Computer and Automated Systems Purchase Justification

The purpose for purchase of 1 laptop computer is to provide the 1 Mass Victimization Witness Advocate (MVA) mobile access to databases, websites, other resources that will help victims of crime navigate the criminal justice system. This laptop will allow the MVA to access the department's case management system to review information on cases, update victim information, and offer secure and confidential access web based services for clients who do not have access to a computer. On a daily basis, the laptop computer will provide the MVA with access to reports of new cases filed by the District Attorney, so that victims in these cases can be contacted and offered services as soon as possible. Laptop computers are preferable to desktop computers in that the MVA can take the computer with them to the scene of the mass victimization event, court sessions, appointments, and meetings, all of which will further help victims of crime connect with programs and services.

Budget Narrative

The attached budget reflects a request for funding in the amount of \$811,727 of which \$749,175 will be utilized to fund the following Personal Services:

- 3.0 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) Victim Witness Assistants
- 2.0 FTE Limited Term (LT) Victim Witness Assistants
- Two (2) 0.5 FTE, LT Office Assistant II. The grant program seeks to convert 2 Extra Help Office Assistant II in to two (2) 0.5 FTE, Limited Term Office Assistant II
- 1.0 FTE LT Mass Victimization Victim Witness Advocate (new position) The budget supports the program's objectives and activities of the Solano County District Attorney's Crime Victim Assistance Unit (CVAU) by continuing to employ 3.0 FTE Victim Witness Assistants and 2.0 FTE, LT Victim Witness Assistants who provide all mandatory and many optional services to victims and witnesses of crime in Solano County. All of our Victim Witness Assistants are highly qualified, including one who's provided CVAU services to victims of crime in Solano County for over 20 years, and served the CVAU in a supervising capacity when grant funding provided for that. Job duties include direct services to victims and witnesses of violent crime. These services include crisis intervention, informal counseling, resource referrals, orientation into the criminal justice system, court accompaniment and support, and more. A Victim Witness Assistant position description is attached for reference.

The budget also supports the conversion of Extra Help Office Assistants into two (2) 0.5 FTE, LT Office Assistant II who provide much needed administrative support to the CVAU. The Office Assistants will continue to assist the Victim Witness Assistants with contacting victims of misdemeanor Domestic Violence and notifying them of eligibility for Victim Compensation Board (VCB) benefits as well as notification of court dates and decisions on criminal cases per Marsy's Law. The current case load of our Victim Witness Unit allows for advocates to contact victims in felony cases at the time a case is filed, but leaves minimal time to contact victims in misdemeanor cases at the time of filing. To address this delay in contacting victims, the Office Assistants will contact victims of misdemeanor of Domestic Violence and similar crimes, set up appointments with Advocates to meet and complete VCB paperwork, and address any questions and concerns of these victims prior to meeting with an Advocate. The Office Assistants will also continue to help the CVAU with general intake, routing cases to CVAU advocates, management of case files, data entry of cases, and purging old cases. The budget also supports a new position, a 1.0 FTE LT Mass Victimization Victim Witness Advocate. This advocate will work to develop a victim assistance plan to support and enhance immediate response and recovery efforts in Solano County and the surrounding region. This advocate will also develop crisis response protocols, MOUs within our Crisis Response region, conduct community outreach, and create a timeline to meet all required objectives of the MVA program.

The proposed budget covers approximately 100% of the total salary and benefit expense for each of the 3.0 FTE Victim Witness Assistants, 2.0 Full Time, Limited Term Victim Witness Assistants, two 0.5 Full Time Limited Term Office Assistants, and 1.0 FTE Mass Victimization Victim Witness Assistant. 100% of overhead costs, including overtime, supervision, and management, office space, IT and related office equipment are covered by appropriations from the County's General Fund. The Victim Witness Program Coordinator for the CVAU is funded from the County's General Fund and will be responsible for recruiting and training volunteers, outreach to the community and project partners, staff training and grant reporting. As the grant program will seek a waiver of up to 80% of the required match, salary expense equal to \$35,257 from the Victim Witness Program Coordinator will be used as match. The Victim Witness Program Coordinator will be responsible for ensuring all grant expenditures meet with CalOES guidelines. We do not have any subcontracts. \$25, 195 of 18 VOCA funds are appropriated for the following Operating

- \$4,200 for cell phone monthly expense for 7 victim witness assistants at \$50 per month per victim witness assistant.
- \$3,000 for Mileage reimbursement for victim witness assistant travel at \$0.58

- \$5,000 for office supplies such as file folders, paper, pens, and other routine expenses.

 \$12,995 for 51,980 handouts at \$0.25 each for printed materials that detail the California Victims' Bill of Rights as well as local resources for victims of crime.

\$2,100 of 18 VOCA funds are appropriated for the following Equipment:

- \$1,900 for 1 Dell 2 in 1 laptop computer with additional monitor and docking station for the 1.0 FTE Limited Term Mass Victimization Victim
 Witness Assistant
- \$200 for a local printer for the 1.0 FTE Limited Term Mass Victimization Victim
 Witness Assistant

Project Narrative

The Solano County District Attorney's Office Crime Victim Assistance Unit is currently made up of nine full time Victim Witness Advocates and two part time Administrative Assistants. Presently, five of the nine advocates are located in the Main Fairfield branch of the Solano County District Attorney's Office, three advocates are located in our Vallejo Branch, and one advocate is located in our Family Justice Center. The Total staff breakdown of the Solano County District Attorney's Office consists of The District Attorney, two Chief Deputies, fifty attorneys, thirty-seven support staff, twenty-three in the Investigations Unit, seven in the Forensics Lab, seven in the Victim Witness Unit, and finally, six located in the Family Justice Center.

Problem Statement

The Crime Victim Assistance Unit (CVAU) within the District Attorney's Office has been running strong with nine full time advocates over the past fiscal year. With nine full time advocates, the CVAU has improved its ability to deliver services, and continues to provide all the mandatory services pursuant to Penal Code Section 13835.

The number of cases taken by our unit has continued to grow year after year.

During the 2017/2018 fiscal year we served approximately 2100 new victims.

During this current fiscal year, the Solano CVAU served approximately 2200 new victims and we are only about three quarters the way through the year. This increase in victim services comes from the larger unit size and from a change in

our intake process. It is the vision and passion of our District Attorney to provide quality and timely services to all of those affected by violent crime in Solano County. With this growing caseload we are in need of administrative help that spans the whole year. Currently, we have 2 Extra Help Office Assistants who both cap out at 999 hours per fiscal year. This is problematic because our Office assistants run out of hours leaving a roughly 2 month gap with no clerical help. This gap directly affects the Advocates who spend the bulk of their time providing direct victim services to a growing clientele.

The Solano CVAU has also identified another service gap in the ability to serve victims of mass victimization both locally and in surrounding counties. It is a sad reality that mass victimization is becoming more common, and the need for a person to be dedicated to creating policies and coordinating critical response to those incidents is becoming very apparent. The Solano County CVAU is part of the Bay Area Mass Casualty Planning Committee but has not been able to actively participate in events and training because there has not been a dedicated Advocate that could take on that task.

Currently, all county wide emergency services are coordinated through the Solano County Sheriff's Office. Should an incident occur in Solano County, the Solano County CVAU would be ill prepared to aid or assist due to lack of training and formal policies being in place.

CVAU volunteers are responsible for general clerical needs, they also assist our Office Assistants in various special projects that help the CVAU run more

smoothly. When volunteers come on board there is an assessment as to what they want to get out of the program, and duties are tailored so that the relationship between the CVAU and volunteers is mutually beneficial.

Volunteers are often interested in the inner workings of a DA's Office and CVAU, so they shadow advocates on cases and interviews and become proficient in

many aspects of an advocates work. Admittedly, finding volunteers continues

Demographics

Vallejo is the largest of Solano County's seven cities, with the City of Fairfield serving as the County Seat. Other cities in the county include Benicia, Dixon, Rio Vista, Suisun City, and Vacaville. Bordered by Napa, Yolo, Sacramento, and Contra Costa Counties, Solano County is geographically dispersed and covers 906 square miles, including 84 square miles of water area and 672 square miles of rural land. Solano County's population is estimated at 431, 131 according to 2014 U.S. Census Data, the population of Solano County is 60.6% White, 24.8% Hispanic, 15% Black, 15.5% Asian, 6.6% multiracial, 1.2% American Indian, and 1.0% Pacific Islander. The median age is 36.9 years (2010). Of Solano County's residents, 29.9% speak a language other than English; of those not born in the United States and living in Solano County, 50.2% are not U.S. Citizens. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, unemployment in Solano County was at 5.3% in April 2016. Between 2005 and 2010, there was a reduction of 7.5% in Private Sector Employment and a 4.7% reduction in government employment.

Plan

Currently, the CVAU employs nine full time Victim Witness Advocates. Five of Advocates are funded by the Main Victim Witness Grant. This includes four general Advocates, and one Spanish Speaking Advocate. We also employ a Tagalog speaking Advocate and an additional Spanish speaking advocate under out Underserved Victim Grant. Our County General fund

funds both the Victim Witness Program Coordinator and another General Advocate. All nine advocates are equipped to work with elderly victims and witnesses of crime and have resources available from local area partners. As was stated before, our intake system has changed recently. In the past, our unit would receive referrals through request from Deputy District Attorneys who have reviewed the case and determined that victims could benefit from victim services. It would be problematic because by the time our unit received the case, it could potentially be weeks/months after the crime occurred. In an effort to close that service gap, we have utilized a new intake process wherein a list is automatically populated daily with all new cases that come into the District Attorney's office. This has closed the gap in service to our victims because it significantly shortens the time between when the crime occurs and when the advocate has first contact. This new intake process would not be possible without our Office Assistants who work hard at building and distributing cases as they are populated on the list. As was stated before, because the Office Assistants are extra help, when they run out of hours they cannot be in our employ. This means that there is often a 2-3-month gap where their responsibilities get redistributed to the advocates. This is daunting and hinders the work of the advocates who are trying to provide direct services to victims. Our hope is that the funding from CalOES will give us the ability to convert those Office Assistants from extra

help to a .5 FTE benefitted Office Assistants. This means that they will be able to work year-round, and that service gap will disappear.


We are also hoping that funding from CalOES will also afford us an additional advocate that will focus on mass victimization policies and implementation. As the incidents of mass victimizations are on the rise, it is becomina apparent that we need someone who can focus, create and implement policies if a critical incident were to occur in Solano or surrounding counties. The additional advocate would study existing policies within the county as well as create protocols and partnerships with other Mass Victimization Advocates. They would attend meetings for the Bay Area Mass Casualty Planning Committee, they would become familiar with protocols from other counties and create protocols for Solano. They would lead trainings for key players in Solano County for the implementation of those policies. They would also coordinate requests from other counties to aid in out of county mass casualty events. I also believe that with the community building and networking aspect of this advocate there may be some opportunity to help in finding a steady stream of volunteers for the CVAU. Time permitting, they would also carry additional cases, which would also improve delivery of victim services to the victims of Solano County.

The County of Solano Victim Witness Assistance Program provides all mandated services to victims of crime, including crisis intervention, emergency assistance, resource and referral assistance, direct counseling and referrals for therapy, claim assistance, property return, introduction and orientation to the criminal justice system, and court accompaniment.

10. Describe practical and/or logistical obstacles to providing match:

To achieve the balance of the grant match, the VW grant program would need to make use of a local vital record fee. This fee was established to help victims of domestic violence and other violent crime. Currently these fees are budgeted toward salary and benefit expense for social workers assigned to the Solano Family Justice Center. Use of these fees toward the match requirement decreases the ability to use those fees to directly help crime victims with other needs such as food, clothing, and transportation, as well as other emergency services.

11. Describe any local resource constraints to providing match:

We request an 18 VOCA partial match waiver from the current \$176,283 requirement because the source of our 18 Match, the Victim Witness Program Coordinator, has a total general fund salary and benefit cost of \$124,298. A reduction of the 18 VOCA match to 4.762% will benefit crime victims in Solano County.
