination, County will reimburse Contractor for all expenditures made in good faith that are unpaid at the time of termination not to exceed the maximum amount payable under this Contract unless Contractor is in default of this Contract.

#### 5. SIGNATURE AUTHORITY

The parties executing this Contract certify that they have the proper authority to bind their respective entities to all terms and conditions set forth in this Contract.

#### 6. REPRESENTATIONS

A. County relies upon Contractor's professional ability and training as a material inducement to enter into this Contract. Contractor represents that Contractor will perform the work according to generally accepted professional practices and standards and the requirements of applicable federal, state and local laws. County's acceptance of Contractor's work shall not constitute a waiver or release of Contractor from professional responsibility.

B. Contractor further represents that Contractor possesses current valid appropriate licensure, including, but not limited to, driver's license, professional license, certificate of tax-exempt status, or permits, required to perform the work under this Contract.

#### 7. INSURANCE

- A. Without limiting Contractor's obligation to indemnify County, Contractor must procure and maintain for the duration of the Contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work under this Contract and the results of that work by Contractor, Contractor's agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.
- B. Minimum Scope of Insurance Coverage must be at least as broad as:
- (1) Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability coverage (occurrence Form CG 00 01).
- (2) Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 00 01 covering Automobile Liability, Code 1 (any auto).
- (3) Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California and Employer's Liability Insurance.
  - C. Minimum Limits of Insurance Contractor must maintain limits no less than:
  - (1) General Liability: \$1,000,000 (Including operations, products and completed operations.)

No representation is made that the minimums shown above are sufficient to cover the indemnity or other obligations of the Contractor under this Contract.
  - F. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by County. At the option of County, either:

- (1) The insurer will reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to County, its officers, officials, agents, employees and volunteers; or
- (2) Contractor must provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to County guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.
  - G. Other Insurance Provisions
- (1) The general liability and automobile liability policies must contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
- (a) The County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers must be included as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by or on behalf of Contractor; and with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Contractor including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General Liability coverage shall be provided in the form of an Additional Insured endorsement (CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 if later ISO revisions are used or the equivalent) to Contractor's insurance policy, or as a separate owner's policy. The insurance afforded to the additional insureds shall be at least as broad as that afforded to the first named insured.
- (b) For any claims related to work performed under this Contract, Contractor's insurance coverage must be primary insurance with respect to the County of Solano, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance maintained by County, its officers, officials, agents, employees, or volunteers is excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute to it.
- (2) If Contractor's services are technologically related, Professional Liability coverage shall include, but not be limited to claims involving infringement of intellectual property, copyright, trademark, invasion of privacy violations, information theft, release of private information, extortion and network security. The policy shall provide coverage for breach response costs as well as regulatory fines and penalties as well as credit monitoring expenses with limits sufficient to respond to such obligations. The policy shall also include, or be endorsed to include, property damage liability coverage for damage to, alteration of, loss of, or destruction of electronic data and/or information "property" of the County in the care, custody, or control of the Contractor. If not covered under the Contractor's Professional Liability policy, such "property" coverage of the County may be endorsed onto the Contractor's Cyber Liability Policy.
- (3) Should any of the above described policies be cancelled prior to the policies' expiration date, Contractor agrees that notice of cancellation will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions.
  - H. Waiver of Subrogation
- (1) Contractor agrees to waive subrogation which any insurer of Contractor may acquire from Contractor by virtue of the payment of any loss. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation.
- (2) The Workers' Compensation policy must be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of County for all work performed by Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

#### County of Solano Standard Contract

I. Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII unless otherwise acceptable to County.

- J. Verification of Coverage
- (1) Contractor must furnish County with original certificates and endorsements effecting coverage required by this Contract.
- (2) The endorsements should be on forms provided by County or, if on other than County's forms, must conform to County's requirements and be acceptable to County.
- (3) County must receive and approve all certificates and endorsements before work commences.
- (4) However, failure to provide the required certificates and endorsements shall not operate as a waiver of these insurance requirements.
- (5) County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage described above at any time.

#### 8. BEST EFFORTS

Contractor represents that Contractor will at all times faithfully, industriously and to the best of its ability, experience and talent, perform to County's reasonable satisfaction.

#### 9. DEFAULT

- A. If Contractor defaults in Contractor's performance, County shall promptly notify Contractor in writing. If Contractor fails to cure a default within 30 days after notification, or if the default requires more than 30 days to cure and Contractor fails to commence to cure the default within 30 days after notification, then Contractor's failure shall constitute cause for termination of this Contract.
- B. If Contractor fails to cure default within the specified period of time, County may elect to cure the default and any expense incurred shall be payable by Contractor to County. The contract may be terminated at County's sole discretion.
- C. If County serves Contractor with a notice of default and Contractor fails to cure the default, Contractor waives any further notice of termination of this Contract.
- D. If this Contract is terminated because of Contractor's default, County shall be entitled to recover from Contractor all damages allowed by law.

#### 10. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Contractor will indemnify, hold harmless and assume the defense of the County of Solano, its officers, employees, agents and elective and appointive boards from all claims, losses, damages, including property damages, personal injury, death and liability of every kind, directly or indirectly arising from Contractor's operations or from any persons directly or indirectly employed by, or acting as agent for, Contractor, excepting the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County of Solano. This indemnification shall extend to claims, losses, damages, injury and liability for injuries occurring after completion of Contractor's services, as well as during the progress of rendering such services.
- B. Acceptance of insurance required by this Contract does not relieve Contractor from liability under this indemnification clause. This indemnification clause shall apply to all damages or claims for damages suffered by Contractor's operations regardless if any insurance is applicable or not.

#### 11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor is an independent contractor and not an agent, officer or employee of County. The parties mutually understand that this Contract is between two independent contractors and is not intended to and shall not be construed to create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture or association.
- B. Contractor shall have no claim against County for employee rights or benefits including, but not limited to, seniority, vacation time, vacation pay, sick leave, personal time off, overtime, medical, dental or hospital benefits, retirement benefits, Social Security, disability, Workers' Compensation, unemployment insurance benefits, civil service protection, disability retirement benefits, paid holidays or other paid leaves of absence.
- C. Contractor is solely obligated to pay all applicable taxes, deductions and other obligations including, but not limited to, federal and state income taxes, withholding, Social Security, unemployment, disability insurance, Workers' Compensation and Medicare payments.
- D. Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any liability which County may incur because of Contractor's failure to pay such obligations nor shall County be responsible for any employer-related costs not otherwise agreed to in advance between the County and Contractor.
- E. As an independent contractor, Contractor is not subject to the direction and control of County except as to the final result contracted for under this Contract. County may not require Contractor to change Contractor's manner of doing business, but may require redirection of efforts to fulfill this Contract.
- F. Contractor may provide services to others during the same period Contractor provides service to County under this Contract.
- G. Any third persons employed by Contractor shall be under Contractor's exclusive direction, supervision and control. Contractor shall determine all conditions of employment including hours, wages, working conditions, discipline, hiring and discharging or any other condition of employment.
- H. As an independent contractor, Contractor shall indemnify and hold County harmless from any claims that may be made against County based on any contention by a third party that an employer-employee relationship exists under this Contract.
- I. Contractor, with full knowledge and understanding of the foregoing, freely, knowingly, willingly and voluntarily waives the right to assert any claim to any right or benefit or term or condition of employment insofar as they may be related to or arise from compensation paid hereunder.

#### 12. RESPONSIBILITIES OF CONTRACTOR

- A. The parties understand and agree that Contractor possesses the requisite skills necessary to perform the work under this Contract and County relies upon such skills. Contractor pledges to perform the work skillfully and professionally. County's acceptance of Contractor's work does not constitute a release of Contractor from professional responsibility.
- B. Contractor verifies that Contractor has reviewed the scope of work to be performed under this Contract and agrees that in Contractor's professional judgment, the work can and shall be completed for costs within the maximum amount set forth in this Contract.
  - C. To fully comply with the terms and conditions of this Contract, Contractor shall:
- (1) Establish and maintain a system of accounts for budgeted funds that complies with generally accepted accounting principles for government agencies;
- (2) Document all costs by maintaining complete and accurate records of all financial transactions associated with this Contract, including, but not limited to, invoices and other official documentation that sufficiently support all charges under this Contract;
- (3) Submit monthly reimbursement claims for expenditures that directly benefit Solano County;
- (4) Be liable for repayment of any disallowed costs identified through quarterly reports, audits, monitoring or other sources; and

(5) Retain financial, programmatic, client data and other service records for 3 years from the date of the end of the contract award or for 3 years from the date of termination, whichever is later.

#### 13. COMPLIANCE WITH LAW

- A. Contractor shall comply with all federal, state and local laws and regulations applicable to Contractor's performance, including, but not limited to, licensing, employment and purchasing practices, wages, hours and conditions of employment.
- B. To the extent federal funds are used in whole or in part to fund this Contract, Contractor specifically agrees to comply with Executive Order 11246 entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity", as amended and supplemented in Department of Labor regulations; the Copeland "Ant-Kickback" Act (18 U.S.C. §874) and its implementing regulations (29 C.F.R. part 3); the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §7401 et seq.); the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. §1251); and the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (Pub. L. 94-165).
- C. Contractor represents that it will comply with the applicable cost principles and administrative requirements including claims for payment or reimbursement by County as set forth in 2 C.F.R. part 200, as currently enacted or as may be amended throughout the term of this Contract.

#### 14. CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. Contractor shall prevent unauthorized disclosure of names and other client-identifying information, except for statistical information not identifying a particular client receiving services under this Contract.
- B. Contractor shall not use client specific information for any purpose other than carrying out Contractor's obligations under this Contract.
- C. Contractor shall promptly transmit to County all requests for disclosure of confidential information.
- D. Except as otherwise permitted by this Contract or authorized by law, Contractor shall not disclose any confidential information to anyone other than the State of California without prior written authorization from County.
- E. For purposes of this section, identity shall include, but not be limited to, name, identifying number, symbol or other client identifying particulars, such as fingerprints, voice print or photograph. Client shall include individuals receiving services pursuant to this Contract.

#### 15. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. Contractor represents that Contractor and/or Contractor's employees and/or their immediate families and/or Board of Directors and/or officers have no interest, including, but not limited to, other projects or independent contracts, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, including separate contracts for the work to be performed hereunder, which conflicts with the rendering of services under this Contract. Contractor shall employ or retain no such person while rendering services under this Contract. Services rendered by Contractor's associates or employees shall not relieve Contractor from personal responsibility under this clause.
- B. Contractor has an affirmative duty to disclose to County in writing the name(s) of any person(s) who have an actual, potential or apparent conflict of interest.

#### 16. DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of Government Code section 8350 et seq., regarding a drug free workplace and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

#### 17. HEALTH AND SAFETY STANDARDS

Contractor shall abide by all health and safety standards set forth by the State of California and/or the County of Solano pursuant to the Injury and Illness Prevention Program. If applicable, Contractor must receive all health and safety information and training from County.

#### 18. CHILD/ADULT ABUSE

If services pursuant to this Contract will be provided to children and/or elder adults, Contractor represents that Contractor is knowledgeable of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act (Penal Code section 11164 et seq.) and the Elder Abuse and Dependent Adult Civil Protection Act (Welfare and Institutions Code section 15600 et seq.) requiring reporting of suspected abuse.

#### 19. INSPECTION

Authorized representatives of County, the State of California and/or the federal government may inspect and/or audit Contractor's performance, place of business and/or records pertaining to this Contract.

#### 20. NONDISCRIMINATION

- A. In rendering services under this Contract, Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations and shall not discriminate based on age, ancestry, color, gender, marital status, medical condition, national origin, physical or mental disability, race, religion, sexual orientation, or other protected status.
- B. Further, Contractor shall not discriminate against its employees, which includes, but is not limited to, employment upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

#### 21. SUBCONTRACTOR AND ASSIGNMENT

- A. Services under this Contract are deemed to be personal services.
- B. Subject to any required state or federal approval, Contractor shall not subcontract any work under this Contract without the prior written consent of the County's Contract Manager nor assign this Contract or monies due without the prior written approval of the County's applicable Department Head or his or her designee and the County Administrator.
- C. If County consents to the use of subcontractors, Contractor shall require and verify that its subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated in Section 7 above.
- D. Assignment by Contractor of any monies due shall not constitute an assignment of the Contract.

#### 22. UNFORESEEN CIRCUMSTANCES

Contractor is not responsible for any delay caused by natural disaster, war, civil disturbance, labor dispute or other cause beyond Contractor's reasonable control, provided Contractor gives written notice to County of the cause of the delay within 10 days of the start of the delay.

#### 23. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

A. County shall be the owner of and shall be entitled to possession of any computations, plans, correspondence or other pertinent data and information gathered by or computed by Contractor prior to termination of this Contract by County or upon completion of the work pursuant to this Contract.

B. No material prepared in connection with the project shall be subject to copyright in the United States or in any other country.

#### 24. NOTICE

- A. Any notice necessary to the performance of this Contract shall be given in writing by personal delivery or by prepaid first-class mail addressed as stated on the first page of this Contract.
- B. If notice is given by personal delivery, notice is effective as of the date of personal delivery. If notice is given by mail, notice is effective as of the day following the date of mailing or the date of delivery reflected upon a return receipt, whichever occurs first.

#### 25. Nonrenewal

Contractor acknowledges that there is no guarantee that County will renew Contractor's services under a new contract following expiration or termination of this Contract. Contractor waives all rights to notice of non-renewal of Contractor's services.

## 26. COUNTY'S OBLIGATION SUBJECT TO AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

- A. The County's obligation under this Contract is subject to the availability of authorized funds. The County may terminate the Contract, or any part of the Contract work, without prejudice to any right or remedy of the County, for lack of appropriation of funds. If expected or actual funding is withdrawn, reduced or limited in any way prior to the expiration date set forth in this Contract, or any subsequent amendment, the County may, upon written Notice to the Contractor, terminate this Contract in whole or in part.
- B. Payment shall not exceed the amount allowable for appropriation by the Board of Supervisors. If the Contract is terminated for non-appropriation of funds:
- i. The County will be liable only for payment in accordance with the terms of this Contract for services rendered prior to the effective date of termination; and
- ii. The Contractor shall be released from any obligation to provide further services pursuant to this Contract that are affected by the termination.
- C. Funding for this Contract beyond the current appropriation year is conditional upon appropriation by the Board of Supervisors of sufficient funds to support the activities described in this Contract. Should such an appropriation not be approved, this Contract will terminate at the close of the current appropriation year.
- D. This Contract is void and unenforceable if all or parts of federal or state funds applicable to this Contract are not available to County. If applicable funding is reduced, County may either:
  - (1) Cancel this Contract; or,
  - (2) Offer a contract amendment reflecting the reduced funding.

#### 27. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

- A. County may request changes in Contractor's scope of services. Any mutually agreed upon changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of Contractor's compensation, shall be effective when incorporated in written amendments to this Contract.
- B. The party desiring the revision shall request amendments to the terms and conditions of this Contract in writing. Any adjustment to this Contract shall be effective only upon the parties' mutual execution of an amendment in writing.
- C. No verbal agreements or conversations prior to execution of this Contract or requested amendment shall affect or modify any of the terms or conditions of this Contract unless reduced to writing according to the applicable provisions of this Contract.

#### 28. CHOICE OF LAW

The parties have executed and delivered this Contract in the County of Solano, State of California. The laws of the State of California shall govern the validity, enforceability or interpretation of this Contract. Solano County shall be the venue for any action or proceeding, in law or equity that may be brought in connection with this Contract.

#### 29. HEALTH INSURANCE PORTABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT

Contractor represents that it is knowledgeable of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA") and its implementing regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (45 C.F.R. parts 160-64) regarding the protection of health information obtained, created, or exchanged as a result of this Contract and shall abide by and implement its statutory requirements.

#### 30. WAIVER

Any failure of a party to assert any right under this Contract shall not constitute a waiver or a termination of that right, under this Contract or any of its provisions.

#### 31. CONFLICTS IN THE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

The Contract documents are intended to be complementary and interpreted in harmony so as to avoid conflict. In the event of conflict in the Contract documents, the parties agree that the document providing the highest quality and level of service to the County shall supersede any inconsistent term in these documents.

#### 32. FAITH BASED ORGANIZATIONS

- A. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that County may make funds available for programs or services affiliated with religious organizations under the following conditions: (a) the funds are made available on an equal basis as for programs or services affiliated with non-religious organizations; (b) the program funded does not have the substantial effect of supporting religious activities; (c) the funding is indirect, remote, or incidental to the religious purpose of the organization; and (d) the organization complies with the terms and conditions of this Contract.
- B. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that County may not make funds available for programs or services affiliated with a religious organization (a) that has denied or continues to deny access to services on the basis of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sex, citizenship, or known disability; (b) will use the funds for a religious purpose; (c) will use the funds for a program or service that subjects its participants to religious education.
- C. Contractor agrees and acknowledges that all recipients of funding from County must: (a) comply with all legal requirements and restrictions imposed upon government-funded activities set forth in Article IX, section 8 and Article XVI, section 5 of the California Constitution and in the First Amendment to the United States Constitution; and (b) segregate such funding from all funding used for religious purposes.

#### 33. PRICING

Should Contractor, at any time during the term of this Contract, provide the same goods or services under similar quantity, terms and conditions to one or more counties in the State of California at prices below those set forth in this Contract, then the parties agree to amend this Contract so that such lower prices shall be extended immediately to County for all future services.

## 34. USE OF PROVISIONS, TERMS, CONDITIONS AND PRICING BY OTHER PUBLIC AGENCIES

Contractor and County agree that the terms of this Contract may be extended to any other public agency located in the State of California, as provided for in this section. Another public agency wishing to use the provisions, terms, and pricing of this Contract to contract for equipment and services comparable to that described in this Contract shall be responsible for entering into its own contract with Contractor, as well as providing for its own payment provisions, making all payments, and obtaining any certificates of insurance and bonds that may be required. County is not responsible for providing to any other public agency any documentation relating this Contract or its implementation. Any public agency that uses provisions, terms, or pricing of this Contract shall by virtue of doing so be deemed to indemnify and hold harmless County from all claims, demands, or causes of actions of every kind arising directly or indirectly with the use of this Contract. County makes no guarantee of usage by other users of this Contract nor shall the County incur any financial responsibility in connection with any contracts entered into by another public agency. Such other public agency shall accept sole responsibility for placing orders and making payments to Contractor.

#### 35. DISBARMENT OR SUSPENSION OF CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor represents that its officers, directors and employees (i) are not currently excluded, debarred, or otherwise ineligible to participate in a federally funded program; (ii) have not been convicted of a criminal offense related to the provision of federally funded items or services but or previously excluded, debarred, or otherwise declared ineligible to participate in any federally funded programs, and (iii) are not, to the best of its knowledge, under investigation or otherwise aware of any circumstances which may result in Contractor being excluded from participation in federally funded programs.
- B. For purposes of this Contract, federally funded programs include any federal health program as defined in 42 USC § 1320a-7b(f) (the "Federal Healthcare Programs") or any state healthcare programs.
- C. This representation and warranty shall be an ongoing representation and warranty during the term of this Contract and Contractor must immediately notify the County of any change in the status of the representation and warranty set forth in this section.
- D. If services pursuant to this Contract involve federally-funded programs, Contractor agrees to provide certification of non-suspension with submission of each invoice. Failure to submit certification with invoices will result in a delay in County processing of Contractor's payment.

#### 36. EXECUTION IN COUNTERPARTS

This Contract may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which together shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument, it being understood that all parties need not sign the same counterpart. In the event that any signature is delivered by facsimile or electronic transmission (e.g., by e-mail delivery of a ".pdf" format data file), such signature shall create a valid and binding obligation of the party executing (or on whose behalf such signature is executed) with the same force and effect as if such facsimile or electronic signature page were an original signature.

#### 37. LOCAL EMPLOYMENT POLICY

Solano County desires, whenever possible, to hire qualified local residents to work on County projects. A local resident is defined as a person who resides in, or a business that is located in, Solano County. The County encourages an active outreach program on the part of its contractors, consultants and agents. When local projects require subcontractors, Contractor shall solicit proposals for qualified local residents where possible.

# EXHIBIT D SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

#### 1. CONTRACT EXTENSION

Notwithstanding Sections 2 and 3 of the Standard Contract, and unless terminated by either party prior to contract termination date, at County's sole election, this Contract may be extended for up to 90 days beyond the contract termination date to allow for continuation of services and sufficient time to complete a novation or renewal contract. In the event that this Contract is extended, compensation for the extension period will not exceed \$69,841.

#### 2. DRUG FREE WORKPLACE

Contractor will execute the form attached as Exhibit "D-1".

#### 3. CHILD/ADULT ABUSE

Contractor will execute the form attached as Exhibits "D-2" and "D-3".

#### 4. HIPAA COMPLIANCE-COVERED ENTITY TO COVERED ENTITY

COUNTY and CONTRACTOR each consider and represent themselves as covered entities as defined by the U.S. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act and agree to use and disclose protected health information as required by law. COUNTY and CONTRACTOR acknowledge that the exchange of protected health information between them is only for treatment, payment, and health care operations.

#### 5. CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

Contractor will:

- A. Provide services to any person, regardless of age, color, disability, marital status, national origin, Limited-English Proficiency (LEP), political affiliation, race, religion or sex.
- B. Comply with civil rights requirements as directed by County, which includes, but is not limited to the following:
  - i. Ensure public contact staff attends civil rights training.
  - ii. Ensure notices and correspondences sent to participants are in their respective primary language and provide interpreters to ensure meaningful access of services to all applicants.
- C. Maintain a record of all civil rights materials provided by County and ensure all applicants are provided with the civil rights materials.
- D. Develop and use procedures for receiving and forwarding civil rights complaints as follows:
  - i. County Contract Manager (CCM) will act as the Civil Rights Liaison (CRL) between Contractor and the H&SS Civil Rights Coordinator.
  - ii. Refer or forward all complaints to the H&SS Civil Rights Coordinator within two business days of receiving it. If forwarding a written complaint, Contractor must maintain a copy.
  - iii. CCM/CRL will not attempt to investigate civil right complaints. All investigations are handled by the H&SS Civil Rights Coordinator.
  - iv. Civil rights complaints will not be scanned as documentation in CalWIN.

#### 6. VENDOR ASSURANCE OF COMPLIANCE

Contractor will execute the form attached as Exhibit "D-4"

#### 7. CULTURAL COMPETENCE

Contractor will provide culturally and linguistically competent and age-appropriate service, to the extent feasible.

#### 8. CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS

Contractor warrants that Contractor is knowledgeable of the confidentiality laws of the State of California; specifically Civil Code § 56 et seq. and Welfare and Institutions Code §§ 827 and 5328 respecting confidentiality of records. Contractor further warrants that Contractor is knowledgeable of Welfare and Institutions Code sections applicable to the subject of this Contract, particularly sections §§ 10850 and 11478.1 and will abide by its requirements. County and Contractor will maintain the confidentiality of any information regarding clients (or their families) receiving Contractor's services. Contractor may obtain such information from application forms, interviews, tests or reports from public agencies, counselors or any other source. Without the client's written permission, Contractor will divulge such information only as necessary for purposes related to the performance or evaluation of services provided pursuant to this Contract, and then only to those persons having responsibilities under this Contract, including those furnishing services under Contractor through subcontracts.

#### 9. SPECIAL INCIDENT REPORTING

- D/ Provide an un-audited statement of revenue and expenditures to County within thirty days (30) of completion of the project if funds awarded to Contractor are \$100,000 or less.
- E. Obtain a bond at, Contractor's sole expense, in an amount sufficient to cover start-up funds if any were provided to Contractor from County.

## **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:**

The WDC recommends that the Board of Supervisors:

## SUMMARY:

On March 30, 2018, the WDB was awarded a \$500,000 grant from Tipping Point Community Emergency Relief Fund to fund targeted employment services for Solano residents affected by the North Bay Fires of October 2018. The grant award period is from April 1, 2018 through December 31, 2019. WDB is requesting the Board's formal adoption of a resolution accepting this grant.

The purpose of the Emergency Relief Fund grant is to help reconnect individuals whose livelihood was affected by the North Bay Fires through job connections, business development, and skills enhancement. Project services will include short-term training, job coaching, and wrap-around services to not only get individuals back to work quickly, but also set the stage for long-term sustainable employment with

family-sustaining wages. The project will also support Solano County small businesses to take advantage of fire rebuilding contracts, thereby expanding the job opportunities for Solano residents.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There will be no financial impact to the County General Fund. These grant funds will increase the WDB budget for FY2017/18 by \$30,340 (Appropriation Transfer Request), FY2018/19 by \$328,640 (included in the FY2018/19 Requested Budget), and FY2019/20 by \$141,020.

## DISCUSSION:

The WDB worked with First 5 Solano to develop the program design. The grant includes a sub-contract with California Employment Development Department (EDD) to identify and analyze Unemployment Insurance (UI) recipients affected by the fires.

Solano County workers were impacted by the North Bay Fires with over 1,700 residents becoming displaced as a result, equating to 10% of commuters to Sonoma and Napa counties. The WDB will work with EDD to conduct outreach to fire-impacted recipients of UI benefits as well as target outreach materials to those that were affected by the fires.

WDB staff will collaborate with the business community, community organizations, trades associations and unions, the state, training providers, and other North Bay workforce boards to ensure the services provided individuals effectively aid in their recovery and that the employment and training solutions match the fire rebuilding needs of the North Bay. Based on proactive industry knowledge, the WDB will partner with training providers and organizations to offer short-term training that supports fire rebuilding, targeting those individuals displaced from the fires as well as potential fire recovery employers to maximize job creation opportunities. Staff will maintain partnership with the business community to stay up-to-date on fire rebuilding efforts in order to ensure occupational certifications stay ahead of market needs.

Those attending training will be given Career in Focus job coaching. Career in Focus will guide individuals on how to turn the short-term opportunity into more sustainable employment, provide job search assistance such as resume review and interviewing skills, fund tools or work equipment as needed, and include referrals to community resources for general supportive needs. For those that need more than a light touch, staff will enroll individuals into more intensive case management and wrap-around services to address any barriers to employment. In concurrence to the individual services provided, staff will work with businesses to develop employment opportunities rebuilding communities after the fires.

## **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board can choose not to approve this resolution. However, this will prevent the WDB from receiving funding from the Tipping Point Community Emergency Relief Fund and may affect the potential to receive future awards from this foundation.

particularly those who have completed two or four-year degrees, or are in the last year of their degreed program. Sixty (60) individuals with disabilities will be served over the life of the grant, in addition to numerous system improvements to the workforce system to better serve individuals with disabilities.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT:

There will be no financial impact to the County General Fund. These grant funds will increase the WDB budget for FY2017/18 by \$27,525 (Appropriation Transfer Request), FY2018/19 by \$197,128 (included in the FY2018/19 Requested Budget), and FY2019/20 by \$125,347.

## **DISCUSSION**:

The WDB worked with Solano County Office of Education (SCOE), Solano Community College, Department of Rehabilitation, employers, and community partners to develop the program design. The grant includes a sub-contract with SCOE for hiring and managing a Disability Resource Coordinator.

Solano County has a need for additional supports around employment for individuals with disabilities. Solano County has an 8.0% rate of disabilities among individuals under 65, which is higher than the state average of 6.8%. People with disabilities have a higher rate of unemployment than the general population, as well as a significantly lower participation in the labor force. This correlates to a higher level of poverty among people with disabilities, with 21% of the disabled population below the poverty rate in Solano County. Utilizing data from the CalJOBS system, only 1% of the disabled population in Solano County are using the America's Job Centers of California system, which leaves room for significant improvement. There are numerous organizations in Solano County working with individuals with disabilities, but very little alignment and leveraging or resources for the benefit of those with disabilities. This grant will address these gaps.

The WDB will focus efforts on four targeted industries for employment opportunities: Healthcare, Advanced Materials, Construction, and Food/Beverage Chain. The project will increase employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities by customizing workforce services in the job centers, compiling cross-agency Integrated Resource teams to improve resource coordination, and developing customized apprenticeships and paid internships. WDB staff will work to expand employer outreach, educate businesses on working with people with disabilities, and support businesses in customizing employment opportunities. In addition, the project will allow for an assessment of the accessibility of the job centers and programs, and build staff knowledge in successfully working with individuals with disabilities.

## **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board can choose not to approve this resolution. However, this will prevent the WDB from receiving funding for the DEA Program and may affect the potential to receive future awards from this agency.

## **DEPARTMENTAL RECOMMENDATION:**

The Department of General Services recommends that the Board of Supervisors conduct a Public Hearing to review and consider adopting the updated Solano County 5-Year Capital Facilities Improvement Plan for Fiscal Years 2017/18 through 2021/22.

## **SUMMARY:**

In accordance with Section 66002 of the California Government Code, the 5-year Capital Facilities Improvement Plan (CIP) has been updated for 2017/18 through 2021/22 (Attachment A). A copy of the CIP is also on file with the Clerk of the Board. The CIP is being presented in advance of the FY2018/19 Budget Hearings to allow Board input prior to finalizing the CIP funding request for the upcoming fiscal year. A preliminary budget summary for the recommended capital projects in FY2018/19 is included in Attachment B.

## **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

The General Services Department capital projects budget recommendation for FY2018/19 will include requested funding in the amount of \$1,465,000 from the Capital Renewal Reserve Fund, \$345,800 from the Criminal Justice Temporary Construction Fund, and \$2,053,800 from the Accumulated Capital Outlay Fund. Funding for the recommended capital improvement projects will be presented to the Board for approval during the FY2018/19 Budget Hearings. An additional \$707,500 will be requested to support other Department funded capital projects. The total FY2018/19 capital project budget recommendation is \$4,572,100.

## **DISCUSSION:**

The CIP is essentially a planning document that is used as the basis to establish project priorities and develop estimated costs, annual budget requests, and financing plans for improvements to County facilities. The CIP

is also used as a resource document to prepare the annual update for the County's Public Facilities Fees. The updated CIP does not include projects administered by the Resource Management Department/Public Works, the Nut Tree Airport, and the County Fairgrounds in Vallejo since these projects are reported separately to the Board.

The CIP identifies planned facility renewal, renovation, new construction, and major maintenance over a five year period and provides a practical and qualified framework to assist the Board in making well-informed decisions for investing County funds to preserve the quality and value of the County's real estate assets. In developing the CIP, General Services Department works with Departments and the CAO to validate future County operational needs related to building space requirements and potential changes in service delivery models. In addition, the cost of facilities operations and maintenance is evaluated to determine replacement and renewal cycles for major building systems.

The CIP is updated annually and was last presented to the Board in February 2017. The CIP projects that have been completed since the last update, CIP projects to be completed by June 2018, CIP projects currently in progress that will carry over into the FY2018/19, and new projects that have been added to the updated CIP are included in Attachment C.

Review and adoption of the updated CIP does not commit the Board to funding specific projects and is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Individual projects in the CIP that have not been previously approved by the Board are presented for consideration through the annual budget process or on an individual basis as necessary. CEQA review of individual projects in the CIP will be conducted, if required, before each project is authorized to proceed with construction.

## **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board may choose not to adopt the updated CIP. This is not recommended because an approved CIP validates and confirms the prioritization of proposed County capital investments. The Board may direct staff to make changes to the CIP, or direct staff to return at a later date for approval of the revised CIP.

## OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

The projects included in the updated CIP were prepared and developed with input from County Departments and reviewed by the County Administrator's Office.

Honorable Board of Supervisors:

The County strives to protect the value of its real estate assets to ensure that these facilities adequately support the programs and services to serve the public. The updated 5-Year Capital Facilities Improvement Plan (CIP) for FY2017/18 through FY2021/22 identifies needs, priorities, and estimated costs for major maintenance, equipment replacements, and improvements to County facilities. The CIP serves as a planning document to guide prioritization and recommended capital projects to inform the Board and the public of overall facilities improvement and funding needs.

The projects presented in the CIP support the County's mission, "to serve the people and to provide a safe and healthy place to live, learn, work and play" and are in alignment with the County's core values of **Excellence** to provide quality, integrated, sustainable, and innovative public services and **Accountability** to take ownership, be fiscally responsible, and result-driven.

The CIP is intended to be a responsive and flexible planning guide, reflecting a program of facilities improvements that can be modified based on new information or changed conditions over time. Because it is a planning document and not a project-specific proposal, the CIP is exempt from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review.

Projects in the CIP are largely funded from the Capital Renewal Reserve Fund, the Accumulated Capital Outlay (ACO) Fund, and Public Facilities Fees. Other funding sources may include grants, bond financing, and lease revenue bonds. Project funding sources are identified in the CIP only if the revenue source is certain. Limited County funding and reliable revenue streams to support capital renewal needs remains an ongoing challenge.

The CIP does not include projects for Public Works/Transportation, County Fairgrounds (Solano 360), and the Nut Tree Airport, which are presented to the Board in separate annual reports.

## **GUIDING PRINCIPLES**

The following principles are considered in determining projects to be included in the CIP:

- Balance prioritized needs with available funding
- Effectively utilize facility and real estate assets
- Renew facilities consistent with expected life-cycle
- Implement sustainable building design
- Base new construction on operational need
- Dispose of surplus real estate

## **EVALUATION CRITERIA/ESTIMATED FUNDING**

CIP projects are prioritized based on five categories of relative importance: 1) public health and safety, 2) building code and regulatory compliance, 3) extend the value of real estate assets, 4) support operational efficiencies, and 5) reduce facilities operation/maintenance cost.

Based on currently identified facilities improvement needs, estimated CIP funding over the next five years is summarized in the following table:

## **FACILITIES CONDITION ASSESSMENT**

In 2016, the Department of General Services completed a comprehensive Facilities Condition Assessment (FCA) of the primary buildings in the County real estate portfolio, which included 50 buildings consisting of 2 million square feet. The purpose of the FCA was to document existing building and site conditions to develop a qualified foundation for prioritizing future CIP projects to maintain County facilities in good condition.

The FCA was presented to the Board of Supervisors in February 2017 together with an updated Master Plan for the County's main campuses in Fairfield. The FCA presentation disclosed that, on average over the next 15 years, approximately \$3 million of annual investment would be needed to maintain County facilities in good condition. At that time, the Board established a goal to maintain County facilities in good condition. Accordingly, this goal serves as the foundational basis to inform and quide the development of the annual CIP.

Another important finding of the FCA was validation that investment in capital renewal for existing County facilities will be the predominant focus of recommended budgets in the foreseeable future. Capital renewal investment consists of projects such as replacement of air conditioning systems, upgrades to existing building automation systems/controls, roof replacements, parking lot paving, energy efficiency improvements, plumbing and lighting system upgrades.

In addition to the FCA report, the Board of Supervisors adopted 2017 Fairfield Campus Master Plans, which identified possible expansion of existing facilities and potential new construction over a 20-year planning horizon. While these potential needs will be incorporated into the County's overall real estate investment planning strategy, the current CIP remains primarily focused on renewal and replacement projects to support well-maintained buildings, and preservation of the County's real estate assets.


The Department of General Services Capital Projects Management and Facilities Operations Divisions work collaboratively to integrate CIP planning objectives with operational needs. The Facilities Division is the designated Program Administrator for the County's FCA database and is most knowledgeable about building operations, systems, and conditions. The Capital Projects Management Division to provides technical support relative to design, building code requirements, space needs/programming, and estimated project costs. The goal of maintaining the County's facilities in good condition will continue to be a strategic management focus of the Department of General Services.

## **CONCLUSION**


The 5-year Capital Facilities Improvement Plan is presented to the Board of Supervisors for review and approval on an annual basis. CIP projects recommended for funding in FY 2018/19 will be included in the capital projects budget request submitted by the Department of General Services to be considered by the Board of Supervisors at budget hearings. Effective management of the CIP includes forecasting future needs, establishing qualified priorities to support recommended investments, and identifying financing opportunities and strategic funding plans. 
